From Rabbi Hayon



Every year during our worship services on the High Holy Days, the words of our prayer book reassure us that "repentance, prayer, and charity temper judgment's severe decree." This promise comes as a soothing comfort after the intense processes of personal confession that come along with these holy days, and it offers a calming reminder that the power to bring

about forgiveness for our misdeeds is always in our own hands.

However, while these three primary Jewish behaviors comprise the core of the redemptive process outlined by the High Holy Days, I have often thought that there is one ingredient missing from this list of three. In my experience, Jewish learning – just like repentance, prayer, and charity – stands at the center of our experience during the High Holy Days, and provides a firm and vital plank in the foundation of a Jewish life well-lived.

From Rabbi Hayon

During the Days of Repentance, our capacity for learning (both intellectually and spiritually) opens

an iterative process of repentance and self-improvement. Each year brings us new insights about ourselves, and a further refinement of the curriculum for personal growth we need to undertake if we are to live up to our potential for continual improvement in the year ahead. And as we all know, education is most powerful when undertaken as part of a

group; while the spiritual work we do during these holidays is intensely private and individualized, it is especially effective because of how we approach it as a part of a community, side-by-side with fellow seekers and fellow learners.

Fortunately, the year ahead will provide us a number of rich and rewarding opportunities to study together, in both formal and informal ways. I am so excited about all of the rigorous and inspiring opportunities that lie before us which will offer wonderful new modes and topics of study: this fall's engaging iEngage course (an in-depth and rigorous examination of the spiritual values underlying the Israeli-Palestinian conflict), which I will be team-teaching with Rabbi Kahn; our annual Mitzvah Day, which provides the wonderful hands-on opportunity to put Jewish learning into action; and next summer's congregational trip to Israel, which will offer the unparalleled experience of learning about the timeless legacy of our people by walking through the holiest and most precious sites in Jewish history.

In addition to all of these opportunities for us to study together as a community, we have already begun the early phases of the search for a new extraordinary full-time educator to join our staff team. Exciting and expansive thinking is now underway about how our next synagogue educator might build upon the existing strong foundations in the Helfman Religious School while undertaking a broad, integrated approach to congregational learning as a whole. Over the coming weeks and months, I will be convening a number of conversations with individuals and small groups to help refine the process by which we will search for and secure an outstanding professional to lead the next phase of our synagogue's life as a community of learners.

One of the greatest gifts of this holiest season of the Jewish year is the unique way in which is invites us in to candid self-appraisal and radical self-transformation. As always, the mechanism for growth and improvement can be accessed by the reliable tools of repentance, prayer, and charity. This year, it is my hope that the reflective work of repentance you undertake during these holy days will be accompanied – in these days, and in the days ahead – by the restorative and enlightening work of Jewish learning. I wish you and your loved ones a season of inspiration and a new year of enduring sweetness.

Ann Friedman, Ph.D To Deliver Shabbat Shuvah Sermon



Congregation Emanu El will have an opportunity to learn from special guest and congregant Ann Friedman, Ph.D, during Shabbat Shuvah on **Friday**, **October 7th at 6:00 p.m.** in the Barish Sanctuary.

Members of the Houston Jewish community are familiar with Friedman through her work in teaching mindful meditation

throughout the city for adults and for parents and children.

She is one of a rotating group of meditation teachers at Emanu El on Saturday mornings at 9:30 a.m. as well as teaching through her company Mindful Being at the Rothko Chapel, The John McGovern Houston Health and Medical Science Museum, as well as three other synagogues in Houston.

These classes combine Mindfulness Meditation with related Jewish teachings and are open to people of all synagogues and faiths. While taught somewhat differently than secular mindfulness, mindfulness practices are deeply embedded in Judaism.

A Licensed Psychologist who has served as an Adjunct Professor at the University of Houston Counseling Psychology Graduate Program for over ten years, Friedman holds both a Doctorate in Counseling Psychology and a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Houston. She completed her Residency in Clinical Psychology at U.T. Medical School and her Post-Doctoral Fellowship in Clinical Neuropsychology at Baylor College of Medicine.

Since 2007, Friedman has studied mindfulness intensively with various national teachers. In 2015, she received a Certification in Mindfulness Facilitation from the Mindfulness Awareness Research Center of the Semel Institute of Neuroscience and Behavioral Medicine at UCLA. She is now in a program to become an affiliate teacher with UCLA.

In addition to her work, Friedman has been an active community volunteer. For over ten years, she was a member of the Boards of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Greater Houston (Board Chairman), the Houston A+ Challenge (Board Chairman), and the Children's Defense Fund. She continues to serve on the Advisory Boards of these nonprofits. She has also served as a Board member of the Houston Proud, Serve Houston Youth Corp, Tax Reinvestment Zone Nine, Holocaust Museum Houston, The Forum Club, Texas Lyceum Association and the Avondale House for Autistic Children. She has chaired numerous school programs, charity galas and civic events, and has been honored for her volunteer service by a number of organizations.

Friedman lives in Houston, Texas, with her husband, J. Kent Friedman, General Counsel and Chief Administrative Officer of Morae Legal, LL.P. They are the parents of five young adults and the grandparents of eight.

BOARD NOTES – SEPTEMBER 2016

Members of the Board of Trustees attended a Board Retreat in August at which several topics were considered, including Rabbi Hayon's vision for Emanu El; the Bylaw Committee's suggested revisions to the current Bylaws; and the revamped curriculum to be implemented at Helfman.

The Board held its regular monthly meeting on September 13, 2016. At the September meeting, the Board approved a Resolution authorizing a "partnership" with Principle, a branding boutique, to guide Emanu El toward a more cohesive approach for its marketing, communication and web design and presence.

The Security Task Force recommended, and the Board approved, installation of a public address system that will cover the complete building.

Rodney Roth, Senior Vice-President and Chair of the Endowment Fund Board, reported that Steven Fenberg, also a member of the Endowment Fund Board, spearheaded the creation of a new marketing brochure listing all of the funds maintained at Emanu El. Rodney also reported that Emanu El held a reception for all families that have established Emanu El endowment funds.

Three new members have joined the Endowment Fund Board: Dora Klaff, Annie Stein and Gordon Goodman. Rabbi Hayon provided a staffing update: Cantor Sharon Colbert is the cantorial presence on the bimah at B'nei Mitzvah services; Cantor Rollin Simmons will be here for Sukkot; and Rabbi Dan Aronson is our new B'nei Mitzvah coordinator. Rabbi Aronson will also provide administrative support for Helfman.

From the President



As I write this in late September, it's a lovely day – if it were the Fourth of July. All the heat, none of the pretty fireworks. Fall begins and our thoughts turn to Teshuvah, T'filah and Tzedakah. And wishes for just a little cooler weather before we all suit up, spiritually and physically, to be in community in the Days of Awe. If my favorite news programs and my Facebook page are any indication, our

political atmosphere is quite heated as well. I may have a solution, one that is pretty cool.

There are many ways to demonstrate one's preferences. The *Wiktionary* (it's a thing) defines a common idiom: To express one's preferences through one's actions, by voluntarily participating in . . . an activity, group, or process. Our High Holy Days are one Emanu El example of this expression – we show up in great numbers and participate with our families and friends and those with whom we might become closer, know better, at this time next year.

We have a few groups who campaign throughout the year on our behalf and in the greater community, our auxiliaries – Sisterhood, Brotherhood, Helfman Religious School Committee, and our Youth Groups. We formally recognize their importance as each group has representation on the Board of Trustees. Who they are and what they do is of great value.

Each of Sisterhood's is on the ballot with major programs that will include a community service project. All the organizations chosen enable the empowerment of women and help families in need in our community. The Opening Membership Event, August 31st, had dinner and music celebrating Israel, supporting Dress for Success Houston, an organization that strives to empower women by helping them achieve financial independence through employment. November 2nd will be Women's Day – a day filled with compelling speakers and lunch. Sisterhood will be partnering with Becker and Helfman collecting gently used clothing and toys for the House of Tiny Treasures, the family division of SEARCH (founded by Congregation Emanu El members).

In November and January, Houston Food Bank is the beneficiary. Sisterhood will provide food for the holiday season and, in January, serve hot meals at the new Food Bank kitchen. They hope this will become a year-round mitzvah project. On March 23rd, Sisterhood's major fundraiser features an evening with Kinky Friedman (the entertainer, not as a politician), including a food drive for Jewish Family Service to enable them to provide for those in need. Whether at Emanu El (New Traditions Gift Shop, Emanu Elders Monthly Luncheon, Linda Walter Greene Family Camp Scholarships), in the community or beyond (Women of Reform Judaism projects, Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion Rabbinic Scholarships in honor of Rabbis Robert I. Kahn and Roy A. Walter), they are on the trail.

Their platform: Congregation Emanu El Sisterhood Is guided by the principles of our faith and teachings of the Torah We are fully committed to providing meaningful opportunities for continuous learning and warm social relationships while supporting our synagogue in Its endeavors to serve the congregation, the community and the world. Sisterhood is having a membership drive. Membership in and support of Sisterhood enables them

Many organizations (Furniture Bank, Goodwill, etc.) benefit directly and others throughout the year through donations raised by the summer Garage Sale. Each May Brotherhood conducts the Congregant of the Year Dinner, not just your typical rubber chicken dinner. In alternate years, the Chicken Soup Cookoff raises our profile and support for the Houston Food Bank and the Emergency Aid Coalition. Real Men Make Chocolate Matzah, do Mitzvah Day projects, support our Cub Scout and Boy Scout Troops, and provide Greene Family Camp Camperships, making meaningful connections. Medicare Prescription Drug Plan (PDP)

Open enrollment period is between October 15th and December 7th

ATTENTION SENIORS: Your current PDP sponsor should provide you with an Annual Notice of Change about your current prescription drug plan. Review that Notice, which may describe changes in your Plan, including changes to the premium, co-pay, and the drugs covered. If you are satisfied with the changes and want to remain in that Drug Plan, you probably will be told that you do not have to do anything to stay in that Plan for 2017.

If you want to change, or consider changing, to another Plan, the Emanu El Social Action Committee will provide a trained volunteer to assist your analysis of alternatives. To make an appointment between **Monday, October 17th** and **Wednesday, December 7th**, call Donna Fraley at (713) 529-5771, ext. 212 and leave your name, phone number, and the day(s) and time(s) you would like to meet. One of our volunteers will call to help you and schedule an appointment. To change your Prescription Drug Plan, **you must sign up by December 7, 2016**. The change will be effective January 1, 2017.

When you come for your appointment, please bring:

- 1. Your Medicare Card
- 2. Your drug list: name, dosage and frequency of each
- 3. Benefit record from your current PDP Plan or a pharmacy print out of drugs purchased in 2016, if available.

If you want to sign up for a Medicare PDP for the first time, follow the same procedure, and a volunteer will return your call to schedule an appointment. Appointments may be scheduled **no earlier than Monday, October 17, 2016**.



Book Review: *Uncovered* by Leah Lax Thursday, November 10th at 7:00 p.m.


