The results you see here are the final product of many months of research, evaluation, and testing by our lay leadership, clergy and staff, and the hard work of a team of outstanding professionals with whom we partnered to lead this process.

Principle, the award-winning branding and design firm which undertook the design of our new look, was charged with assembling new visual elements in order to articulate clearly Emanu El's historic cultural and spiritual legacy, our current communal identity, and our aspirations about what we offer our world as we guide it toward visionary new plateaus. To arrive at the finished product, Principle's consultants and designers spent hundreds of hours on various stages of research: interviewing clergy, congregants and staff, poring through stacks of historical materials in our archives, and studying closely the papers and sermons of Rabbi Robert I. Kahn, whose vision for Emanu El charted our congregation's course.

## FROM THE PRESIDENT

What stands the test of time? What messages are communicated or suggested by change? For us, as always, our Jewish calendar points to a way to explore this.

Internal change is a process

with which we as Reform Jews are familiar. We have reached the time of year when we are called to reflect, challenge ourselves, and to turn. The process of organizational change can have similar markers and tests.

For example, gathering information. We look back at past practices and the beliefs that led to their adoption. How has our environment changed and what does that tell us? What can we learn from other times when we reevaluated and made changes? Further, does change imply past choices were mistakes, something to be hidden away or necessarily forgotten? I would argue that would be disingenuous and unproductive.

One of the first *Bulletin* pieces I submitted for your consideration also addressed this theme. Fifteen months later, while even more optimistic about the road ahead for our congregation, I would amend my earlier remarks to include this: Adopting something new does not necessarily imply judgement of that which preceded it. And respect for what has been should not impede needed transformation.

It was inspiring and gratifying to see how the Principle team arrived at their findings, having clearly understood Emanu El's values, priorities, and culture. Their report to our Board of Trustees demonstrated that the new visual vocabulary they had constructed for us was a faithful and joyful reflection of what Emanu El stands for. They recognized the hospitality which lies at the core of our identity, and our unfailing commitment to keep Emanu El's doors, arms and hearts open at all times to those who seek a spiritual home, a sense of purpose, and a deep feeling of belonging. And they observed the bold and audacious spiritual convictions that animate our congregation and those who lead it; being a part of Emanu El means believing that spiritual community has the potential to transform humanity through moral conscience, cultural progress, and meaningful, positive action inspired by the principles of modern Judaism.

In the final phase of the project, all of the critical components of our identity – faith and justice, openness and culture, wisdom and conscience – converged in the design of our congregation's new logo. To create the new one, Principle's visual design specialists were inspired by all of Emanu El's previous logos, which evolved over the years from a photograph, to a pen-and-ink illustration, to a linear rendering, and finally to the most recent one, a symbolic representation of the dramatic angular lines of our historic building's façade. Having been guided by these elements of Emanu El's visual past, and also by our vision for the future, the new logo was born.

Its bold, ambitious lines reflect our modern and uncompromising commitment to Jewish ideas and social conscience, while its classic architectural angles evoke our building's inimitable midcentury style. The logo's branching lines stretch upward and outward, underscoring our commitment to outreach and ambition, and subtly nestled in the center of the design is the pentagonal shape of the Tablets of the Law which are displayed prominently over the grand entrance doors on Sunset Boulevard. Finally, if one looks closely, one can also identify a forking linear design inside the logo in the shape of the Hebrew letter ayin, which is the first letter of "Emanu El," meaning "God be with us."

Taken as a whole, the powerful new design of our congregation's public face – our logo, color and lettering standards, and an elegant, sleek and functional new website which will be unveiled soon – speaks eloquently about who we are and what we stand for. We are, and always have been, a community which honors and respects its past because we know that the timeless lessons of Jewish faith, justice and wisdom are our greatest tools for creating a good, compassionate and upright future. The elements of our new look represent Emanu El's commitment to excellence and sophistication, and its bold, uncompromising design amplifies Emanu El's confident faith that – as our name has always asserted – God will be with us in our work, in our prayer and our study, and in our undying promise to the world that we will build together.

If you look around, starting with this bulletin, you will see planned changes coming to fruition. Across many significant aspects of our congregational life, committees, task forces, and focus groups have been grappling with assessing the need for change and, if deemed appropriate, how best to incorporate our institutional knowledge into a new direction. We sought out information and opinions from the congregation and moved forward with well- grounded choices. As I have noted before, our communication tools will look and feel different. With the continuing implementation of the Governance Plan adopted by the Board two years ago, certain committees have new or additional goals and short-term task forces have become more common. Related bylaws modifications are being prepared for your review and consideration. Further, security concerns and procedures are continually being scrutinized. Opportunities for leadership development are under consideration.

For some, the pace will seem too rapid, the changes unnecessary or extreme. It may seem a part of the acceleration we all experience of innovation and information overload. Alternatively, adapting to a changing milieu and constituency should provide fresh opportunities for engagement with others in the Temple's work.

Each year we take stock, building on what we have learned, identifying our insufficiencies and committing to a future of progress. May we arrive together, allied and strong.

**POSTSCRIPT:** I have struggled framing this article. There is an important national dialogue, reinvigorated by recent events, about history and how it is represented today. I did not want to trivialize that conversation by metaphor and clever references. As quickly as things change, I cannot know the context in which this will be read (at least a few weeks from this writing). In a piece written by Alan Zimmerman (President of Congregation Beth Israel in Charlottesville, VA), he described how history, Judaism and current events converged on their doorstep. "Several times, parades of Nazis passed our building, shouting, 'There's the synagogue!' followed by chants of 'Seig Heil' and other anti-Semitic language. Some carried flags with swastikas and other Nazi symbols . . . A frail, elderly woman approached me Saturday morning as I stood on the steps in front of our sanctuary, crying, to tell me that while she was Roman Catholic, she wanted to stay and watch over the synagogue with us. At one point, she asked, 'Why do they hate you?' I had no answer to the question we've been asking ourselves for thousands of years." Throughout the coming year, I will include in my prayers their community, those harmed by racism, sexism and prejudice in Charlottesville and Charleston and throughout our country's troubled history. And, with an eye on the rights of all, I will act and encourage others to do so.

# Endowment Fund Speaker Carl Bernstein Wednesday, January 24, 2018 at 7:30 p.m.

Congregation Emanu El's featured Endowment Fund Speaker in 2017-2018 is renown journalist Carl Bernstein, who will speak about "Evolving Role of the Media in Dealing with Washington."

No stranger to the grind of Washington, Bernstein began part-time work at the *Washington Star* at the age of 16 and later dropped out of the University of Maryland to work

full-time as a reporter. Bernstein made a historic name for himself when along with Bob Woodward, he uncovered the Watergate scandal which led to the resignation of U.S. President Richard Nixon.

Bernstein shared a Pulitzer Prize with Woodward for their coverage of Watergate for *The Washington Post*. Bernstein's most recent book is the acclaimed biography, A Woman in Charge: The Life of Hillary Rodham Clinton. He is the author, with Woodward, of All the President's Men and The Final Days, and, with Marco Politi, of His Holiness: John Paul II and the History of Our Time.

He is also the author of *Loyalties*, a memoir about his parents during McCarthy—era Washington. He has written for *Vanity Fair* (he is also a contributing editor), *Time*, *USA Today*, *Rolling Stone*, and *The New Republic*. He was a Washington bureau chief and correspondent for ABC News. At *The Washington Post*, Bernstein also was a parttime rock critic, and he still occasionally writes about music

When you call or leave a message, please include the services you plan to attend. All efforts will be made to provide preferred seating to those who give advanced notice. Those requesting handicap seating are only granted up to four additional seats for family members. Wheelchair seating will be released 15 minutes prior to the beginning of services.

### **PARKING**

All individuals entering our campus in vehicles must present their High Holy Day passes or handicap placard to the officers in order to gain access to the Emanu El campus. Anyone without a pass or placard will be directed to offsite parking.

Throughout the High Holy Days, floors 1 & 2 of our parking facility are reserved for the handicapped. Floors 3 & 4 are available for parking on a first-come, first-served basis. Our West Lot is restricted to Rabbi's Circle members with an appropriate pass.

We have made arrangements for parking for our evening services and Yom Kippur Day at the Medical Clinic of Houston, 1707 Sunset. Their garage entry is on Rice Blvd. For Rosh Hashanah Day, you may park at Rice University in 'West Lot 5'. A special entrance flanked by signage will be open between gates 8 & 9 just for our Emanu El guests. This entry point is located off of University Blvd between Montclair & Stockton.

Due to our adequate parking arrangements, Congregation Emanu El will not be responsible for any cars that choose to park in the neighborhoods surrounding the synagogue.

Congregants may park on these streets at their own risk of citation.

NOTE: There is ample parking at the Bayou City Event Center, therefore there is no bus transportation for these alternative locations.




# Throwback Thursday: Emanu El's First Cub Scouts, 1949

# Cleaning the Headstone of a Loved One

As the High Holy Days near, many of us plan visits to our loved ones who are no longer living, including during the Cemetery Memorial Service, **Sunday**, **September 24th at 5:00 p.m.** Before the service, or at any point throughout the year, you may want to take special care of your loved one's grave, particularly cleaning the headstone. Cleaning the headstone is fairly simple and straightforward, and just one of the ways that we fulfill the mitzvah of kavod hamet, respect for the dead. We've provided simple steps and explanations below to help guide you.

# **EOUIPMENT NEEDED:**

- · Medium bristle brush for scrubbing
- Garden hose (stored at Emanu El Memorial Park let us know before you plan to go out so we can make sure it's left for you)
- Spray bottle filled with 50/50 mix of bleach and water OR spray bottle with water only if anything is affixed to the stone (porcelain picture, Holocaust survivor medal, etc.)

STEP 1: Soak headstone with garden hose. If there is mud on the headstone, scrub it down with the brush.

STEP 2: Spray with bleach mix and let sit for a few minutes. Then scrub the stone softly with scrub brush.

## STEP 3: Rinse with garden hose.

Bleach mix will likely splash, so keep that in mind and wear clothing that you don't mind if they get bleached or ruined.
