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



MIKE TROUT 2016 SEASON IN REVIEW

The 25-year-old and a five-time Top-2 finisher in the A.L. MVP voting, finished the 2016 season batting .315 with 32 doubles, 5 triples, 29 home runs, 100 RBI, 30 stolen bases and 123 runs scored. Following is a statistical glance at his 2016 campaign...

ALL BY MYSELF...

Trout became the first player in American League history with 25 home runs, 30 stolen bases and a .440 on-base percentage.

FISH FACTS...

- Led the Majors in runs, walks (116) and OBP (.441) and also ranked in the Top-10 in several of the American League's offensive categories including average (6th), triples (T10), steals (T2nd) and slugging (.550; 5th).
- Was the only player in the Majors to bat .315 with 100 RBI, 100 runs and 100 walks and is the first American Leaguer to do so since Miguel Cabrera (.344, 105 RBI, 111 runs, 108 walks) in 2011...The last player to boast those numbers in a single season before their age-25 campaign was Alex Rodriguez in 2000 (.316, 132 RBI, 134 runs, 100 walks).
- Becomes first player to lead the A.L. in walks and runs since
 Trout did so in 2013 (prior to Trout, the last player to lead the
 A.L. in both categories was Frank Thomas in 1994)...Is the first
 player since Ted Williams (five times) to lead either league in
 those categories multiple times.
- One of two players in the American League to post a slash line of .300/.400/.500 this season (David Ortiz).
- Is the first A.L. player to log 115 walks and 115 runs scored in a single season since David Ortiz did so in 2006...Is also the first American League outfielder to do so since Tony Phillips in 1996.






2016 SEASON IN REVIEW

ELITE COMPANY...

- Becomes just the second player ever to hit .315, walk 115 times, score 120 runs and steal 30 bases, joining Ty Cobb in 1915.
- Also is just the fourth player in MLB history to lead either league in runs four times in a five-year span joining Babe Ruth, George Burns and Mickey Mantle.
- Is the first player since Albert Pujols in 2009 to log 100 RBI, 110 walks and score 120 runs in a single season...Is just the 14th player in American League history to post those numbers and the first to do so since the Angels' Troy Glaus in 2000.
- Became the second-youngest player to tally 25 home runs, 25 stolen bases and walk 100 times in a season...Youngest was Trout in 2013.

KNOW THIS...

- There have been two instances in American League history that a player has amassed 300 total bases, 100 walks and stolen 25 bases in a single season: Mike Trout in 2016 and Mike Trout in 2013.
- Trout scored 17% of Angels runs (123/717) this season, marking highest percentage for any A.L. player since Rickey Henderson in 1985 for Yankees...Trout also becomes the first player since Henderson's MVP campaign in 1990 to post an OPS of .990 and steal 30 bases and it's just the third such occurrence since 1923.



2016 marks Trout's fifth straight season with 25 doubles, five triples and 25 home runs, the longest such streak since Willie Mays 1956-60 and longest A.L. streak since Joe DiMaggio from 1936-41.



SABERMETRICS...

- According to Baseball Reference, finished last season with a Major League-leading 10.6 Wins Above Replacement (WAR)... Led the American League in that category for the fifth consecutive year, becoming the first player to lead his league WAR for five straight seasons since Babe Ruth.
- His 48.6 WAR is the best ever by a player before their age-25 season, just ahead of Ty Cobb (46.7) and Mickey Mantle (40.9).
- 2016 represents his second career 10+ WAR season...Only Ted Williams had more 10+ WAR campaigns (3) in his first five full seasons.



On Baseball Reference, led the league in runs created (147) for the fourth consecutive season... Finished the year leading Jose Altuve (2nd in A.L.) by 12 RC, the largest differential between first and second in A.L. since 2006.



SILVER SLUGGER...

- Mike Trout was also named a recipient of the 2016 Louisville Slugger Silver Slugger Award which is given to the best offensive players at each position in both the American and National Leagues. The award is Trout's fifth consecutive honor and the 21st overall for the Angels.
- Trout joins Mike Piazza as the only players in Major League history to win the award (presented annually since 1980) in each of their first five full big league seasons.
- He is the first Angel to win the award five times, surpassing Vladimir Guerrero's previous Club record of four (2004-07).
- Trout is the youngest player in big league history to win the award five times and the first A.L. player to receive the honors in five consecutive seasons since Alex Rodriguez's six in a row spanning from 1998-03.
- Additionally, he is the 12th outfielder to win at least five Silver Sluggers at any point during their career.



ANGELS STAR NAMED 2016 SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR

Mike Trout was selected the 2016 Sportsman of the Year by the Los Angeles Sports Council.

Trout was honored at the 12th Annual LA Sports Awards in February at The Beverly Hilton Hotel.

The five-time All-Star was named the A.L.'s Most Valuable Player for the second time in his career (2014), batting .315 with 29 home runs, 100 RBIs and 30 stolen bases. He led the Majors in runs (123), walks (116) and on-base percentage (.441). In addition, he played his usual stellar defense in center field.

Recent Sportsman Award honorees include Clayton Kershaw, Chris Paul and Jonathan Quick.





More than 900 children with physical and intellectual disabilities from 40 Challenger Division Little League teams recently experienced the thrill of playing baseball at Angel Stadium in the 11th annual Bank of America "Challenger Classic."

Created through a partnership between the Angels Baseball Foundation and Bank of America, the Challenger Classic provides young players with the joy of playing America's favorite pastime alongside their baseball heroes and coaches, on the field at Angel Stadium.

Among those who participated in this year's Bank of America Challenger Classic were Angels bench coach Dino Ebel, hitting coach Dave Hansen, catching & information coach Steve Soliz, former Angels Bobby Grich, Chuck Finley, Justin Speier, Jerome Williams and Clyde Wright and Angels Chairman Dennis Kuhl. and discovered a group, Hearts 2 Honduras. It is a 501c3 that helps children in Honduras gain access to better education, personal needs for the kids and many other things in a country that is struggling.

After that first trip, I immediately fell in love with the group we went with — the people, the kids and the culture. Upon going back the second time, it was great having all of the kids running up to the van upon our arrival, pounding on the doors, remembering all of our names, and they had

Suyapa. This is easily my favorite place to spend time. The children here are so smart and receptive. They have been given very little chance to succeed in life. The homes are dirt floored and tin roofed, if they are lucky. The streets are some combination of stone, potholes and dirt. It's a city known for producing drug dealers and prostitution. Many of the kids are not wealthy enough to afford public school so they spend their time now at the learning center H2H has provided for them, learning English and

preparing to go into the workforce to provide for themselves and their families (if they can learn English, they have a much more likely chance at succeeding in a world that covets bilingual workers).

People here are hard working. Many work multiple jobs and late nights at a main factory making shirts (check your button up dress shirt as it is very likely to have been made in Honduras) or in the palm tree fields harvesting palm oil for many beauty products. Getting paid about five dollars a day, it is not your typical 9-5 shift either. It is very much a developed country in having electricity, running water, etc., but that does not mean it is like many people here think it is. There are obviously pockets of wealthy people with armed guards protecting their homes and belongings, but the majority of people have to be extremely diligent about their work and getting the things necessary to live.

I also don't go by myself (along with the other players). It means everything to me to know that I have a partner in life, Jordan, who is caring and compassionate. My wife is someone who four years ago was willing to take a trip to a third world country, with total strangers, knowing neither of us speak fluent Spanish. To go and totally radiate her positivity and love for others is awesome. We both have a little phrase of "Team Heaney." We always want to work as a team, operate as a team. That's what keeps us strong in our relationship and in my love for her.

She also loves that moment when we pull into Suyapa for the first time and the kids give us that special welcome. They truly love having people to help them, spend time with them, show love to them. Usually we end our trip playing baseball, frisbee, or soccer on an Army base where we have some open room to run and play. It is also safe there.

The most emotional part is always the goodbyes. Without fail you will have a child or two in your arms, tears running down their faces. Often the same for myself, not wanting to let them go. We struggle to explain to them in our broken Spanish that we will be back next year. Knowing that is only a consolation for a few minutes. But what we have done in

conjunction with other groups under the guidance of H2H building a learning center, as well as building the trust and relationships with these kids and families will hopefully provide happiness, growth and sanctuary to them even when we are gone.

Going forward, the baseball mission group is hoping to help rebuild some of the most desolate houses in Suyapa and be able to use our strength and stature to give some of these children the shelter they need when they aren't at the learning center. H2H also has a new project, Love and Learn 21, a project to equip children with Down syndrome the tools and education necessary to function in a society that isn't always accepting of their needs.

This is an excellent program! There are many other educational ventures that they have going on and ways to donate. Visit the website at hearts2honduras.org.

Andrew Heaney continues the rehab process following Tommy John surgery this past July and is likely to miss the entire 2017 season. The Oklahoma State University product was limited to one game last season and he started 18 contests for the Angels in 2015.





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
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
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
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








































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


























THE BIGA



The 2017 season marks the Halos' 52nd season at Angel Stadium, their home for 52 of their 57 seasons. After spending their first five years of existence playing at Wrigley Field and Chavez Ravine, the Angels landed in their new home in Orange County. Since opening the doors for its first exhibition game April 9, 1966, Angel Stadium has played host to some of the Club's memorable events including seven Western Division clinching games (1979,1982, 1986, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2014), three All-Star Games (1967, 1989 and 2010) and the 2002 World Series, including the Angels Game 7 victory over the San Francisco Giants to clinch the franchise's first championship. Angel Stadium has also seen several individual Halos leave their indelible marks on the game of baseball. Whether it be the four Angels no-hitters, Rod Carew's 3,000th hit, Reggie Jackson's 500th home run or Don Sutton's 300th win, Angel Stadium has housed some of Major League Baseball's most prestigious accomplishments.

Presently, Angel Stadium sits as baseball's fourth-oldest ballpark, trailing only Boston's Fenway Park, Chicago's Wrigley Field and Los Angeles' Dodger Stadium. Affectionately known as "The Big A", Angel Stadium has seen over 113 million fans pass through its gates since 1966, including a current stretch of 14 consecutive seasons of three million fans, a streak only the Angels and Yankees have achieved since 2003.

After an Aug. 31, 1964 groundbreaking ceremony, Anaheim Stadium, as it was originally known, was completed in 1966 at a cost of \$24 million. The facility's centerpiece was a giant A-frame scoreboard standing 230 feet high and was the source of the stadium's nickname.

With a seating capacity of 43,250, Anaheim Stadium was built with "Convenience, Comfort and Courtesy" in mind. Narrow foul territory areas and quickly rising decks gave fans an up-close view of the action. Gradually-inclined ramps, escalators, wide aisles and helpful ushers as

well as three surrounding free ways, 26 entrance lanes and 28 exit lanes into the air whenever an Angels player hit a home run. added to the Big A's accessibility.

Anaheim Stadium under went construction to enclose the stadium in 1979 for additional seating to accommodate the football Rams. Seating capacity was increased to 64,593 for baseball and more than 70,000 for football. A total of 108 executive style boxes were added to surround the rear of the Club Level. In addition to the Stadium Club, there were two other private dining areas designed for groups — the Stadium Pavilion and the Football Press Box.

At that time, the Big A board was preserved and moved to the edge of the parking lot adjacent to the Orange Freeway behind the right field area. When the Rams left for St. Louis, Anaheim Stadium's primary tenant remained the Angels, who originally signed a 35-year contract (through 2001). Renovations began Oct. 1, 1996, to revert the 30-year old structure back to a baseball only facility and the ballpark was renamed Edison International Field. The total cost for the stadium renovation was estimated at \$100 million and the project was completed in time for the Angels Opening Day, April 1, 1998. New enhancements were added all around the ballpark but perhaps the most noticeable is the center field waterfalls and rock formation that come together to form an "A". Settled inside the waterfall's rapids are water geysers that originally shot water

Other unique features of Angel Stadium include terraced bullpens in the outfield, widened concourses, new restroom and concession areas, family-oriented seating sections, state-of-the-art club-level and dugout-level suites, a youth-oriented interactive game area and landscaped courtyards (with statues in remembrance of Gene Autry and Michelle Carew).

In addition, Angel Stadium includes two full-service restaurants: The Knot Hole Club (a sports bar located at the club level down the right field line) and The Diamond Club (an upscale restaurant with outdoor seating on the field level behind home plate). In 2014, the newest luxury seating area was added to the ballpark with the opening of HALO, now known as the Kettle One Club.

During the 2016 offseason, Angel Stadium underwent additional upgrades, including new LED stadium lights. The following organizations were involved in implementing the transition of Anaheim Stadium into Angel Stadium: Walt Disney Imagineering, which served as the manager of the design and construction; HOK Sports Facilities Group and Robert A.M. Stern Architects, which were responsible for the architectural planning, design and renovation; and Turner Construction, which directed and provided construction services.



For years Darin Erstad and Troy Percival were together on a baseball field representing the Angels and applying their craft at the highest of levels.


Recently they reunited but the stakes were a little bit different.

END OF AN ERA




Jered Weaver's baseball career will continue and it will continue in Southern California. But it sure is strange seeing Weaver in anything but Angel Red.

Prior to the season, the long-time Halo hurler inked a one-year free agent deal with San Diego. Originally selected by the Angels out of Long Beach State University in the first-round (12th overall) of the 2004 amateur draft, the Northridge native won 150 games for the Angels while helping lead them to four

Weaver collected 150 victories and three top-five Cy Young Award finishes with the Angels. The victory total is second in franchise history, 15 shy of Chuck Finley's mark of 165 wins. Weaver also was a three-time All Star (2010, 2011 and 2012) and he twice led the A.L. wins, including a career-best 20 wins in 2012.

Weaver — who also had the rare opportunity to pitch with his brother Jeff on the Angels in 2006 — had a huge impact on the organization beyond his pitching exploits, which included a no-hitter on May 2, 2012 at Angel Stadium. His fierce competitive nature, and desire to win, is second to none which helped further endear him to Angels fans.

El Dominicano se convirtió en agente libre por primera vez despues de la temporada 2003, y firmó contrato de cinco años por \$70 millones de dólares con los Angels, donde jugó del 2004 al 2009. Arturo(Arte)Moreno fue el primer propietario Latino en las Grandes Ligas y Guerrero citó la ascendencia latina de Moreno como un factor que lo motivó para elegir a los Angels sobre otros equipos. En 2004 ganó el MVP(Jugador Más Valioso)de la Liga Americana. En esa temporada participó en 156 partidos bateando .337 con 39 cuadranguales y 126 carreras impulsadas y anotaba 124 carreras, número uno en la



Liga Americana. Ayudó a los Angels a ganar cinco títulos del Oeste en la Liga Americana en 2004, 2005, 2007, 2008 y 2009.



WORLD BASEBALL CLASSIC & THE ANGELS

The Angels were well represented at the recent World Baseball Classic (WBC), highlighted by shortstop Andrelton Simmons advancing to the Semifinal Round.

Simmons, a native of Curacao, suited up for the Netherlands. It marked his second appearance in the event after making his WBC debut in 2013. Simmons' team did not advance to the Final, however, losing to Puerto Rico in extra innings in the first of two Semifinal contests at Dodger Stadium.

Also participating in the WBC were pitchers Jose Alvarez, Yusmeiro Petit and Deolis Guerra of Venezuela. Samuel Holland (a player in the Angels minor league system) was part of the pitcher pool for Australia but his team/country did not advance far enough in the tourney to be added to their roster.

In addition, Angels coach Alfredo Griffin served in a similar role with the Dominican Republic, and Jose Mota served as a MLB Network analyst. Former Angel hurler Bert Blyleven was part of a special first pitch ceremony.

The United States won the 2017 World Baseball Classic over Puerto Rico in the Final in front of more than 50,000 fans. It marked the first WBC win by the U.S.



OWNERSHIP

ARTE AND CAROLE MORENO



In May of 2003, Carole and Arte Moreno were introduced as the third owners in Angels franchise history and their impact was immediate. The Moreno's have guided the franchise to six A.L. West Division titles and 14 consecutive

seasons drawing over three million fans, resulting in a total home attendance over 43 million in their tenure.

The Moreno's focus is balanced between baseball, business operations and fan experience. In 2009, the Halos were voted the top franchise in professional sports in "Fan Value and Experience" by voters in a fan poll by ESPN the Magazine. In the poll, the Angels ranked in the top three among Major League teams for 10 consecutive seasons (2003-2012).

Carole and Arte's support of the Angels Operations Department has culminated in key free agent signings of players such as three-time N.L. MVP Albert Pujols, nine-time Gold Glove outfielder Torii Hunter, 2009 World Series MVP Hideki Matsui, 2005 A.L. Cy Young Award winner Bartolo Colon, 2004 A.L. MVP Vladimir Guerrero, and several others. In 2014, the Moreno's signed two-time A.L. MVP Mike Trout to a six-year contract extension. Since purchasing the Club on May 22, 2003, the Angels have sported a 1212-1012 record (.545 winning pct.).

During the family's tenure, the organization has continued to cultivate players from its farm system. Their dedication has paid dividends in the development of significant players such as Trout, Gold Glove outfielder Kole Calhoun, Garrett Richards, C.J. Cron, Matt Shoemaker and Cam Bedrosian among several others.

Over the past 14 years, Carole and Arte have strengthened the Club's commitment to local communities and beyond. In January of 2004, the Moreno's established the Angels Baseball Foundation concentrating on investments in education, health care, arts & sciences and community-related youth programs to experience the positive attributes of baseball. The Angels Foundation distributes annual grants to various programs within

Southern California. In 2010, the Angels were privileged to host their third All-Star Game (also 1967 & 1989). In conjunction with MLB's All-Star Legacy Fund, the foundation funded renovation of softball fields at Anaheim's Pioneer Park (into the MLB Angels All-Star Complex) as well as the special-surfaced field for the Miracle League of Orange County for disabled youth. The foundation regularly donates tickets, memorabilia and ballpark experiences to the various groups and fundraisers.

In addition to their responsibilities with the Angels and various committees within MLB, the Moreno's were part of ownership of the former Single-A Salt Lake Trappers of the Pioneer League. Under their leadership, the Trappers won three championships. Carole and Arte were also original investors in the Arizona Diamondbacks (including their 2001 World Series championship) and in a partnered ownership of the NBA's Phoenix Suns.

The Moreno family is also active in their own philanthropic efforts. In 1997, Carole and Arte established the Moreno Family Foundation to support nonprofit organizations focusing on youth and education as well as investing in educational scholarships in K-8, high school and college. Their favorite charities include St. Vincent de Paul, St. Mary's Food, Bank the Barrow Neurological Institute, Boys & Girls Clubs, United Methodist Outreach Ministries (UMOM) family homeless shelters, American Heart Association and Fresh Start Women's Foundation. The Morenos were previously members of the Little League Foundation's Board of Trustees, which assists Little Leagues in every state and more than 70 other countries.

Carole was born in Reno, NV, and moved often as the daughter of a career Air Force man. She spent much of her youth in Fredonia, KS, and went on to earn a degree in journalism from the University of Kansas. Arte is native of Tucson, AZ, and served his country in Vietnam as a member of the U.S. Army. After his tour of duty, he attended the University of Arizona, graduating with a degree in marketing. In 2005, Time Magazine selected Moreno as one of the 25 Most Influential Hispanics in America.

Carole and Arte Moreno are parents of three children.



DENNIS KUHL, CHAIRMAN

Dennis Kuhl begins his 14th year with the Angels after joining the Club on November 10, 2003. He was initially appointed as the Angels' seventh President before a promotion to Club Chairman on Nov. 14, 2009. Kuhl's focus centers on renewed efforts in the area of civic affairs and community outreach. Kuhl also oversees the Angels'

flagship radio station KLAA AM830.

Under his leadership, the Angels have shown tremendous growth and advancement in key business initiatives, including sponsorship and marketing revenues, as well as nationwide expansion and promotion of the Angels' brand. Kuhl also played a key role in working with Major League Baseball in hosting of the 2010 All-Star Game.

Kuhl is actively involved in several Southern California charities. He serves as president of the "Light the Night" event which supports the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society and is a founding board member of The Pacific Club IMPACT Foundation/Lott Trophy. Kuhl works with Susan G. Komen for the Cure serving as a member of the Orange County Affiliate's Board of Directors and is one of the "Pink Tie Guys," a select group of advocates speaking out to find a cure for breast cancer. Additionally, he serves on the advisory boards for

the South County Outreach, Anaheim Performing Arts Center, Anaheim YMCA, Rivals For The Cure, Irvine Public School Foundation and the Angels Baseball Foundation Board of Directors.

A champion of community involvement, Kuhl's efforts span across Orange County and beyond. He is a member of the Board of Governors at Chapman University and on the executive committee for Cycle & Walk for the Cures. He is on the board of directors for several nonprofits: The Children's Education Foundation of Orange County, the Los Angeles Sports Council, Boys and Girls Club of Anaheim, The Tiger Woods Foundation, the Noble Vikings Charity of Orange County, the Literacy Project Foundation, Visit Anaheim and the Alzheimer's Association of Newport Beach & Co.

In 2014, Kuhl served as a co-chairperson for the United Cerebral Palsy Golf Classic and a co-chairperson for the annual Red, White & Greens Golf Tournament to benefit the Susan G. Komen Foundation.

A Boonton, N.J. native, Kuhl graduated from the University of Arizona in 1970 with a degree in business administration. In honor of his late father, he established the Bud Kuhl Wood Bat Invitational in 2007 with annual proceeds donated to local charities. In 2009, he was named the 'Business Man of the Year' by the Anaheim Chamber of Commerce. He currently resides in Newport Beach.



JOHN CARPINO, PRESIDENT

John Carpino was named the eighth president in Angels history on Nov. 14, 2009. At the age of 58, he oversees all areas of business, sales, marketing and communications. Carpino's top priority is the fan's value and experience in all areas of the game including concessions, merchandise, promotional items and ticketing. As the principal

executive in charge of business operations, he has helped the Halos welcome over three million fans through Angel Stadium turnstiles for 14 straight seasons. Carpino was also an integral part of the 2010 MLB All-Star Game, hosted at Angel Stadium, and was involved in the negotiations for the extension of the Club's television agreement with FOX Sports West.

The Chicago native continues to seek out ways to create value for Angel fans, focusing not only on the game inside the lines, but on the entire ballpark experience. Carpino has guided the Angel brand with a focus on affordable pricing and providing a quality family environment. Under his leadership, Carpino's team has also established Angel Stadium as one of the premiere destinations in California for non-baseball events such as concerts, Supercross, Monster Truck and corporate events.

As one of the initial executives Arte Moreno appointed after taking ownership of the Club, the 2017 season marks Carpino's 14th with the team, having previously held the position of senior vice president. Carpino has led the Angels to unprecedented financial growth in the sponsorship, marketing and ticketing divisions. He oversaw the general manager selection processes in 2011 & 2015 and has assisted in the acquisition of high-profile Angels such as Albert Pujols & Andrelton Simmons along with negotiating Jered Weaver's contract extension.

He has created a stronger, more viable partnership with Los Angeles based radio and television partners, and oversees KLAA AM830, the home of Angels Baseball. His vision and creativity have brought an emphasis on the Angels' heritage with a reintroduction of the Angels Hall of Fame with yearly inductees, the hosting of Angels Fan Fests and the celebration of the Angels 50th Anniversary. Popular giveaways have been provided including several Guinness© record-breaking items and items showcasing the continuing popularity of the Rally Monkey. His efforts continue to create a brand that connects socially and in sync with current cultural trends.

Carpino's promotion followed six seasons as the Club's Senior Vice President of Sales and Marketing during which he oversaw all aspects of marketing, promotions and ticket sales for the Angels. He began his professional career in 1982 in the billboard industry, including stints in Tucson, AZ; Chicago, IL; Phoenix, AZ and Los Angeles, CA. In 1985, he joined Moreno at Outdoor Systems, a billboard company (which later became Viacom Outdoor in 2000 and CBS Outdoor in 2005) and spent 18 years in the Phoenix and Los Angeles markets. Carpino oversaw \$200 million in sales for the western region.

Born in Chicago, IL, Carpino is a 1982 graduate of the University of Arizona with a degree in business administration. He currently serves on CHOC Children's Foundation Board of Directors and served for three years on the Executive Board for the Orange County United Way. He and his wife Elizabeth are involved in numerous charitable efforts throughout Southern California and support the Angels Baseball Foundation. John and Elizabeth have three children and reside in Laguna Beach.





BILL BEVERAGE, CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

Bill Beverage enters his 14th full season as the Angels Chief Financial Officer after joining the organization in Nov. 2003. As the Angels CFO, his duties include managing the day-to-day finances of the organization. Prior to his current position, Beverage served as both

controller and CFO during his 18-year career in the outdoor advertising industry. Before he entered the outdoor advertising industry, Beverage was an auditor with Arthur Young after graduating from the University of Alabama with a Bachelor of Science degree in accounting. Bill and his wife reside in Phoenix, AZ.



MOLLY JOLLY, SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION

Molly Jolly became the highest ranking woman in the Angels organization in just her third year with the team (2003) and remains an integral part of the primary operations of the Club. She is in her 17th season with the

Halos as Senior Vice President, Finance & Administration. Molly spent three years (2001-03) as director of finance for the Angels and Anaheim Ducks before her current appointment.

A native of Naples, FL, Jolly oversees all financial matters, including reporting and planning, budgeting, accounting, payroll, ticketing and strategic initiatives. She is also responsible for office administration, including human resources and information services. Additionally, she oversees financials at Angel Stadium for non-baseball events such as Supercross, Monster Jam and concerts.

Before joining the Angels and Ducks in 2001, Jolly spent 11 years working for the Atlantic Richfield Company (ARCO), including six years (1989-94) at ARCO

Alaska in Anchorage, serving as an Inventory Accountant, Financial Analyst and Electronic Commerce Manager. In 1994, Jolly was transferred to ARCO Corporate in Los Angeles where she worked as an Internal Control Advisor and Project Manager. She was promoted in 1996 to Financial Manager and Strategic Planning Senior Consultant for the ARCO Products Company, OJolly began her career in 1988 as an auditor for Arthur Anderson LLP in Boston, MA.

A 1988 graduate of Holy Cross with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics/ Accounting, Jolly graduated from the Anderson School at UCLA with a Masters degree in Business Administration in 1999. Jolly is a Board Member and 2nd Vice Chair for the Girl Scouts of Orange County and a Board Member and Treasurer for Friends of CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates), and a sustaining member of the Junior League of Orange County. In 2011, Jolly was nominated as 'Chief Financial Officer of the Year in Orange County' by the Orange County Business Journal. She and husband Burt reside in Villa Park, CA.



TIM MEAD, VICE PRESIDENT, COMMUNICATIONS



Tim Mead begins his 38th season in the Angels organization and 20th as Vice President of Communications. He oversees media relations, publicity and broadcasting for the Club.

Before his current appointment, Mead spent four seasons as assistant general manager (1994-97) under

former GM Bill Bavasi.

Mead, 58, began his career with the Angels as an intern in the public relations department in 1980. He was appointed director of media relations in 1985 and later assistant vice president of media relations in 1991. During his tenure in media relations, Mead and his staff have been responsible for the handling of media during the Angels' 1986, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2008, 2009 & 2014 postseason appearances, the 1989 and 2010 All-Star Games at Angel Stadium and the Halos memorable World Series run in 2002.

Mead was the recipient of the 2000 Robert O. Fishel Award for PR excellence, recognizing the "active non-uniformed representative of Major League Baseball whose ethics, character, dedication, service, professionalism and humanitarian efforts best represent the standards propounded by Robert O. Fishel." He was also honored in May 2005 with the first Distinguished Alumnus Award for Athletics by his alma mater Cal Poly Pomona. Mead was honored in 2012 by the American Diabetes Association and the Orange County

BILLY EPPLER, GENERAL MANAGER

Billy Eppler was named the 12th General Manager in Angels history on October 4, 2015, agreeing to a fouryear contract thru the 2019 campaign.

Eppler oversees all aspects of the Club's baseball operations and reports to Owner Arte Moreno.

"Billy's experience in the areas of scouting, player development and major league operations, in addition to his organizational and communication skills, were primary reasons for our decision. He is energetic, creative and has a tremendous passion for the game," said Moreno.

Within his first month on the job, Eppler orchestrated a deal with Atlanta to secure the game's top defender in shortstop Andrelton Simmons. During the 2015 Winter Meetings, he filled the need for a third baseman via trade with Washington for INF Yunel Escobar. With upgrades needed in left field and second base, Eppler again filled each void by trading for OF Cameron Maybin (Detroit) and INF Danny Espinosa (Washington) during the 2016 off-season.

Eppler, 41, is a native of San Diego, CA. He graduated from the University of Connecticut with a Finance Degree in 1998 and began his sports career as an intern in the Washington Redskins scouting department. He started

his baseball career with the Colorado Rockies organization, where he was hired in January, 2000 as an area scouting supervisor for Southern California. He would eventually join the front office as the Assistant Director of Pro Scouting & Player Development from 2003-04.

From 2004 thru 2015, Eppler worked his way up the New York Yankees baseball operations department. He was initially hired as Assistant Director of Baseball Operations, Nov. 1, 2004. Eppler would eventually be promoted to Director of Professional Scouting from 2006-09 and Senior Director of Professional Personnel from 2010-11. He finished his fourth season as Assistant General Manager and first as Vice-President in '15. His responsibilities for the Yankees and assisting General Manager Brian Cashman included player acquisitions, roster composition and management, staffing and personnel decisions, and player contract negotiations. In addition, he oversaw all phases and personnel in the Yankees' Major League and professional scouting departments both domestically and internationally.

Eppler credits Cashman for much of his professional growth during his time in New York. "I have the utmost respect for Brian and cannot thoroughly thank him for the guidance he has provided."

Eppler and wife Catherine have a son and reside in south Orange County.

STEVE MARTONE, ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Steve Martone (mar-TONE), 36, came to the Angels following nine years in baseball operations with the New York Yankees, including the 2009 World Championship campaign. From 2014-15, he has served as Yankees Manager of Professional Scouting.

Originally hired by New York in April of 2006 as a

baseball operations intern, Martone was promoted to Assistant of Baseball Operations in December that same year. In that capacity, he focused on player

tracking & data collection, research for arbitration & grievances as well as technology initiatives (iPad integration for players & coaches). In March of 2014, Martone was promoted to Manager, Professional Scouting where he dealt with 40-man roster composition, departmental budget, MLB depth charts and targeting of players.

The Houston, TX native graduated from the University of Houston in 2005. Martone and wife, Laura, have three children.



JONATHAN STRANGIO, ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Jonathan Strangio, 28, will enter his sixth year with the Angels in 2017, second as Assistant General Manager. Following the 2014 season, Strangio moved up to Manager, Major League Operations where his responsibilities included 40-man roster construction, rules and CBA compliance, baseball analytics, salary arbitration, and

contract negotiation. He joined the Club as a baseball operations intern

in 2012 before a promotion to Coordinator, Baseball Operations after the 2012 campaign.

MANAGERIAL OVERVIEW



Danny Espinosa is back home again for the first time.

It's less than seven miles from Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana where Espinosa prepped to Angel Stadium where he will play second base this season, but it's 2,284 miles from his former major league home in Washington D.C. to Southern California.

The road may have been short from Santa Ana to Anaheim but the journey was long from the National League East to the American League West. From the Lincoln Memorial to Disneyland. The White House to the Matterhorn. From one ex-Dodger in manager Dusty Baker to another ex-Dodger in manager Mike Scioscia.

But Danny Espinosa is not complaining about the trip.

Espinosa has described his feelings moving from coast to coast as "ecstatic" and "refreshing." With his new club he has a definitive role as the Angels' everyday second baseman. His future was unsure in D.C. with some roster shuffling in this past offseason which included the rise of a youngster and the acquisition of a veteran.

And that's what makes it refreshing for


And that's what makes it refreshing for the switch-hitting veteran in this his eighth Major League season.

Espinosa brings an excellent glove — with a strong throwing arm — and unusual power for that position, having hit 24

home runs in 2016, a career high (Angels Hall of Famer Bobby Grich holds the Angel record for most home runs in a season by a second baseman with 30 in 1979). Espinosa also drove in 72 runs, far more than the 31 RBIs produced by the Angels primary second baseman of a season ago.

Espinosa also brings his beard. His semi-famous beard. It's more than a major league beard, it's an All-Star beard, maybe a Hall of Fame beard. Think Brian Wilson. The beard generated a buzz at the start of spring training when headlines and stories were scarce. Pitcher Matt Shoemaker, the reigning beard champ of the Angels, will have to grow to some great lengths to catch Espinosa.

Espinosa usually shaves the beard prior to the regular season and when asked about his intentions this spring he replied: "Yes, I think I will [shave it]. Most likely it will be gone at some point here soon."

The 29-year-old (he'll turn 30 on April 25) infielder was acquired by the Angels on December 11 for a pair of minor league pitchers — Kyle McGowin and Austin Adams. There's little doubt he's an upgrade at second for the Angels, both defensively and from a power standpoint.

A third-round pick in the 2008 draft out of Long Beach State (the alma mater for, among others, Jered Weaver, Troy Tulowitzki and Evan Longoria), Espinosa also brings

much coveted versatility. He was Washington's regular shortstop a year ago and in 2015 played first base, second base, third base, shortstop and left field.

His 2017 season will, in all likelihood, help dictate his future in the game — both the team he will be playing for and the position he will play. He's in the last year of his contract and will be a free agent at season's end.

With the glove he is solidly proficient at the double play, having turned 325 as a second baseman and another 128 as a shortstop. In seven seasons, he has a fine .989 fielding average. In his most extended time at second in 2015, he played 81 games and made only one error.

In Anaheim, of course, he'll have a new partner in Gold Glove shortstop Andrelton Simmons. He'll also have a familiar face in the infield — third-baseman Yunel Escobar was a teammate in Washington in 2015.

"We're working together each day in Arizona," he said about his new double-play partner back just prior to the start of this 2017 season. "He's a special talent. I love watching him do his thing.


"You have to learn the rhythm of the turn and where you like the ball," he told the Orange County Register. "At shortstop,

everything is in front of you. At second base, everything is behind you. It's a little bit of an adjustment, but once you get the timing down and get the arm slot down where you want it for double plays, that's the biggest thing. For me, it's just about getting into a position so I can be consistent.

"I am looking forward to the year."

"It's going to make some things we do on the defensive side easier," Scioscia said of the Espinosa addition. "I think those guys are going to show the range and athleticism we haven't had there in a while."





between the Dodgers and the White Sox. The Angels don't share a stadium. Last year I went to a game at the Athletics' complex. In all I have been to three different stadiums there.

Unfortunately, the Angels lost both games. Interestingly enough the first loss broke a record the Angels had going. They had not lost any of their last 18 Cactus League games. I am not taking responsibility for the loss, but I sort of felt like a jinx or a bad luck charm.

While we were at the Angel games, I got to take part in two unique experiences. One was as a bat girl for the game in Tempe and the other was a Junior Reporter assignment for *Angel Magazine*.

As bat girl, I worked near the Angels dugout and retrieved the bats and balls from the field. I did this with some other great kids who also were on the Angels side. Interviewing the player — catcher Martin Maldonado — for *Angel Magazine* was really fun too. He had some funny responses to my questions that I won't forget. That story will run later this season.

After the second game was over we drove home. We saw other cars along the road with Angels bumper stickers so they too were probably heading home. I think we all were looking forward to the start of the regular season which was quickly approaching. I know I was also looking forward to seeing my pets again.

Overall, Spring Training was so much fun and I love going every year! If you have not gone I would definitely encourage you to go.

THROUGHOUT THE SEASON FORMER ANGELS PITCHER CLYDE WRIGHT SHARES SOME OF HIS FAVORITE MEMORIES IN ANGEL MAGAZINE

uring the spring I had the opportunity to be a special guest of the Angels for a few days in Spring Training in Tempe, Arizona. It was my first time being in uniform since I retired as a player and I had a blast. It was the best time I have had in the last 20 years.

Wearing that uniform again was like 50 years ago when I was participating in Spring Training. I even left this camp with a new nickname — courtesy

of Mike Trout, Albert Pujols and Kole Calhoun — and an even greater appreciation for today's athlete.

When I played in the big leagues, Spring Training was so very different. I actually never participated in Spring Training in Arizona. When I was with the Angels our camp was in California, split between Holtville and Palm Springs. We would spend three weeks in Holtville, which is near El





Centro, and all we could do was count down the days before we could move to Palm Springs. On that last day in Holtville we didn't even take a shower after the game. It was all about getting in the car and getting out of there.

In Holtville all we had was a bowling alley. It was all farmland. In Palm Springs, that was a destination. You have the beautiful golf courses, great places to go out and have dinner. The bars were better and the atmosphere there at that time was magnified with spring break and the nearby colleges.

The compensation for a big league player of course back then was very different than it is now. When I played the bulk of the players had offseason jobs. I sold cars for a few of those offseasons. You might make a few bucks speaking at a banquet but that was about it. I think that all changed when the money changed.

Once that occurred, guys knew they had to stay in shape to keep their jobs. Now guys spend their offseasons getting ready for Spring Training. When I played, Spring Training was the time to get into shape.

There is nothing better than getting the chance to play baseball at this level for a living and what these facilities look like now is flat-out amazing. Tempe is about 10,000 times better than Holtville and the accommodations just don't compare to when I played. How is it different? Here is a one-word answer: Omelets.

Yes, that is right. Omelets. You show up to the clubhouse and there is food everywhere. As for fitness in Tempe there were weight machines and treadmills. We did not have any of that. We would ride our bikes from the

team hotel to the baseball field in Palm Springs to get our exercise. After the game we would ride the bikes back.

Those were great times, but so too was Spring Training in 2017. I got to spend time in coach's meetings and I observed how the entire process worked. For the fans reading this who think they know baseball, trust me, I have a whole new respect for how hard these players work and how hard the staff there works. It is amazing what goes into running a ball club. I never saw it that way because as a player I had a narrow focus. This opportunity allowed be to see the big picture. We are talking about 70 players and all the activity that goes with that, but it is a well-oiled, finely-tuned machine.

Another thing I will never forget is when Mike, Albert and Kole dubbed me Grandpa. We were on the field one day and some kids in the stands were yelling "Grandpa" over and over. Kole for one thought it was pretty funny that I was being called Grandpa. Now look, I am 74 years old, and I was known as Skeeter back in the day, but those kids hollering "Grandpa" were my actual grandkids who were in town with my family.

All in all, I can't describe the way I was treated. They treated me like I was one of the boys again, like I was there to make the club. That was super and a real great treat.

Clyde Wright won 100 games in the big leagues over a career which spanned 10 seasons, including eight with the Angels from 1966-73. The 1970 season was his best as he won 22 games, was named to the All-Star team and tossed a no-hitter, the first in Angel Stadium.

The Angels last season reached the 3 million mark in home attendance for the 14th consecutive season. The active streak is currently matched only by the New York Yankees (18 consecutive seasons).

The Halos are one of seven Clubs to draw over 3 million fans through their gates in 2016, joining the Blue Jays, Cardinals, Cubs, Dodgers, Giants and Yankees. Additionally, the Angels average attendance per home game of 37,506 ranked third in the American League, trailing only the Blue Jays and Yankees.

The 2016 campaign also saw the Angels top both their overall attendance (3,012,747) and average home game attendance (37,194) from the 2015 campaign, and since joining the American League in 1961, the Angels have seen more than 117 million fans attend their home games, a mark bested only by the New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox.
