FROM RABBI HAYON



Our congregational community offers many opportunities for us to undertake concrete steps toward two parallel spiritual concepts: tikkun olam, improving the world, and tikkun atzmi, improving the self.

An ancient book of Jewish mysticism, the *Sefer Yetzirah*, calls the High Holy Day season "the month of deeds." The sages noted that the root of the Hebrew verb meaning "to be willing" looks very similar to the word "Elul," the month of preparation before the arrival of the Days of Awe.

Thus, during the month leading up to the holy days, we are to prepare ourselves inwardly: apologizing for our missteps, forgiving others, and resolving to make changes in the new year. However, we cannot allow ourselves to remain content with mere preparation; we must follow through – personally, emotionally, and spiritually – and make good on the deeds we have resolved to do.

This is the month in which we can start to uphold the promises and commitments we have made for the year 5781. Absolved of past wrongs, we begin with a clean slate on which to inscribe the actions of a new year. Our congregational community offers many opportunities for us to undertake concrete steps toward two parallel spiritual concepts: tikkun olam, improving the world, and tikkun

atzmi, improving the self.

Over the weeks ahead, the work of tikkun olam will include a number of ways to get involved in service to our community. First, a wealth of resources for reading, conversation and action directed toward racial justice in our community are available on our webpage. Please take a few moments to explore these resources and commit to learning and taking action this year.

Additionally, the Emanu El Votes initiative, steered by our Social Justice Core Team, is working toward making Emanu El a 100% voting congregation. More information, including our voter pledge, can be found at emanuelhouston.org/eevotes. We fervently hope that every member of our Temple will vote in next month's elections. Finally, the festival of Sukkot will provide multiple opportunities for action and education focused on the issue of homelessness in our city. We are thrilled that SEARCH, a homeless service agency, which was founded by members of Emanu El, will be included in several of these offerings.

There will also be numerous ways to deepen our commitment to tikkun atzmi this season. As always, opportunities for Jewish study abound, for learners of all ages. It is also now easier than ever to build your practice of personal spirituality and prayer, as our worship services are accessible via our upgraded livestream capabilities. Lastly, please remember that meaningful relationships are at the core of what makes Emanu El so special. I encourage you to reach out to members of our staff and lay leadership to strengthen those most precious interpersonal connections that bring comfort and strength to our lives.

This "month of deeds" is our time to follow through on the commitments and aspirations we formed during the High Holy Days. This month, we are called upon to make good on our promises and take the first concrete steps toward repair – of ourselves and of the world – that this new year demands.

On behalf of our Board of Trustees, I would like to welcome you to our 76th year celebrating the High Holy Days at Congregation Emanu El. Whether you are a new member, lifelong member, or our guest, whether you are here in Houston or a few times zones away, together we will usher in the Jewish new year in an entirely new way.

I am honored to be the 41st president of Emanu El and am humbled to continue the work of the dedicated men and women before me. Last year we celebrated Emanu El's 75th anniversary and honored the 190 families who gathered in 1944 to establish Congregation Emanu El. Connected by their shared vision of the power of the synagogue to do good, these founding families created our beloved congregation during the global crisis of WWII – with no building and a senior rabbi, Rabbi Robert Kahn, thousands of miles away serving in the Pacific. Seventy-six years later, Emanu El continues to be a testament to that idea: that our synagogue is more than the walls around us; that wherever we are, we are a community, connected by shared values and a commitment to *Tikkun Olam*, repairing the world.

Today we face a very different global crisis. In March, the onset of the coronavirus pandemic in Houston shifted our landscape and our way of life. Our clergy, staff and lay leadership had to quickly adapt and pivot to a new way of engaging with our members. Guided by the need to protect the health and safety of our congregational community, our traditional ways of worshipping, studying, celebrating, and even mourning were transformed. Thanks to our clergy and staff's creativity and the outstanding technical support team, our temple calendar quickly began to fill up again, with worship services, programs and life cycle events delivered via the internet, bringing the temple into our homes. I am immensely grateful to them for their tireless efforts to reschedule, rework, and reimagine everything they do so that our Emanu El families are cared for in respectful and meaningful ways.

I also want to thank the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee for their leadership over the last few months as we learned to navigate the unchartered waters of this health crisis. We meet via Zoom at least once a month to tackle the logistical and financial challenges dealt us by the pandemic. Difficult times demand difficult decisions, and our lay leaders continue to lead with their hearts and minds, always guided by our responsibility to our members.

And to the many other volunteers that keep our synagogue humming, please accept my deepest thanks for sharing your time and talent.

As a result of this global health crisis, we are not able to worship together in our sanctuary this High Holy Day season and I share your sadness and disappointment. But we can come together through the shared experience of our digital services, which promise to be meaningful and comforting. As we embark on our first-ever remote High Holy Day services, it may not be perfect and there may be technological bumps along the way, but I believe with patience, understanding, and intention, each of us can find reassurance and healing during these Days of Awe.

I want to personally thank Rabbi Hayon, Rabbi Silk, Rabbi Fixler and Rabbi Walter for your compassion and unwavering dedication to the Emanu El community and for guiding us through prayer, study and counsel. Cantor Simmons, thank you for bringing your beautiful music into our homes and our hearts. To our entire clergy team, thank you for showing us that our synagogue reaches beyond the walls of our building.

I want to thank our Director of Congregational Learning Stefani Carlson and our Interim Becker Director Sarah Williams and all the Helfman and Becker teachers and staff for your tremendous efforts in providing a safe, loving and engaging education to our children. And thank you to Program Director Jason Plotkin and Executive Director David Lamden and all of the administrative staff for your hard work behind-the-scenes to support our community and our sacred spaces.

Finally, to our members: Thank you for your patience and understanding as we worked through the challenges of 2020, and thank you for supporting your temple and for making it such a special community.

It's a privilege to join you as we begin the next 75 years of Congregation Emanu El. My family and I wish you all a Sweet New Year. May 5781 be a year filled with peace and connection, and renewal and healing.

As part of our recognition of World Homeless Day, please join us as we learn from **Thao Costis**, President and CEO of SEARCH Homeless Services, a leading Houston agency helping people move from the streets, into jobs, and safe, stable housing.

During her 23-year tenure, she has focused on how SEARCH can best

help people who are homeless transform their lives, improve their health, and change how the community addresses this problem. Prior to SEARCH, she worked at the Coalition for the Homeless of Houston/Harris County where she brought together 150 not-for-profit agencies to coordinate their efforts.

During the evening's program, Costis will share how Houston's model of addressing homelessness compares to those around the world, the role SEARCH plays in the greater Houston area.

As part of Emanu El's ongoing commitment to fight hunger in Houston and long-standing tradition to collect donations for the Edward Wayne Hunger Fund during our Yom Kippur services, Emanu El will send a Hunger Fund envelope to our congregants in a Yom Kippur-specific delivery prior to the holiday.

This year as part of a week of activities surrounding World Homeless Day in early October, Emanu El will be directing a portion of Edward Wayne Hunger Fund donations to the SEARCH Homeless Services' Emergency Foods Fund. These monies will go to provide travel friendly, shelf-stable foods for the SEARCH Mobile Outreach & Housing Navigation team members to distribute to clients as they work to move them from the streets.

Kindergarten Panel Discussion Wednesday, October 7, 10:00 a.m.


This program will provide information on a range of topics to help you make the important decisions regarding

Screening: This is Our Home, It Is Not for Sale Thursday, November 5, 3:30 p.m.

The Program in Jewish Studies at Rice University and Congregation Emanu El invite you to join us for a discussion about the 1987 film, *This Is Our Home, It Is Not For Sale* with Director and Houston native Jon Schwartz.

The documentary chronicles the history of Houston's Riverside Terrace neighborhood, an area of the city that was once a thriving hub for Houston's Jewish community in the 1940s and 1950s. As Black Americans began to move into the neighborhood, Jewish and white Houstonians moved out. The film addresses critical topics relevant to contemporary discussions in our time about race, religion, and real estate. Emanu El's Rabbi Robert Kahn, of blessed memory, is one of the subjects interviewed in the film.




