### 2nd Community Shabbat Dinner of the Summer To Be Held July 22nd



### From the President, Jeff Basen-Engquist

Gratitude is an easily overlooked practice. Albert Einstein noted, "Every day I remind myself that my inner and outer life are based on the labors of other men, living and dead, and that I must exert myself in order to give in the same measure as I have received and am still receiving." (Today I suspect he would acknowledge women's contributions as well.)

When I focused on our working together to build 'our Emanu El' in my Installation Message, gratitude is one of the pillars. For example, particularly in my terms as Senior Vice President and, now, as President, I have been educated about the multifaceted roles and extensive demands on our clergy. We recognize their leadership at services and events but rarely see the extensive preparation that goes into it. Already High Holiday planning – sermons written, prayer book passages selected, old and new aspects of each

day polished - is well underway. Imagine the daily requests from committees and auxiliaries, spiritually hungry individuals, colleagues in synagogue operations, and their own families. From Torah to tedious details, I have observed why the best see their work as a calling.

### From Rabbi Hayon

These experiences have impressed our students with the grand and complex sweep of Jewish history. They have spent time mourning our people who were turned into ash at Majdanek and Birkenau, and those piled by the thousands in unmarked graves beneath the Buczyna Forest in Zbylitowska Góra. And they have grown acquainted with the heroes of our past: warriors and poets, kings and sages, prophets and soldiers. More than anything, what they have learned here has demonstrated to our students the breadth and elasticity of Jewish history.

"Once we were in bondage; now we are free," declares the Passover haggadah, as if anything about Jewish life could be so simple. In reality, of course, Jewish history is intricately contoured. Jewish freedom and Jewish oppression constantly twist into one another; each generation experiences its own shares of redemption and suffering. It is exactly as Faulkner said: "The past is never dead. It's not even past."

This acknowledgment feeds into one of the primary educational goals I have for our SBMIE participants this summer. My hope is that they will return from their travels with the empowering conclusion that Jewish history is informative, but not determinative. And I hope that they come to embrace the most empowering aspect of Jewish education: that by acquainting ourselves with the lives and legacies of the Jewish past, we become equipped to personally create the Jewish future we wish to inhabit.

The Jewish past is filled with stories that shatter the heart and inspire the soul. But above all else, it is a diverse record of the ways in which individual Jews and their communities have responded to the world around them, with profound and long-lasting effects. Our SBMIE participants have, during their travels in Poland and Israel, come to know a few of these many stories and their varied outcomes. By doing so, they become newly capable of seeing themselves in Jewish history, of recognizing their own role in shaping the world they will inherit.

Their lesson is one I hope all of us will absorb as well: to take seriously the mitzvah of Jewish learning as a way of shaping and improving our own Jewish community. I firmly believe that assiduous study of the Jewish past is among the best tools available to us in our work of producing a hopeful and enriching future for the generations that will succeed us.

When I return from my travels with our SBMIE participants, I will be eager to share with you some of the remarkable experiences we shared together and some of the indelible memories the group has formed together. And as we prepare our congregational calendar for the 2016-17 program year, I very much hope that you will join me in some of the very exciting educational offerings that we will be delighted to present next year. By taking part in these opportunities, just as our students have this summer, you will share in the exhilarating promise and joy of recognizing your own role in helping move the collective Jewish future towards the bright fulfillment of its most hopeful promises.

### SECURITY NOTICE: Emanu El to Issue Vehicle Stickers

+++++

Over the past several months, we have shared with you steps that have been taken to enhance our building and grounds security. These include increasing the number of security cameras, new building entry/intrusion alarm systems and the installation/use of gates to limit access to our property. Along with the gates, we have changed our traffic patterns. The alteration of our traffic flow allows us to better control and monitor vehicles on our property.

Like many other religious institutions in our area and across the country, we are regularly re-examining and refining our security protocols, with a focus on how we manage and monitor access to our building and grounds. For reasons we believe are obvious and necessary, perimeter security will be further enhanced in the near future through the use of vehicle stickers. In the next thirty (30) days, members and pre-school families will receive two pre-numbered windshield stickers. The stickers are small ovals with the letters CEE imprinted on them and should be placed on the upper right-hand side of car windshields.

The Temple will maintain a database of the stickers issued. If an additional sticker is needed or a sticker is lost or damaged, please contact the Temple at (713) 529-5771 to request a new sticker.

We hope you will join us in both recognizing the need for the vehicle stickers and support the security enhancements we are adopting.

### **BOARD NOTES - JUNE 2016**

The Board of Trustees met on June 14, 2016 and took part in an orientation for new and returning members to the Board. Executive Vice-President Rodney Roth oversaw the discussions covering finances, Endowment, and Governance.

The Executive Committee has begun implementing the Governance Plan that was approved by the Board last August. The Governance Plan is a set of recommendations that creates an efficient and effective governance structure in which lay volunteers are able to thrive and will further the mission of Congregation Emanu El. One of the recommendations of the Governance Plan is the review and revamping of our bylaws. Rick Oshman and Elizabeth Krohn of the Bylaws Task Force presented the first part of a series of proposed changes. The goal is to have the revised final version of the bylaws presented to the congregation by the end of the calendar year for a congregational vote.

Rodney reported that members of the Executive Committee were assigned a group of committees to oversee. The Executive Committee will be working on the selection of board liaisons to help manage and rejuvenate these committees.

Jason Plotkin introduced Jill Patir to the Board. Jill is the new Membership & Outreach Coordinator for Emanu El. Rabbi Kahn reported the hiring of Jamie Aaron as the new Experiential Educator. Jamie will begin working at Emanu El on August 15, 2016. Rabbi Kahn also shared the plan to restructure the Youth Committee based on ideas from the URJ and Hillel. Brotherhood President Lewis Kalmans announced that Brotherhood is donating \$8000 to the Houston Food Bank and \$2500 to Emergency Aid Coalition from the proceeds of the Chicken Soup Cook-off.

### TEFTY Serves as Pioneers of 'The Chaverim Project'

This year, the World Union for Progressive Judaism (WUPJ) initiated the Chaverim Project, a program which focuses on members of the National Federation of Temple Youth (NFTY) groups and their peers in the Jewish communities of the Former Soviet Union (FSU).

The goal of the program is for the North American youth to provide opportunities for their Reform/ Progressive Jewish counterparts in the FSU to attend WUPJ summer camps.

In most FSU families, Judaism was not part of their culture during the years when Jewish congregations were not permitted to exist. When the current generation of youth attends WUPJ camps, they bring the beauty and excitement of their religious experience home to share with their families.

Congregation Emanu El's high school youth group (TEFTY) was chosen to be the "Pioneer" organization to launch the Chaverim Project. They baked hundreds of cookies and brownies, and sold them at Helfman Religious School events while sharing their story with the customers. TEFTY President Marisa Papell, Rabbi Samantha Kahn and TEFTY advisor Sarah Megan Brown, help keep the project on target. By being a committed and creative group, TEFTY raised \$1000 – enough to send one FSU child to summer camp this year.

TEFTY's experience will be taken to the NFTY Convention held next spring at which time the Chaverim Project will be introduced to the hundreds of NFTY groups across North America.

# Four Achieve Status of Eagle Scout; Emanu El's Troop 1190 Hits 50th Eagle Scout Milestone

On Sunday, June 5, Troop 1190, family and friends celebrated the achievements of four young men reaching the highest rank in Scouting: the rank of Eagle Scout. Only 6% of boys starting their scouting career achieve this rank nationwide. Ervin Graubard, Daniel Sharpe, Jonathan Rauscher and Noah Mattiuzzi are the newest Eagle Scouts for the troop with Noah becoming the 50th Eagle Scout for Troop 1190.

These young men started Boy Scouts at age 11 and earned the Scout badge and then the ranks of Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, and Life, before reaching Eagle. Along the way, they each earned 13 required merit badges and at least nine elective merit badges, served in troop leadership positions for a total of 16 months, and spent at least 13 hours on service projects, not including the many other hours spent on each one's Eagle Scout service project. In all, each has completed approximately 325 different requirements. Each of the boys has also earned some of the Jewish Scouting awards.

All of the Scoutmasters who have served Troop 1190 during these boys' scouting careers were present for the ceremony: Peter Christie, Wayne Vincent, and current Scoutmaster Josh Rutenberg. Additionally the Eagle Scout who was the Tiger coach for Ervin, Jonathan, and Noah, Mr. Richard Stanley, administered the Eagle Promise for the boys with the help of Noah's brother, Eagle Scout Benjamin Mattiuzzi.



### August Book Review: Boys in the Boat

Come join us on **Thursday, August 11th at 6:45 p.m.**, as Rabbi Oren Hayon reviews *The Boys in the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics*, by Daniel James.

This non-fiction account about beating the odds and finding hope in the most desperate of times tells the improbable, intimate history of how nine working-class boys from the American West showed the world at the 1936 Olympics in Berlin what true grit really meant. The University of Washington's eight-oar crew team, composed of the sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, was never expected to defeat the elite teams of the East Coast and Great Britain. Yet they prevailed, shocking the world by defeating the German team rowing for Adolf Hitler. The emotional heart of the tale lies with Joe Rantz, a teenager without family or prospects, who rows not only to regain his shattered self-regard, but also to find a place for himself in the world. Drawing on the boys' own journals and vivid memories, Brown has created an unforgettable portrait of an era,



a celebration of a remarkable achievement, and a chronicle of one extraordinary young man's personal quest.
