From Rabbi Hayon



Many centuries ago, when the holiday of Chanukah was first established as a part of the Jewish calendar, the ancient rabbis conferred at length about how best to commemorate the victories of the valorous Maccabees. All agreed that an eight-day festival, with lamps or candles lit on each night, was the proper way to acknowledge the well-known miracle of the oil. When it came time to establish the specifics of how the Chanukah

candles ought to be lit, however, a significant dispute arose between the two major academies of Jewish antiquity.

According to the first, the Academy of Shammai, one ought to light eight flames on the first night of the holiday, and then decrease that number, one candle at a time, over the successive nights. In this way, they reasoned, one can easily keep track of how many days of Chanukah remain. The Academy of Hillel, however, disagreed, insisting that one rather ought to increase the lights, one at a time, until the final night is illuminated by the brightness of eight flames. When pressed for the reasoning behind their decision, the Academy of Hillel offered a simple explanation: "In matters of

Congregation Emanu El will kick off its 2016-17 Endowment Fund Speaker Series entitled Pathway to the Future on **Thursday, December 8th at 7:30 p.m.** as our community will have the opportunity to learn from Cantor Richard Cohn, Director of the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music at HUC-JIR.

Cantor Cohn – who served as Emanu El's "Visiting Cantor" for the High Holy Days – will present, *Music for Prayer: Inspiration and Innovation* and will speak on the Reform Movement's ability to sustain a diverse and vibrant musical culture.

Director of the Friedman School of Sacred Music since July 2015, Cantor Cohn previously served thirty-four years of service to Reform communities. He was most recently Cantor of Temple Emanu-El in Dallas, where he was influential in helping to integrate traditional and contemporary aspects of congregational life, while sustaining

a diverse and vibrant musical culture.

For nineteen years he was Cantor of North Shore Congregation Israel in Glencoe, Illinois, where his areas of specialization included programming for teens and for adult learning. He previously served Oak

holiness, one always ought to increase – not decrease." – [Babylonian Talmud, Shabbat 21b]. The community was persuaded by their reasoning and we follow their practice to this day.

This simple principle – that one always ought to aim toward increasing in holiness – remains a helpful guide for how we conduct ourselves all year long, not just during the holiday of Chanukah. I have always admired those individuals who consistently prioritize the work of self-improvement. Some processes of growth and improvement can be tracked easily: how much weight we can lift or how far we can run, the size of our 401k or the number of sales we have made in a given year. But what does it mean to increase in holiness, and how might we quantify our progress in this area?

It's a difficult question to answer. Certainly, we can (and should) keep track of our charitable giving and the amount of time we spend volunteering, and strive to increase those numbers over time. But what about the more intangible ways in which a life is considered "holy"? Maintaining kindness to our neighbors, inward concern for the most vulnerable, spiritual

connectedness to the rhythms and insights of Jewish life, and an enduring commitment to the people of Israel and the State of Israel – all of these are indicators of a holy life from a Jewish point of view. The teaching of Hillel continues to challenge and encourage us to ask ourselves at all times: What makes my life holy, and how can I make it more so?

The goal to constantly increase in holiness, to remain committed to spiritual growth and improvement, is a helpful guideline for a Jewish life well-lived. Unlike the process of improving our physical (or fiscal) fitness, however, staying hard at work on increasing the holiness of our lives is not fatiguing or risky – or even very difficult, for that matter. On the contrary, the path toward an increasingly holy life requires only that we stay attentive and obedient to the voice of conscience within. Furthermore, the rewards of a commitment to increasing holiness are enormously fulfilling.

And so Hillel's principle remains as a bright beacon during these months of the year when nights are longest and darkest, and the lesson from that first Chanukah ages ago stays with us, urging us to strive continually to increase the holiness of our lives. In this way, our lives comes to resemble the Chanukah menorah, casting an ever-increasing light on the world and the people around us.

Cantor Cohn to Kick Off 2016-17 Endowment **Fund Speaker Series**

Park Temple-B'nai Abraham Zion in suburban Chicago, where he developed personalized approaches to b'nai mitzvah studies. He has been vibrantly involved in worship transformation, and he has had an innovative impact on Jewish choral music as a conductor, arranger and composer.

From 2001 to 2007, Cantor Cohn was president

of the American Conference of Cantors (ACC), the professional organization of the Reform cantorate. He was co-leader of the Shabbat morning service at the Biennial Convention of the Union of Reform Judaism (URJ) in 1997, and he led the URJ Biennial Choir in 2003. He was an active member of the URJ Board and of the URJ Commission on Music, Worship and Religious Living. Cantor Cohn is involved in the work of the Institute

for Jewish Spirituality (IJS), which seeks to cultivate practices of contemplative Judaism as portals to spiritual growth. Having participated in the first cantorial cohort of the Institute, he is now an IJS Fellow, as well as a faculty member of its Clergy Leadership Program. He was a member of the IJS Prayer Project Working Group, and he has taken particular interest in the integration of spiritual practice with areas of prayer, music and education.

All three speakers in this year's series are part of a year-long preparation for Emanu El which will transition from the Gates of Repentance to Mishkan Hanefesh, the Reform Movement's new High Holy Day machzor (prayer book). Emanu El will make this transition in 2017 and each of the speakers will focus on Reform Judaism's dynamic approach to meaningful liturgy and inspiring music:

The remaining speakers are Rabbi Elaine Zecher on Wednesday, January 18th at 7:30 p.m. and Rabbi Samuel E. Karff on Thursday, March 9th at 7:30 p.m.

Rabbi Zecher is Senior Rabbi of Temple Israel in Boston. She will share how prayer is shifting in the Reform Movement and offer 'insider insight' into our new machzor. Rabbi Zecher served as an editor for the new prayer book and played an integral role in helping rabbis – including our own – learn how to integrate the machzor into their home synagogues.

Rabbi Karff serves as Rabbi Emeritus at Congregation Beth Israel. A past President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and the Journal of Reform Judaism's former editor, Rabbi Karff will speak to the rich history of the Reform Movement and how it has progressed to

its current place.

The Board of Trustees unanimously approved this exciting decision at its November Board of Trustees meeting.

Smirnov Catering is run by Vladimir Smirnov, a certified Executive Chef with over 25 years of experience. A chef at Rice Epicurean for 11 years, Smirnov launched his own catering service in 2005 and has been serving the Houston Jewish community and beyond ever since, displaying a sense of professionalism along with quality food offerings.

Smirnov Catering will be the caterer utilized for all synagogue planned functions ranging from board meetings to Becker lunches; from Passover Seder to Egg Foo Shabbas and more.

We remain committed to and protective of the longstanding Emanu El tradition of our members coming together as a community to cook whether it be a Sisterhood donor event, the Gathering Place, Emanu Elders, the Religious School Community Committee's latke making or the Brotherhood's hot dog luncheons.

Congregants and community members hosting events at Emanu El are encouraged to use Smirnov Catering for their events, simchas and outside rentals in which a portion of the proceeds from these events will benefit the synagogue. Our new agreement will help ensure a smooth planning process and beautifully executed events.

Most recently, Smirnov Catering initiated an easy-to-use donation function on their web site or with donations made by phone for purposes of individuals planning shiva/memorial receptions held at the synagogue.

The Board of Trustees also approved a \$250 outside catering fee – an increase of \$150 from the previous catering fee, which was last updated more than 15 years ago. Starting in January 2017, all events not presently under contract will be charged the increased catering fee. These fees will cover ongoing costs of kitchen maintenance and provide funds for future upgrades to the kitchen.

Emanu El will recognize the "Sisterhood Caterers" team in an upcoming Temple *Bulletin* for their years of serve to the Congregational community.

BOARD NOTES

November Board of Trustees Meeting

As the October meeting fell on Yom Kippur, the Board did not meet in October. At the November 3rd meeting, the Board adopted a resolution approving Smirnov Catering as Emanu El's new in-house catering service. Details will be published shortly. The Board recognized Anne Joachim, Rita Wilkenfeld and Inez Taylor for their 40 years of service to the Congregation. The Board approved expenditures for plumbing improvements to address problems that arose in the past month. Repairs will require a brief closing of part of the west lot.

Rebecca Lunstroth reported that the Leadership/ Nominating Committee will begin seeking recommendations for members of our Congregation to be considered for leadership positions on our Board. Work will begin soon on developing our Leadership Training Program.

Rabbi Hayon asked the Board to participate in a group exercise to create a vision of what we would do with a significant contribution. The recurring themes included hiring a Director of Development, updating and expanding our building to accommodate more programming, and encouraging more opportunities for community cohesiveness.

President Jeff Basen-Engquist noted that we are in our sixth month together as a Board. He shared many of our accomplishments to date: successful opening of Helfman Religious School with initial enrollment above our projection, continuing work on bylaws, working with Principle on the branding audit of the Congregation, approving the new catering contract, and hiring our new Executive Director David Lamden (who started on November 7th). He shared that we have covered our recent unplanned physical plant expenses with the generous voluntary contributions of our members and that our membership is increasing.

From the President - Jeff Basen-Engquist



One lesson I was reminded of early on in this leadership position is the importance of listening and being present. Each congregant, volunteer, committee chair, Trustee and member of the clergy has a unique point of view both in their role and as an individual. Conversations require both attentiveness and analysis to ensure that both the message and the messenger are understood to the best of one's ability.

Attending to others is one of the obligations of leadership, which applies in most situations. Whether one is in a verbal transaction with strangers or close friends, listening is a precondition and fundamental to relationship. We have witnessed and felt the strain of recent divisive political events. Listening may be difficult but it may lead to thoughtfulness and kindness. Beyond that I'll leave

the moral implications to our rabbis and instead provide exemplars more in my bailiwick.

One ongoing and two new projects that will affect our organization are underway. In each instance, constituencies are being sought out for input. In the first instance, all congregants were invited to provide feedback following High Holidays. As Rabbi Hayon instituted last year, the survey will provide guidance for our Ritual and Music Committee and clergy. A report is forthcoming.

Second, the Board of Trustees recently approved a working agreement with a local organization, Principle. From their website – It's our mission to deliver beautiful design grounded in smart thinking, by impeccable standards, with the purpose of helping good people bring their brand to the next level. Phase One, a brand audit, began with their team interviewing staff, Board members and others. It is hoped their recommendations will lead to a consistent look, feel and message about us within our space and facing outward, in print and online. There are many potential benefits to this working relationship. You may expect to hear more about this in the spring. Note that what may be a far-reaching project begins with their learning about us.

Finally, rather than planning solely for the leadership of our religious school for next year and beyond, input is being sought from stakeholders in all our education programs, from Becker to Helfman as well as B'nai Mitzvah through adult education. Gathering these experiences and broad aspirations for our education activities will guide the plan for obtaining new and effective leadership in this area.

Bernard Baruch, advisor to seven Presidents, said "Most of the successful people I've known are the ones who do more listening than talking." I believe this applies as well to communities like ours.

Emanu El Announces Continued Enhancements to Campus Security

In the coming weeks, Congregation Emanu El will take another step forward in enhancing the security around its campus and preparing to improve the traffic flow to better accommodate the needs of congregants and visitors.

As part of a Homeland Security grant, a new vehicle and pedestrian gate will be installed on the west side of the campus, extending from just outside the board room to the fence north of the west surface lot. In addition, new access control devices will be installed on the east gate (entry closest to Main St.) as well as the new west vehicle and pedestrian Gates.

The new gate will enclose the west side to better protect this side of the facility and provide better control of vehicles that do not have CEE stickers.

Other recent upgrades to Emanu El include the installation of additional security cameras to the perimeter of the building. One of the recent security cameras installed was purchased by Rice University to help monitor pedestrian traffic coming through our facility by students of the Rice Graduate Apartments.

In an upcoming Temple *Bulletin*, we will share information pertaining to changes to traffic flow around our campus. When these changes occur, the 'east gate' (entry closest to Main St.) will become our primary point of entrance. These changes, in conjunction with the recognition of CEE stickers, will improve congregant's and visitor's access to our facility.



Book Review: *The Marriage of Opposites,* by Alice Hoffman – Thursday, January 12th at 12:30 p.m.



Reviewed by Ellen Grabois; Historical Fiction: "The Marriage of Opposites" is a carefully-researched, imaginative novel about a community of Jews who fled European persecution to the idyllic setting of St. Thomas. Hoffman introduces the reader to Jewish life on the island in the early 1800s. The main character, Rachel, is a passionate "rebel" who dreams of life in faraway Paris. Instead, Rachel is promised in marriage to an older widower with three children. When her husband dies suddenly, the family sends his handsome, much younger nephew, Frédérick Pizzarro, to reinvigorate the family business. Rachel begins her story on her terms as she embarks on a lifetime love affair with and marriage to Frédérick. Fulfilling her girlhood dream, Rachel travels to Paris, where her youngest son, Camille Pissarro, becomes a famous painter. Pissarro, a son of Rachel Pomie and Frédérick Pizzarro, is considered the father of the Impressionist style of painting.


