From Rabbi Hayon



I write this month's *Bulletin* article from several miles above the Atlantic, as my family and I return home from this summer's congregational trip to Israel. The trip was inspiring and enriching, marked by the delight of discovery and many breathtaking moments of recognition that accompany every trip to the Jewish State, for first-time travelers and repeat visitors alike.

Our trip began at a scenic overlook on the Mediterranean coast in the city of Yafo, where the modern skyscrapers of Tel Aviv gleam in striking contrast to the ancient stones of the biblical port where ships first launched thousands of years ago. We learned that the word "Tel" in "Tel Aviv" means "hill" or "mound," and that the city's name reminds one of the numerous hills excavated by archaeologists throughout Israel. A tel will typically contain numerous layers of historical artifacts stacked on top of each other; an archaeologist may expect to discover Crusader or Ottoman ruins atop findings from the ancient Muslim, Israelite, and Canaanite civilizations that preceded them.

The metaphor of archaeology is a fitting one for a trip like this one: every day, each of us undertook our own personal "excavations" through which we explored the layers of our own pasts. Of course, this process often takes place whenever one travels; however, unlike visits to the stone cathedrals of Europe or the ruins of Greece and Rome, travel to Israel enables one to reconnect

with our people's own miraculous past and the inspiring promise of its future. The Crusaders and the Cult of Zeus are long gone now, but the Jewish people endures and thrives.

Each day in Israel invites one to participate in some of the world's most vibrant, innovative and powerful Jewish experiences. In the mountaintop ruins of Masada, we expressed our gratitude for the bold commitment to Jewish self-determination that would lay dormant for thousands of years before blossoming into a modern Jewish nation.

At Yad VaShem, we bore witness to the atrocities of history and paused in solemn remembrance of the vanished branches of our families and our people. We marveled at the weathered stones of the Western Wall and the bullet-spattered Jaffa Gate, exactly 50 years after they witnessed the astonishing victory by Israel's young army which reunited the holy city and brought it under Jewish control for the first time in two millennia.

Watching the artists at Yad LaKashish, an urban craft center which employs older adults who would otherwise live in poverty, we redoubled our communal commitment to sustainable and inclusive models of social justice.

For Jews around the world, travel to Israel is the closest thing to "pilgrimage" in our spiritual lives today. And this trip, taken with other members of our congregation, was a holy journey indeed. I am thankful that all of us have returned safely, and I know that we are all eager to share our stories and reflections from the trip. I, too, look forward to sharing some of the experiences that touched me most deeply in the days to come, and I hope to invite you to take part in additional travel opportunities in the future.

Whether here or abroad, our "spiritual archaeology" continues, as we share the sacred task of excavating our own Jewish stories, and digging deeply in the priceless endeavors of prayer, study, and tikkun olam, which illuminates and lends timeless meaning to our lives.

The Access for All Committee, truly a working group which will focus on inclusion for all people, met in June. We reviewed the work of previous committees and reprioritized our very long to-do list.

The committee has accomplished many things in the past several years; the most recent being the mezuzah hanging ceremony which took place earlier this spring, when Rabbi Hayon, members of the committee, and second grade students in our Helfman Religious School installed three new mezuzot. From the President - Jeff Basen-Engquist



Our family recently returned from the trip organized by our congregation to Israel. The most common question I am receiving is "Was it wonderful?" This meaning-laced inquiry suggests many things that are true about the trip, but also about the inquirers.

First, indeed it was wonderful, especially having our recent college graduate Emma with Karen and me. Logistically it was well-planned, taking us from Jaffa to the Golan Heights on a fast-paced tour of the country. Second, our tour guide and Rabbi Hayon provided master classes and personal anecdotes as we traveled back in time to learn elements of our history as Jews and that of the peoples of this ancient land. Of course, we also saw the modern Israel, including the community Kabbalat Shabbat service at the train station in Tel Aviv. (It occurred to me, we could do something like this...). We shopped at markets old and new, ate lots of salads and Israeli dishes, and set new personal step count records.

Third, significantly, we went to the Western Wall and other sites that challenge and inform our faith. We placed notes written by Helfman students in the Wall and each had time to reflect and pray. There we saw the enforced separation between men and women as well as the steps being taken to overcome them. This reminded me of why I am a Reform Jew and how each of our voices is needed.

The highlight, my "What was the best part?" response? The people. Our congregant travel companions were warm and delightful. As we visited, learned, prayed and played together, their openness and shared support made the trip easier and more meaningful. Rabbi Hayon's family joined us. Rabbi and Julie's young daughters, Avi and Noa, more than kept up with us, helping us see the sites through their eyes as well. The opportunity to visit with each of them in this informal setting was very special.

We visited with and learned much from others. Our off-road guide to the Golan described growing up in the village below us, targeted before the six-day war. We met Israeli soldiers on the Golan, including one from the states. We were guided on a walk through a Druze community by a man who described their history and their religion, breaking bread with us in a home. And we bargained with shopkeepers and inquired about unfamiliar foods at stands and restaurants across the country.

Observing the many faiths, their churches, mosques, and synagogues, and their varied practices, including our own – from the wall to dancing on Shabbat – can inform us all. Ultimately, we are each finding a way to understand our place and create a path to righteousness. I do not presume to know how to bridge the divides. As a result of this trip, I may understand better what we have in common.


BOOK REVIEW: Saving Sophie by Ronald H. Balson Thursday, July 13th at 6:45 p.m.

Reviewed by Ed Septimus, *Saving Sophie* is the second novel by Balson, the author of *Once We Were Brothers*. This novel, Balsan's second, is described as "an action-packed, unforgettable journey of murder and deception, testing the bonds of family and love." Presented in the familiar form of our Shabbat prayer book Mishkan T'filah, our community will have an opportunity to worship with powerful liturgical readings, graceful translations, full transliteration for all Hebrew text to encourage more accessible participation in all parts of the service, stirring and inspiring poetry, interesting art, traditional and meaningful Torah readings, marvelous new content as well as the meaningful and traditional prayers you are familiar with. The music will include favorite and timeless melodies complimented by expressive and stunning musical selections to elevate our prayer experience.

Staffed by Emanu El volunteers and created by Interfaith Care Partners, our Gathering Place is a once-amonth program for seniors with special memory needs. The program takes place **from 10:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. on the second Monday of each month** (from September through June) offering entertainment, exercise, music, crafts, stimulation and lunch.

The Gathering Place program at Emanu El is funded through the Riva Bursten Caring Congregation Fund which "supports programs that assist people in the community."

"When Riva Bursten was ill, her family was so impressed by the efforts of our Caring Congregation family that were supportive of her and the family in their time of need," said Myra Lipper. "In honor of her mother and in gratitude to these congregants, the family established this fund."



Three Boy Scouts from Emanu El's Troop 1190 Earn Their Eagle Scout Rank

Ari Rotenberg, **Jacob Arnold** and **Joseph (Joey) Engelhart** from Troop 1190, sponsored by the Brotherhood of Congregation Emanu El, were honored with the rank of Eagle Scout at an Eagle Court of Honor on Sunday, June 11th.

These young men started Boy Scouts, first earning the Scout badge and then progressing through the ranks of Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star and Life, before reaching Eagle. Along the way, they each earned the 13 required merit badges and at least nine elective merit badges, served in troop leadership positions for a total of 16 months and spent at least 13 hours on service projects, not including the many other hours spent on their Eagle Scout service projects. In all, each has completed approximately 325 different requirements.

Ari, son of Leah and Dr. Joshua Rotenberg, graduated from Carnegie Vanguard High School in 2016 and has been on a gap year program with Young Judaea in Israel. In the fall of 2017, he expects to enter the University of British Columbia as a freshman.

Interested in environmental sustainability, Ari's Eagle

project involved supervision of 22 youth and 14 adults to clear out the overgrown plants and root systems in the courtyard flower beds at Kolter Elementary and then to plant azalea bushes and apply mulch to the beds.

Jacob, son of Marci and Mark Arnold recently graduated from Emery Weiner School. He plans to attend Cornell University in the fall, majoring in Operations Research & Information Engineering.

For his Eagle project Jacob chose to help Aishel House, a Jewish organization that provides housing and support for patients and their families who are receiving treatment at the Texas Medical Center. Jacob agreed to create an herb garden. He researched the appropriate herbs for the area before planting. Jacob supervised 7 youth and 6 adults to accomplish his project.

Joey, son of Eva and Judge Mike Engelhart recently graduated from Emery Weiner School. He will attend The University of Texas at Austin as a computer science major in the fall. For his Eagle project, Joseph chose to help the Nature Discovery Center. He set up a pollinator garden of native plants, first confronting the challenge of removing the non-

native/invasive plant species growing in the desig-

nated area. Joey supervised 10 youth and 12 adults to accomplish his vision.

Only 6% of boys starting their scouting career achieve the highest rank, Eagle Scout, nationwide. The young men honored this past June bring the total to 55 Eagle Scouts awarded in Congregation Emanu El's Troop 1190.
