This year, the first night of Chanukah falls on Tuesday, December 12th. On that night, in households all over America and across the world, Jewish homes will be illumined by the small glow of the festival's first lone candle. As the nights pass and the holiday progresses, more and more candles will be added to our menorahs and the light will grow and grow.

Interestingly, there has not always been unanimous agreement among Jewish authorities about how the candles on our Chanukah menorahs should be kindled. About two thousand years ago, a great rabbinic sage named Shammai taught a different tradition: that on the

Emanu El to Celebrate Cantor Simmons Installation December 15-16th with Family Menorah Lighting Shabbat Service and Concert

This Chanukah, Congregation Emanu El will celebrate the installation of Cantor Rollin Simmons at Let It Shine, a Shabbat service and family Menorah lighting on Friday, December 15th and an evening concert on Saturday, December 16th. Open to the public, the weekend events will highlight the inspiring voice of the new cantor alongside her mentor, Cantor Richard Cohn, Director of the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music at HUC-JIR/New York, and her esteemed colleague, Elana Arian, New York City-based multiinstrumentalist and singer/songwriter.

"The installation weekend is a time to honor Emanu El's sacred partnership with Cantor Simmons through a meaningful, music-filled weekend," said Rabbi Oren Hayon, Senior Rabbi. "We invite our congregants and guests to bring menorahs and candles (five candles, including the shammas for the fourth night) for a

first night of the festival of Chanukah, one should begin with eight candles, and diminish the number of lights on one's menorah, one at a time, as a sort of countdown timer marking the number of days until Chanukah ends. Our current tradition – beginning with a single candle and adding lights over the course of eight nights – was established by Shammai's contemporary (and frequent debate partner) Rabbi Hillel.

Hillel insisted that we add candles to our menorah during the eight days of Chanukah, not subtract them, because, he reasoned, one should always be ma'alin bakodesh – seeking to increase holiness day by day. Hillel's guidance is still relevant today, and his instruction remains a helpful touchstone for Jewish life: we should live in such a way that our words and deeds increase light and holiness in the world around us.

This year, our congregation's celebration of Chanukah presents us with a new opportunity to be ma'alin bakodesh, increasing holiness and light in our temple community. Our Shabbat service on **December 15th** will include the Service of Installation for our extraordinary new cantor, Rollin Simmons. All of us who have had the opportunity to be led in prayer and song with

Cantor Simmons take great joy in the way she "lights up" a room or a circle of prayer – and so it is altogether fitting that the theme of this very special Shabbat on which we celebrate her official congregational installation, will be "Let it Shine." Friday night's service will include Cantor Richard Cohn, the Director of the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music at HUC-JIR in New York (and a familiar face at Emanu El!); the main event on Saturday evening will be a spectacular concert featuring singersongwriter Elana Arian performing alongside Cantor Simmons. I hope that you will plan to join us for all of these events! See page 4 for more information and sponsorship opportunities.

For many centuries, our spiritual community has cherished the tradition of warming and brightening our homes during this time of year by adding a small bit of light, one flame at a time, for the eight nights of Chanukah. We made some recommendations to the staff about wheelchair seating, we've requested and received step stools in the major restrooms so that everyone is comfortable using the sinks, and requested that the building and grounds committee look into providing a ramp to the bimah in the chapel. We're planning a festive Oneg in February to mark Jewish Disability Awareness month. If you have mobility issues and need assistance while in the building, please look for a staff member or security guard who will be happy to help you. We have wheelchairs avail-

able for use in the building. Just ask!




Emanu El Provides Meals for Nechama – Jewish Disaster Relief Organization

How A World Series Wager Was A Win for Our Communities

Article written by Emanu El program director Jason Plotkin published on the ReformJudaism.org website in mid-November.



What do good deli, Talmudic teaching, tzedakah (using money to do the work of world-repair or, literally, justice) and the 2017 World Series have in common? For a pair of rabbis in the Reform Movement, plenty!

Moments after the Houston Astros clinched their World Series berth with a Game 7 victory over the New York Yankees in the American League Championship Series, I messaged the senior staff at Congregation Emanu El in Houston: "We need to make a wager against Stephen Wise Temple in Los Angeles."

The team chimed in instantly; they were in. Senior Rabbi Oren Hayon agreed to reach out to Yoshi Zweiback, his rabbinic colleague at Stephen Wise. Would our friends in California accept? The answer was affirmative! What to bet on...? What could be included?

In addition to having their beloved baseball teams headed into the World Series, the two communities shared something else: disasters and devastation. Though it did not suffer the extensive damage of other synagogues in the Houston community, Emanu El suffered several hundred thousand dollars of damage to our campus during Hurricane Harvey,

including a roof leak and significant moisture in the walls of its school building. Additionally, more than 150 of the 1800 families that make Emanu El their spiritual home sustained damage related to the hurricane. For some, it was the second or third time in as many years.

For our friends in California, the 485-acre URJ Camp Newman in Santa Rosa, CA, sustained significant structural damage in the recent fires in Northern California. Many families at Stephen Wise had sent their kids to the site ravaged by the fires, which was bought in 1997 and serves more than 1,400 children each summer. (The camp recently announced plans to operate at Cal State University – Maritime Academy during the upcoming summer.

With a friendly wager and the vehicle that is social media, we could remind our own communities and those beyond that Hurricane Harvey relief is still much needed and how difficult it is for those in California not to have access to their beloved camp site for the summer of 2018.

The wager was simple. If the Dodgers won, Emanu El would treat the Stephen Wise staff to pecan pies from Goode Company, a popular barbecue restaurant that ships its pies throughout the country. It also would donate to Camp Newman. Rabbi Zweiback accepted Emanu El's challenge on behalf of Stephen Wise and countered with this: if the Astros win, Stephen Wise would send a platter of meat from Factor's Famous Deli and donate to Emanu El's Hurricane Harvey relief efforts.

Throughout the closely contested World Series, Rabbis Hayon and Zweiback had fun with the wager, trading videos back and forth on their respective synagogue's Facebook pages. Some of Rabbi Zweiback's videos featured Dodger Stadium in the background and in others, he jokingly took phone calls from congregants in need of rabbinic advice, all the while touting the Dodgers' Jewish star Joc Pederson. Hayon, in his videos, scarfed down pecan pie and made a visit to Houston's Kenny & Ziggy's Deli, all in hopes of celebrating what Emanu El would not send, and in anticipation of the forthcoming deli treats from Los Angeles. The videos, a mix of Talmudic teachings and comedic antics, went viral, and were featured on KHOU-TV in Houston and KCAL-TV in Los Angeles, as well as in several Jewish publications.

After the series, Zweiback paid up on the promise of Stephen Wise Temple, which included the deli platter and a donation for to the congregation's Hurricane Harvey relief fund. In honor of his colleague, Hayon announced in his "victory video" that a donation would be made to Camp Newman on behalf of Emanu El.

Though the World Series is over, and the Astros have their first-ever World Series title, the work in both communities is far from done. The Reform Jewish community prays for Camp Newman's recovery, renewal, and restoration, citing a Jewish star on the hill overlooking the camp that survived the fire, as a sign of hope for the future. Our community in Houston is still very much in recovery mode. At Emanu El, the remediation work required following the aftermath of the storm is nearly complete, and our member families continue to rebuild their homes and their lives.


The Ronald McDonald Holcombe House is a home away from home for families whose seriously ill children are being treated at a Texas Medical Center member institution.

No stranger to the grind of Washington, Bernstein began part-time work at the *Washington Star* at the age of 16 and later dropped out of the University of Maryland to work full-time as a reporter. Bernstein made a historic name for himself when along with Bob Woodward, he uncovered the Watergate scandal which led to the resignation of U.S. President Richard Nixon.

Bernstein shared a Pulitzer Prize with Woodward for their coverage of Watergate for *The Washington Post*. Bernstein's most recent book is the acclaimed biography, A Woman in Charge: The Life of Hillary Rodham Clinton. He is the author, with Woodward, of All the President's Men and The Final Days, and, with Marco Politi, of His Holiness: John Paul II and the History of Our Time.

He is also the author of *Loyalties*, a memoir about his parents during McCarthy—era Washington. He has written for *Vanity Fair* (he is also a contributing editor), *Time, USA Today, Rolling Stone*, and *The New Republic*. He was a Washington bureau chief and correspondent for ABC News. At *The Washington Post*, Bernstein also was a part-time rock critic, and he still occasionally writes about music.


