I hope that the days that lie between us and a new Jewish year will bring many opportunities for us to reflect seriously on the ways we may better ourselves in the year 5779.

This year, August 12th is the first day of the Hebrew month of Elul. Elul is traditionally understood to be the beginning of the High Holy Day season.

But there is no need to start shopping for apples and honey just yet; Elul invites us to undertake internal, rather than external, preparation for the holidays.

It scarcely bears repeating that ours is a hyper-connected world, where we can remain firmly and instantly connected with friends and family all over the world. The omnipresence of digital technology and social media means that we can contact virtually anyone we have ever known, at virtually any time, for virtually any reason. Most times this is a great benefit – we can reconnect with long-lost friends, do business with colleagues and clients all around the world, and access nearly the entirety of human knowledge with little more than a few keystrokes. now become ubiquitous in the Jewish world: the "Facebook apology." "Facebook apologies" are the now-common practice of issuing generic and blanket apologies to one's whole social network. They are easy to identify in social media posts, generally beginning with phrases like "To anyone I have offended, I am truly sorry..." or "If I have hurt you over the past year, I apologize..." Those who issue "Facebook apologies" do so, I believe, because they offer a relatively safe and easy way to fulfill this Jewish season's mandate to acknowledge one's missteps and apologize for them. Jewish tradition and our sages' teachings caution us, however, against using this particular technique to effect the work of repentance as the High Holy Days approach.

The great Rabbi Moses Maimonides, in his 12th century masterwork the Mishneh Torah, is careful to stipulate that while one is free to acknowledge publicly that one has sinned, one's work of apology and restitution must be undertaken personally and directly with the people one has hurt. This teaching is especially salient in our current day, when the ease of digital communication makes it simple for us to symbolically perform our apologies online while avoiding the more difficult – and far more important – act of connecting openly with those whom we have wronged in order to seek their forgiveness.

The month of Elul is nearly here, and the High Holy Days are close behind. I hope that the days that lie between us and a new Jewish year will bring many opportunities for us to reflect seriously on the ways we may better ourselves in the year 5779. Only by willingly accepting their invitation for self-reflection, and only by bravely reaching out personally to those we have hurt during 5778, can we move our own souls toward a higher spiritual rung and our community toward a more humble and compassionate future.

It was a novel concept that was not only a success, but, inspired congregants to volunteer and participate in this community for the first time, and it was truly exciting for me to witness. This was the beginning of something very meaningful and fulfilling that has lead me down this sacred journey to ultimately leading this congregation.

While I personally have enjoyed every second, here is your chance to also reconnect and find something that may interest you. We have numerous committees and subcommittees that are in need of new faces, ideas, and leadership. Here is the list of committees and a brief explanation of their roles and responsibilities. "when you volunteer, you vote every day about the kind of community you want to live in."

- ADULT EDUCATION Assists temple's education staff and clergy in their work to provide meaningful, relevant and fulfilling experiences of adult Jewish learning for our members and the larger community.
- **BROTHERHOOD** Focused on programming for the congregation, the Brotherhood plans fundraisers that benefit the congregation, social events and other fun activities.
- BUDGET & FINANCE This committee oversees the finances of the congregation and has several components. The finance committee meets three or four times each year during the non-budget cycle to review finances, assist the professional staff and make recommendations. The budget committee, which is typically many of the same people, works on the congregational budget each year in three or four meetings (typically December March) in conjunction with the staff. The audit committee is involved with the annual audit each year and has two or three meetings.
- BUILDING, GROUNDS & SECURITY This overarching committee oversees the building and grounds of our beautiful congregation and also includes a security subcommittee. The security subcommittee typically meets three or four times each year and the building and grounds work is year-round, but rarely in the form of regular meetings. The group convenes as projects need expertise and attention.
- **CEMETERY** One of the Emanu El's shining stars is Emanu El Memorial Park (EEMP). The cemetery committee sets policy and oversees the care of our beautiful property on Bissonnet St. Meetings of the cemetery committee are typically monthly.
- **EARLY CHILDHOOD** Supports the work of the Becker School as well as programmatic offerings including worship, learning, and community-building for children younger than kindergarten.
- **INCLUSION** We continually work to make sure that our building is accessible to all people, regardless of any physical limitations. The Inclusion Committee meets a few times each year to focus on areas that may require adjustment or improvement.
- **INVESTMENT** The investment committee manages and monitors the investments of the congregation including the endowment and EEMP perpetual care fund. They meet quarterly.
- ISRAEL Assists with logistical support for the Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience trip, and works with program staff to plan and implement educational, cultural, religious and political programming that promote Emanu El's warm and longstanding relationship with the Jewish State.

- **LEADERSHIP** This committee plans training for new Board Members each year. It also works to identify and build a pipeline of future leaders for the congregation by running a Leadership Academy. This committee typically meets three or four times each year for planning purposes.
- **LEGACY** This group is working to increase the number of congregational families who are part of our Leave a Jewish Legacy program. The ultimate goal is to have families leave Congregation Emanu El in their end-of-life giving plans. There are typically a few meetings each year, plus a few community trainings.
- MANAGEMENT & PERSONNEL This group meets a few times each year, plus when there are personnel matters that need to be considered. They also work on projects such as updating the Personnel Handbook and reviewing benefits available to staff.
- MEMBERSHIP & OUTREACH This committee is focused on recruiting, welcoming and maintaining a strong membership within the congregation. Meetings are typically three or four times each year, plus participation in various membership-based events.
- **RELIGIOUS SCHOOL COMMITTEE** Focused on how to grow and improve the Helfman Religious School program, the Religious School Committee meets through the year to both create and support programming in the school.
- RITUAL & MUSIC This committee provides a safe and supportive place for members of the clergy to explore and evaluate our religious and musical offerings, and assists in the setting of policy for prayer, life-cycle and Shabbat/holiday services. Members of this committee are added by invitation.
- **SISTERHOOD** The Emanu El Sisterhood has a longstanding history of providing outstanding programming and fundraising and works to build strong relationships with the women of Emanu El.
- **SOCIAL ACTION** Social Action has been a vital part of Emanu El's identity and our mission to the larger community. This committee works with temple staff and assists in the strategy, planning and evaluation of programs for education, advocacy and volunteerism to uphold the Jewish values that underpin our congregation's holy work.

With your feedback, we will be launching a new leadership committee, lead by our immediate past President Jeff Basen-Enquist. The purpose of the committee is to identify and cultivate new potential leaders. The future success of this congregation not only depends on our committees functioning at a high level but also having a strong and thoughtful succession plan in place. Please be a part of this exciting community as we prepare for our 75th and beyond.

HIGH HOLY DAY ADMISSIONS PASSES

Your passes and two guest passes will be enclosed with the High Holy Days packet that will be mailed out the second week of August. We encourage you to offer the guest passes to anyone who might like to attend a single High Holy Day service. Please note that these passes may not be used on Kol Nidre. We accept passes from other congregations and also welcome armed services personnel, college students with ID, and out-of-town patients receiving treatment in the Texas Medical Center, along with their families. If you know someone who has moved to Houston within the last six months, please contact Jill Kaplan at (713) 529-5771 or JillK@emanuelhouston.org to arrange for a newcomer pass.

GOING OUT OF TOWN FOR HIGH HOLY DAYS? LET US HELP YOU!

Will you be out of town for Rosh HaShanah and/or Yom Kippur? Through our affiliation with the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ), our Congregation enjoys "reciprocity" with hundreds of synagogues nationally.

Please contact the synagogue office at (713) 529-5771 to speak to a member of the synagogue staff about reciprocity. We will work with our partner synagogues to ensure your seat at your destination synagogue.

PARKING

Only individuals with High Holy Days passes or handicap placards will be allowed entry to the Emanu El campus. All parking on Floors 1 and 2 of the Gaylor Parking Facility will be reserved for handicap-accessible use. The West Lot is reserved for Rabbi's Circle members with a required pass. Because there is limited garage parking on Floors 3 and 4, we encourage you to park at satellite locations. Buses will run continually from the satellite parking lots to and from Emanu El.

For Erev Rosh HaShanah and Kol Nidre, park at the Medical Clinic of Houston, 1707 Sunset. The parking garage entrance is on Rice Blvd. On Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur Day, park at Rice University. Due to construction on the west side of the Rice campus, we will use the Rice South Stadium Lot (with overflow in the Greenbriar Lot). A special entrance to the South Stadium Lot will be open between Gates 8 and 9, specifically for our Emanu El guests. This entry point is located off University Blvd. between Montclair and Stockton. Please note that the construction project on Greenbriar between Holcombe and University will still be in progress during the High Holy Days and guests are encouraged to avoid Greenbriar from south of University.

CHILD CARE

Child care for children aged 15 months to 8 years is available during all High Holy Day services, with the exception of the 5:30 p.m. Rosh HaShanah service. Registration and advance payment MUST be received so that we can prepare for the appropriate number of caregivers. The cost is \$10 per service per child. A light

snack will be provided; however, children with allergies are encouraged to bring their own snacks. Registration deadline for Rosh HaShanah is **Wednesday**, **September 5th**; Yom Kippur registration deadline is **Friday**, **September 14th**. SPECIAL NEEDS ACCESSIBILITY

For wheelchair or disability accessibility, please contact Elizabeth Townsend at (713) 529-5771, ext. 222 or ElizabethT@emanuelhouston.org and include the services you plan to attend. Preferred seating will be provided to those who give advanced notice. Those requesting special needs seating may be granted a maximum of four additional seats for family members. Special needs seating will be released 15 minutes prior to the beginning of services. Rosh HaShanah deadline for requests is Wednesday, September 5th; Yom Kippur deadline for requests is Friday, September 14th.

HEARING LOOP

The Barish Sanctuary is equipped with an Induction Loop System, which transmits audio signals directly to one's telecoil (T-coil)-equipped hearing aid.

CLOSED CAPTIONING

Brotherhood provides closed captioning for our High Holy Day worshipers who are hearing impaired. The Brotherhood provides this service at all on-site Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur services with the exception of the children's services.

BOOK OF MEMORY

By the time of this Bulletin's arrival in your email or mail, the deadline for **Book of Memory** will have passed. Due to this publication being handled outside of the synagogue, we have to abide by the deadline. The **Book of Memory** will be distributed on Yom Kippur afternoon as worship goers return to the Barish Sanctuary for Hineini: Confessions and Comfort for Today's World.

HIGH HOLY DAY BOOK NAMEPLATES

This coming year will be the second in which we have utilized Mishkan NaNefesh, the Reform Movement's new prayer books for the High Holy Days. The books based on the post-High Holy Day survey were very well received.

Congregants have an opportunity to dedicate individual volumes (or sets) in honor or in memory of those who are dear to us. Information on purchasing nameplates can be


Snakes Visit Becker School!

A Letter from Stefani Carlson



As I write this message, I am still feeling the excitement of having spent the last four weeks in Poland and Israel with 26 of our rising 11th and 12th graders on the Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience.

Each day of this amazing journey was filled with learning and laughter – and some tears – as we relived more

than 1,000 years of Jewish history through visits to sites as ancient as the tunnels beneath the Temple Mount and as modern as Warsaw's brand-new POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews, and looked to a bright Jewish future through visits with members of the Krakow JCC and countless Israeli innovators.

Along the way, we built strong bonds of community between students, faculty and clergy, upon which we look forward to building in the school year to come.

We were fortunate to be joined by several visitors on our journey, as well, two of which gave our students glimpses into what their own Jewish futures might hold: Helfman alumna Noa Gutow-Ellis met with us in Krakow, where she is interning at the Galicia Jewish Museum, and SBMIE14 alumni Aaron Feldstein and Adam Dreyfus took time out of their Masa Israel internships to meet us for dinner in Jerusalem.

The group was particularly glad to meet up with David Barish twice during our time in Israel: for lunch and a tour of the Roman ruins at Caesaria, and for a visit to the Armored Corps Museum at Latrun and our closing drum circle and dinner in Abu Gosh.

We cannot begin to express our gratitude to the Barish family, whose generosity makes this transformative experience possible for our students.

As powerful as the Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience is, the trip is only one of many chapters in the stories that our Helfman Religious School students

write during their time in our school.

This coming year, as our congregation prepares to celebrate its 75th anniversary, we will be encouraging our students and families to tell "Our Emanu El Stories" in many different ways. From Consecration to Graduation, B'nei Mitzvah to Confirmation, Second Grade Torah Project to Fourth Grade Wedding, and everything in between, we look forward to celebrating together the milestones, big and small, that frame our stories and build our community.

The best stories blend the familiar with the new. Our plans for the coming Religious School year do the same. We are excited to welcome back many beloved teachers and programs, and to introduce a few new ones as well. The presentation will feature the Director of the Kinder Institute.

William Fulton and occurs just three days before a Harris County bond election in which residents will be asked to approve \$2.5 billion to finance critical flood-control projects.

The bond election takes place on the one-year anniversary of Hurricane Harvey and should it pass would include more than 150 potential projects according to the Harris County Flood Control District.

In his career, Fulton has also served as vice president for policy at Smart Growth America, principal in the California-based urban planning firm now known as PlaceWorks and senior fellow at the Sol Price School of Public Policy at the University of Southern California.

He is the founding editor and publisher of California Planning & Development Report and author of five books, including, Guide to California Planning, the standard urban planning textbook in California, and The Reluctant Metropolis: The Politics of Urban Growth in Los Angeles, which was an L.A. Times best-seller. His most recent book is, Talk City: A Chronicle Of Political Life In An All-American Town. He holds master's degrees in mass communication from The American University and urban planning from UCLA.

Cleaning the Headstone of a Loved One

As the High Holy Days near, many of us plan visits to our loved ones who are no longer living, including during the Cemetery Memorial Service, which takes place on **Sunday**, **September 16th at 5:00 p.m**.

Before the service, or at any point throughout the year, you may want to take special care of your loved one's grave, particularly cleaning the headstone. Cleaning the headstone is fairly simple and straightforward, and just one of the ways that we fulfill the mitzvah of kavod hamet, respect for the dead. We've provided simple steps and explanations below to help guide you.

EQUIPMENT NEEDED:

- Medium bristle brush for scrubbing
- Garden hose (stored at Emanu El Memorial Park)
- Spray bottle filled with 50/50 mix of bleach and water OR spray bottle with water only if anything is affixed to the stone (porcelain picture, Holocaust survivor medal, etc.)
- STEP 1: Soak headstone with garden hose. If there is mud on the headstone, scrub it down with the brush.
- STEP 2: Spray with bleach mix and let sit for a few minutes. Then scrub the stone softly with scrub brush.

STEP 3: Rinse with garden hose. Bleach mix will likely splash, so keep that in mind and wear clothing that you don't mind if they get bleached or ruined.

For those who are planning to visit Emanu El Memorial Park before the Cemetery Service, we will leave all of the garden hoses out on the two Sundays prior (September 2nd and 9th). If you are planning to visit and clean headstones at another time, please just let Alisha Klapholz know (alishak@emanuelhouston.org, (713) 529-5771, ext. 213 and we will ask the caretaker to leave a garden hose out for you.

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
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
