FROM THE PRESIDENT

Rodney Roth spoke at Leadership Shabbat on Friday, May 4th on the occasion of his installation as President. His remarks can be found below.

The year was 1925, in a small European town. The streets, narrow and lined with cobblestones, were bustling with activity, as a small Jewish community prepared for Shabbat. The smell of fresh challah and strudel filled the air; sweet wine for the Kiddish was brought in from local vineyards.

This was not your typical Shabbat, as the seeds of anti-Semitism and bigotry were starting to sprout. This small town of Hessloch, Germany, had a synagogue that was the focal point of Jewish life. My maternal grandmother, Erna, and her cousin, Ernest Krautkopf, hustled to shul to

song, Uf Gozal [Fly, Hatchling]. The song imagines a mother bird encouraging her chicks to spread their wings and take to the sky for the first time. The song was (and still is) a stirring and influential part of modern Israeli culture, where all children must "leave the nest" for their compulsory military service after high school. Here in America, of course, we are spared that particular difficulty, but the work of parenthood is still always an exercise in the skill of letting go gracefully.

This month, parents throughout our congregation and our city are sending their children off to college, to first jobs, to summer camps, on trips with friends, and on solo vacations for the first time. Even though we all were eager for our own adventures when we were younger, it is a poignant sensation to say good bye as our children "leave the nest." As Einstein sings: "I know that this is nature's way / I left my own nest too / But now that the time has come / There's a small lump in my throat."

This summer will also bring us the opportunity to send off another group of eager teen participants in the Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience. Their travels in Poland and Israel will be unforgettable as they share this lifechanging experience in their Jewish lives. I hope that you will join us at Shabbat services on Friday, June 8th at 6:00 p.m. to bless these students and offer our prayers together for a safe journey and a safe return to their homes and their families. I am comforted by the knowledge that these students – and all of Emanu El's kids who are embarking on their own adventures this summer – will be held up by our blessings and good wishes as they take to the sky.

listen to my great-grandfather, Joseph, about to address the congregation for the first time as the recently elected president of his congregation.

While no one could imagine the horrific atrocities facing this community in the years to come, the one similarity that I would like to reflect on is the importance of their Jewish heritage and serving their sacred community. Just like my parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents, I am answering the call to serve my community and help to lead us forward. Thankfully, my grandparents were fortunate enough to escape Nazi Germany and eventually settled in Houston, where they along with several other families, many of which are represented here tonight, understood the sanctity of their Jewish heritage and decided to found a new congregation – Emanu El. My multi-generational connection to this congregation and our dedication to its future is what inspired me to take a leadership role in this amazing community.

Now, the big question is why did I take on the role of the presidency, including all of the responsibilities and headaches that come with it? As Rabbi Silk responded, I guess you could say that this is a part of my 'kishkes.' My mother insists that my leadership journey started back in my religious school days as I was a frequent visitor to Mr. Reingold's office, and not by choice.

But seriously, as I embark upon the presidency of this sacred congregation, my aspirational goal is that every congregant finds their place. The opportunities are many – whether through learning, Sisterhood, Brotherhood, or whatever sparks your interest. We must offer opportunities to help all of us live our individual and collective Jewish journeys. The questions that we will try to answer together will be: how do we reconnect with congregants, and how do we bring new ones through those sacred doors? How do we serve as a model for adult Jewish life? And how do we make sure that your sacred home has all the features you desire?

"People often avoid making decisions out of fear of making a mistake. Actually, the failure to make decisions is one of life's biggest mistakes." – Rabbi Noah Weinberg

I love this quote because it inspires us to keep taking risks in order to grow. I want to be able to keep climbing even after I fall, and have the courage to fail and keep

A year to reconnect our rich history with our dreams for the future. I would like to thank Cheryl Levy and Elyse Kalmans for taking the lead in what should be an exciting calendar year of events.

In conclusion, I would like to thank my parents for always being patient, and loving, and instilling in me the importance of Jewish values. I would also like to thank my wife Robin who I met on a trip to Israel in 1995 and has been my love and support ever since. I am lucky to have an in-house counsel who always provides a listening ear and sound advice. I would like to thank my children, Gavin and Cameron, for your love and patience as I take on this new leadership role. I would like to thank our outgoing and incoming Boards for the time and dedication you have given to our congregation. And lastly, I would like to thank all of you, for entrusting me with this opportunity to serve our sacred community.

So, as we embark on this path together, our 74th year as a congregation, may it be filled with reconnection, growth, and celebration. Amen.

A Note from Rabbi Hayon

This message from Rabbi Oren Hayon was emailed to the congregation on Wednesday, May 16th.

Dear friends,

I'm writing you today at the request of Rabbi Walter, who has asked that I share the following information with you about his health.



Beginning this week, Rabbi Walter will be undergoing a regimen of medical treatment for a form of sarcoma cancer that his medical team recently discovered and diagnosed. The doctors are confident that a cure is very likely given this prompt course of treatment, and Rabbi Walter and his

family are feeling very optimistic as well.

At this time, I want to emphasize that what Rabbi Walter needs and wants most from our congregation are our prayers and good wishes. If you want to reach out personally to him and Linda, the best way to do so will be for you to send a card to his attention here at the Temple, and we will see that it is passed along to him directly.

Because of the demands of his medical treatment, Rabbi Walter's availability for Temple and lifecycle events over the coming weeks and months will be somewhat diminished. I am thankful in advance for your understanding of this reality, and for your flexibility in the case that another member of the clergy team may need to step in to fulfill any commitments already on his calendar. I am grateful for your willingness to join in our efforts to be as supportive as possible of Rabbi Walter and his family during this time.

I know that all of you join me in my heartfelt prayers that Rabbi Walter's treatment will be successful, and that he will enjoy a complete recovery and return speedily to us in full strength. Our faith and optimism will be a great support to him and Linda as they move forward with full confidence in a successful outcome of this challenging time.

Daily Minyan to Conclude June 14th

After considerable evaluation, deliberation, and in-depth conversations with the congregation's Ritual & Music Committee and the Board of Trustees, we have made the difficult decision to discontinue the daily service, effective Thursday, June 14th.

This decision was made after an extended process of analysis confirmed that, in a majority of instances, the service attracts one or fewer attendees. This information tells us clearly that, while this service has felt important and meaningful to some, the vast majority of our members are not inclined to attend a weekday worship service at Temple.

Maintaining a worship service with near-zero attendance is both a poor use of resources and an indicator that we need to explore other strategies of offering an affirming worship experience for those who are in mourning or remembering a loved one on their yahrzeit.

Emanu El Exploring Ride Share Program to Improve Congregants' Access to Worship, Programming

For the last several months, Congregation Emanu El leadership has been working with a company called Envoy America to establish a low-cost ride share program that will pair a skilled driver companion with senior members of our Congregation who are unable to drive themselves safely to Temple.


A nationally-recognized company, Envoy America provides mature, trained, secured driver companions that assist seniors in staying connected, independent, and safe.

Emanu El has had several members test Envoy America's service and they have reported positive feedback that has encouraged us to take the next step. In order to help minimize costs for the participants with the assistance of synagogue subsidies, we are seeking to compile a list of individual(s) that would be interested in taking advantage of this service. By enabling the drivers to make multiple stops in a single neighborhood en route to worship and/or programs, the costs and efficiency of the service become ideal for all participants.

Moonglow,
by Michael Chabon

Come join Rabbi Josh Fixler as he reviews Moonglow, by Michael Chabon on Thursday, July 12th at 6:30 p.m. In 1989, Chabon traveled to his mother's home, in Oakland, California, to visit his terminally-ill grandfather. Tongue loosened by powerful painkillers, memory stirred by the imminence of death, Chabon's grandfather shared recollections the younger

man had never before heard, uncovering bits and pieces of a history long-forgotten. From pre-WWII South Philadelphia, to the invasion of Germany by U.S. forces, from a Florida retirement village, to New York's Wallkill prison, from the heyday of the space program, to the twilight of the 20th century, the novel revisits an entire era through a single life.

A Note from Stefani Carlson, Director of Congregational Learning:





