FROM RABBI HAYON



Though they support a peace agreement in principle, most young Israelis feel resigned to a future in which most young Israelis feel resigned to a future in which they will never know peace with their neighbors.

My summer of enriching and educational travel continues, and I am writing this month's Bulletin article from Jerusalem. where I am proud to be participating in a rabbinic seminar sponsored by the American Israel Education Foundation.

During this week-long intensive trip, the AIEF has brought together a group of 17 North American rabbis from across the denominational spectrum for a rigorous schedule of lectures and tours. Our itinerary eschews the standard religious and historic sites here; instead, we are spending our (very long!) days with officials from Israel's government and military, and with a number of representatives of economic, cultural, religious and social welfare institutions.

The seminar comes at a time of uncertainty here: the coalition in the Knesset has recently dissolved, triggering a new round of parliamentary elections to be held this fall, and, at the same time, this summer has been a time of volatility between Israel and its neighbors. Hostilities are roiling at the border with Gaza, and, in the north, the

thin line separating Israel from Hezbollah militants in Lebanon, and from the encroaching presence of Iranian proxies in Syria, is exceedingly fragile.

But perhaps the most worrying information I learned came from academics and journalists who record a growing trend of despondency and cynicism among young adults. The Second Intifada began nearly 20 years ago, and the Oslo Accords were signed more than 25 years ago; so today all Israeli millennials and 20-somethings have grown up in a world where peace is illusory but everyday violence is very real. Though they support a peace agreement in principle, most young Israelis feel resigned to a future in which they will never know peace with their neighbors.

Still, as I affirmed in last month's article, we must always seek reasons for optimism and hope. Israel's relations with Egypt and Jordan have never been stronger, and relations continue to warm among the pragmatic Arab states which quietly accept assistance from Israel in combatting religious extremism and terror in the region. And the approaching Knesset elections have galvanized political activism and engagement across all Israeli demographic sectors.

Here in the Middle East, one can certainly always find reasons for anguish and anxiety. But as David Ben-Gurion is reported to have said: "To be a realist [in Israel], one must believe in miracles." And so our commitment to a realistic and peaceful future for the Jewish State endures – but, in the meantime, there is nothing wrong with hoping for the occasional miracle.

GENERAL QUESTIONS

HIGH HOLY DAY PASSES

High Holy Day passes are sent to our membership by mail. We accept passes from other congregations and welcome military personnel, college students with ID, and out-of-town patients receiving treatment in the Texas Medical Center along with their families. If you know someone who has moved to Houston within the last six months, please contact Elizabeth Townsend at 713.529.5771, ext. 222 or elizabetht@emanuelhouston.org to arrange for a newcomer pass.

For security reasons, members will no longer receive two blank, one-time-use passes to share with friends and family. Instead, members must request those passes ahead by visiting www.emanuelhouston.org/forms/hhdguestpasses or by contacting the synagogue at 713.529.5771 and providing the name and basic contact information for the guest(s) who will be visiting Congregation Emanu El. Passes can then be picked up before the holidays or will be available at the will-call table on the holidays. **Only guests with passes will be allowed entrance.**

PARKING

Only individuals with High Holy Days passes or handicap placards will be permitted entry to the Emanu El campus.

All parking on Floors 1 and 2 of the Gaylor Parking Facility will be reserved for handicap-accessible use. The West Lot is reserved for Rabbi's Circle members with a required pass. Because there is limited garage parking on Floors 3 and 4, we encourage you to park at the satellite locations. Buses will run continually from the satellite parking lots to and from Emanu El.

For Erev Rosh HaShanah and Kol Nidre, park at the Medical Clinic of Houston, 1707 Sunset Blvd. The parking garage entrance is on Rice Blvd. On Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur Day, parking will be available at Rice University. Due to construction on Rice's campus, the location is not confirmed as of press date. We will share this information on our website and in the September edition of the Bulletin.

CHILDCARE

Childcare for children ages 15 months to 8 years is available during all High Holy Day services, with the exception of the 5:30 p.m. Rosh HaShanah service. Registration and advance payment MUST be received so that we can prepare for the appropriate number of caregivers. The cost is \$10 per service per child. A light snack will be provided; however, children with allergies are encouraged to bring their own snacks. The registration deadline for Rosh HaShanah is **Wednesday, September 25**; Yom Kippur registration deadline is **Thursday, October 3**. Those requesting special-needs seating may be granted a maximum of four additional seats for family members. Special-needs seating will be released 15 minutes prior to the beginning of services. The deadline for Rosh HaShanah is **Wednesday, September 25**; Yom Kippur deadline for requests is **Thursday, October 3**.

this year and host a weekend of lectures presented by a Reform scholar, Dr. Andrea Weiss.

Dr. Weiss is the Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel Provost at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, and she served as Associate Professor of Bible at the New York campus. She was ordained at HUC-JIR/New York and received her doctorate from the University of Pennsylvania.

For this project, we will assemble backpacks with pajamas, books, stuffed animals, toiletries, and other first-night necessities to help make their transition more comfortable.
- 2. **Building Beds:** Calling all handy members! To become a foster or adopted parent, the law states each child must have his or her own bed. Many wonderful families have love and support to offer yet struggle financially. For this project, we will use lumber to create their bed kits.
- 3. **Congregational Mailing:** As Cultivating Families continues to reach a wider audience, we will assist them in packing their introductory mailing materials to reach over 4,000 congregations in Harris County (which exceeds the number of children who have been permanently removed from their biological homes for safety reasons).
- 4. Adoption & Foster Awareness Track: If you or someone you know has ever had interest in pursuing this life-changing decision, please come. You will be introduced to the fundamentals of the process, learn the truth behind the myths, and hear real-life stories from other families who have chosen this path. If you are interested in becoming a course instructor for the ongoing curriculum that Cultivating Families provides for congregations, come to learn. This ongoing volunteer position is perfect for anyone with a background in education, social work, psychology or a first-hand adoption or foster parent.
