Every year, we enter this season of the year with the hope that it will bring new opportunities, new experiences, and new ways of learning about how to make our way through the world around us. Over the past few weeks, our family has been taking part in the annual tradition of back-to-school shopping. Every autumn, this process begins again in communities all across the country: children stocking up on colored pencils and glue, new lunchboxes and backpacks, getting ready for another year of learning and growth.

It certainly feels satisfying when the shopping list is complete, but it also feels good to know that these back-to-school preparations help to teach our kids the importance of being prepared, of taking the time to plan and organize ourselves before a new beginning, in order to get ourselves ready for the work that lies ahead.

On Friday night, during our **6:00 p.m.** Shabbat worship, Dr. Weiss will deliver the D'var Torah entitled, *Bitter to Sweet: Biblical Texts of Transformation*. Midway through the month of Elul, just weeks before Rosh Hashanah and the start of the Yamim Noraim/Days of Awe, she will share several less familiar biblical texts offer valuable teachings about the remarkable human capacity for transformation and renewal. An Oneg will follow services.

On Saturday morning, following breakfast at **8:45 a.m.**, Dr. Weiss will present Comfort, Comfort My People: Maternal Metaphors for God in the Oshman Multi-Purpose Room. The week's haftarah portion refers repeatedly to comforting the people Israel during a time of exile and trauma.

Join Dr. Weiss as we explore how the prophet Isaiah uses maternal metaphors of God to fulfill this mission and discuss the implications of these images for us as contemporary readers.

A Saturday late afternoon program with light bites will begin at **5:00 p.m.** with Havdalah prior to Dr. Weiss' presentation entitled *Sarah's Hidden Voice: Why A Women's Torah Commentary Still Matters.* Eleven years after its publication in 2008, *The Torah: A Women's Commentary* continues to enhance Torah study for women and men alike. The associate editor of the commentary, Dr. Weiss will tell how the book came about and show why a women's Torah commentary matters today more than ever.

Lastly, on Sunday morning at **9:30 a.m.**, enjoy breakfast at 9:30 a.m. before the **10:00 a.m.** program, *Speaking Religious Truth to Political Power: Pre-election Lessons* from "American Values Religious Voices." As we approach another presidential election, what can we learn from the non-partisan project, American Values Religious Voices?

The multifaith letters to our leaders in Washington offer wisdom and inspiration drawn from a range of sacred texts, providing an antidote to the acrimony and discord that pervade politics today. The book *American Values Religious Voices: 100 Days, 100 Letters* is Dr. Weiss' work which brought together scholars from a diverse range of religious traditions to articulate core American values that have grounded our nation in the past and should guide us forward at this time of transition.

HIGH HOLY DAY INFORMATION

HIGH HOLY DAY PASSES

High Holy Day passes are sent to our membership by mail. We accept passes from other congregations and also welcome military personnel, college students with ID, and out-of-town patients receiving treatment in the Texas Medical Center along with their families. If you know someone who has moved to Houston within the last six months, please contact Elizabeth Townsend at 713.529.5771, ext. 222 or elizabetht@emanuelhouston. org to arrange for a newcomer pass.

Each member in good standing is entitled to invite up to two guests to one worship service during the High Holy Days, excluding Kol Nidre. For security reasons, we ask for contact information of each guest ahead of the holidays. The request form is available online and should be completed by the member of Emanu El. Passes will be available for pick-up at the rotunda prior to the High Holy Days or at the will-call table on the day(s) of. To submit the request form for guest passes, visit emanuelhouston.org/hhdworship.

PARKING

Only individuals with High Holy Days passes or handicap placards will be permitted entry to the Emanu El campus.

All parking on Floors 1 and 2 of the Gaylor Parking Facility will be reserved for handicap-accessible use. The West Lot is reserved for Rabbi's Circle members with a required pass. Because there is limited garage parking on Floors 3 and 4, we encourage you to park at the satellite locations. Buses will run continually from the satellite parking lots to and from Emanu El.

For Erev Rosh HaShanah and Kol Nidre, park at the Medical Clinic of Houston at 1707 Sunset Blvd. The parking garage entrance is located on Rice Blvd.

On Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur Day, park at Rice University. Due to construction on the west side of the Rice campus, we will use the Rice South Stadium Lot (with overflow in the Greenbriar Lot). A special entrance to the South Stadium Lot will be open between Gates 8 and 9, specifically for our Emanu El guests. This entry point is located on University Blvd. between Montclair and Stockton.

CLOSED CAPTIONING

The synagogue will provide American Sign Language (ASL) during the Rosh HaShanah evening service and Kol Nidre. The Brotherhood provides closed captioning for all onsite Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur services, with the exception of the children's services.

CHILDCARE

Childcare for children ages 15 months to 8 years is available during all High Holy Day services, with the exception of the children's services and the 5:30 p.m. service on Rosh HaShanah. Registration in advance MUST be received in order to prepare for the appropriate number of caregivers. The cost is \$10 per child, per service. A light snack will be provided; however, children with allergies are encouraged to bring their own snacks.

The registration deadline for Rosh HaShanah is **Wednesday, September 25**; the Yom Kippur registration deadline is **Thursday, October 3**.

Those requesting special-needs seating may be granted a maximum of four additional seats for family members. These seats will be held for up to 15 minutes prior to the beginning of services. The deadline Rosh HaShanah is **Wednesday, September 25**; Yom Kippur deadline is **Thursday, October 3**.

A Board Resolution Honoring the Memory of Edmond "Ed" Wulfe

It is customary on the passing of a past President that the Board of Trustees pass a resolution honoring their contributions to the synagogue and the community.

This resolution is then shared with the Congregation via the *Bulletin*.

The resolution, at right, passed unanimously by the the Board of Trustees at their August 13 meeting.

Resolution In Memory Of Edmond "Ed" Wulfe

WHEREAS, Edmond "Ed" Davis Wulfe was a long-standing, active and devoted member of Congregation Emanu El; and

WHEREAS, Ed's activity in the congregation reached new heights in the 1970s as he joined the ranks of the executive committee before becoming the congregation's 19th president, a role he held from 1977 through 1979; and

WHEREAS, Ed served as president of Emanu El and oversaw one of the most significant milestones in the congregation's history as Rabbi Robert I. Kahn transitioned into the role of Rabbi Emeritus and Rabbi Roy A. Walter became the second Senior Rabbi in the history of the congregation; and

WHEREAS, Ed's involvement in the Houston community extended beyond the walls of Emanu El to include serving in the role of chairman or president of other organizations such as the Holocaust Museum of Houston, Main Street Coalition, the Stadium Land Redevelopment Authority and the Urban Land Institute's Houston District Council; and

WHEREAS, a true 'titan' in the community, Ed left his mark all around Houston as he personally played a role in reinventing Meyerland Plaza, developing Gulfgate Mall, leading the charge on a city-wide referendum to expand public transit and helping head a \$100 million parks bond campaign amongst other accomplishments; and

WHEREAS, Ed has been recognized countless times both at Emanu El and in the community for his contributions, receiving accolades such as the 1979 Congregant of the Year, being inducted into the City of Houston's Hall of Fame, receiving an American Leadership Forum's Exemplary Leader Award, earning the Houston Business Journal's Commercial Real Estate Lifetime Achievement Award and in 2018, being bestowed the Distinguished Alumnus Award from his beloved Texas A&M; therefore

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that the members of Congregation Emanu El express to his family its sympathy and deep appreciation and gratitude for his devoted service to the congregation and records this acknowledgement in the minutes of the congregation's Board of Trustees meeting, August 13, 2019.

A Message from Stefani Carlson



As I sit down to write this article, I am still feeling the tremendous energy of having been together with our Helfman Religious School faculty and staff for the first time this year at Yom Moreh, the community-wide day of learning for congregational school teachers.

Our education team has come together beautifully over the summer, with several exciting new hires joining our beloved regulars. Each one of us is eagerly looking forward to the learning we will do with our students and families this year.

During Yom Moreh, we had the opportunity to learn with Rabbi Rebecca Milder, Director of the Jewish Enrichment Center in Chicago, who led us through exercises in "raising the child's voice" in

Jewish education. Along with colleagues from other area congregations, we spent the morning experimenting with loose parts, visual arts materials, sound, and movement as tools for interpreting Torah.

Our Hebrew teachers participated in a parallel session, in which they explored multi-sensory ways of teaching. After lunch and a text study icebreaker, we came together as a Helfman team in a bonus session with Rabbi Milder in which we practiced facilitating "grand conversations" that encourage creativity and complex thinking. Most importantly, later in the afternoon, we began to think about how to take the learning that we were doing together and bring it into our classrooms.

Our day of learning was organized around the words that are written on the cornerstone of our school wing: La'asok b'divrei Torah, to engage with words of Torah. We talked about what it might look and sound like in our classrooms when our students are truly engaged in their explorations of Torah and Judaism, and are eagerly anticipating putting those ideas into practice.

To support an environment of experimentation and inquiry in our teaching, our faculty will have several new opportunities for ongoing professional development, including a new Professional Learning Community.

By the time this article is published, our teachers will have received class rosters and TA assignments and continued their learning alongside their teen assistants at Open House, where they will have begun to meet their students and families.

Our 5780 Helfman Religious School year kicks off on **Sunday, September 8** with a brief Opening Day assembly for all students and parents in the Barish Sanctuary at **9:00 a.m.** Students will head to their regular classes at approximately **9:30 a.m.**, while parents are invited to head to the Oshman Multi-Purpose Room for an informational meeting with our clergy and professional staff and a breakfast social sponsored by the Emanu El Brotherhood. Our annual Hot Dog Luncheon, hosted by the Religious School Committee, will follow dismissal at noon.

- organizes support groups so that anyone who is thinking of bringing a child into their home (or already has and is struggling alone) can receive the help they need.

- 1. **First Night Backpacks:** Many times, children are removed from unsafe living conditions in the middle of the night and faced with collecting all their belongings in a garbage bag. For this project, we will assemble backpacks with pajamas, books, stuffed animals, toiletries, and other first-night necessities to help make their transition more comfortable.
- 2. Congregational Mailing: As Cultivating Families continues to reach a wider audience, we will assist them in packing their introductory mailing materials to reach over 4,000 congregations in Harris County (which exceeds the number of children who have been permanently removed from their biological homes for safety reasons).
- Adoption & Foster Awareness Track: If you or someone you know has ever had interest in pursuing this life-changing decision, please come. You will be introduced to the fundamentals of the process, learn

the truth behind the myths, and hear real-life stories from other families who have chosen this path. If you are interested in becoming a course instructor for the ongoing curriculum that Cultivating Families provides for congregations, come to learn. This ongoing volunteer position is perfect for anyone with a background in education, social work, psychology or a first-hand adoption or foster parent.

This is a great opportunity to make new friends, develop leadership skills and have a blast!



Emanu El's Strong Connection to Greene Family Camp

Congregation Emanu El's strong connection with Jewish camping is deeply engrained in the fabric of the institution. Early in the life of the synagogue, under the direction of Rabbi Robert I. Kahn, Emanu El served as one of the pillars in establishing the Union for Reform Judaism's Greene Family Camp (GFC) in Bruceville, Texas.

For the second summer in a row, Emanu El sent the largest delegation to GFC from across the region, with more than 100 children from our congregation experiencing the richness of GFC.

Many of the Congregation's campers go on and become counselors and unit heads at camp while Emanu El's clergy and education team makes it a priority to maintain a visible presence throughout the summer, serving on faculty at camp for five out of the six weeks.

This spring, the tradition of Emanu El's involvement with GFC continued as the synagogue and its auxiliaries were able to provide over \$36,000 in camperships and/or financial aid to over many students from the Helfman Religious School program.

Additionally, several funds within the Temple's endowment including the Barbara & Mark Brookner Campership, the Chester Marcus Campership, the Ben Noble Campership, the Connie Reischer Scholarship, the Ricky Schnurr Campership aid in adding to the total count of dollars provided to our students.

Congregants and community members alike are encouraged to give to these funds as well as the general Greene Family Camp Fund to enable future campers to benefit from the experiences that attending a Jewish summer camp provide.




