FROM RABBI HAYON



I believe that the collective joy and celebration of Yom HaAtzma'ut is possible only because it emerges so swiftly from the darkness and grief of Yom HaShoah and Yom HaZikaron.

This month the Jewish community observes the days that have become known as "the new High Holy Days" in Israel: Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Memorial Day), Yom HaZikaron (Memorial Day for Israel's fallen soldiers and victims of terror), and Yom HaAtzma'ut (Israel Independence Day).

The observance of these days in Israel's national life is certainly different from the way in which military remembrance and national independence are celebrated in our country.

Here in America, the Fourth of July is celebrated most often with cookouts and fireworks and Memorial Day is a time for families to get away for a carefree vacation on the beach. In Israel, however, these tightly-clustered holidays (all three days are observed within the span of a single week) produces an emotional and patriotic intensity which is, to my knowledge, unparalleled in any other modern nation.

The emotional potency of these weighty days comes in part from Israel's relative youth among the community of nations; unlike America's, Israel's attainment of national independence was an event that remains in the memory of those still living. But it is also a result of the way in which all three are nestled closely against each other in the calendar.

I believe that the collective joy and celebration of *Yom HaAtzma'ut* is possible only because it emerges so swiftly from the darkness and grief of *Yom HaShoah* and *Yom HaZikaron*. This experience was of course not accidental; the decisions by the Chief Rabbinate and Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion to establish these days of national mourning were undertaken as a way to address the raw and overpowering emotions of Israel's citizens following the tumultuous events of the 1940s – and their choices proved to be strongly resonant with a seasonal pattern already well-established in Jewish life.

The cathartic experience of moving swiftly from national grief to collective celebration is one echoed by countless stories from Jewish history, not just in modern Zionist history. Our people has experienced the dissolution and subsequent reunion of the patriarchs' and matriarchs' families; the transition from Egyptian slavery to autonomy in the Promised Land; the psalmist's assurance that "those who sow in tears will reap in joy" [Psalm 126:5], and many others.

And so, as we travel together through the emotional peaks and valleys of this season's spiritual landscape, a primal emotional experience is awakened within us anew. The tragedy and triumph of Israel's history therefore, in literal and figurative ways, belongs to us personally as well. As we mourn and celebrate these days together, our observances are at once modern and ancient, national and personal; I look forward to sharing these holy days with you again this year.

Houston's community-wide observance of Yom HaShoah will be hosted by our congregation and will take place in the Barish Sanctuary on Sunday, April 15th, beginning at 3:00 p.m. Please join us for this solemn opportunity to mourn the victims of the Holocaust and pay tribute to those who fought for liberation.

Changes to High Holy Day Schedule; Full Schedule to Be Announced in Upcoming Bulletins

At the Board of Trustees' January meeting, the Board elected to move all Rosh Hashanah services to Congregation Emanu El. In previous years, one of the two Rosh Hashanah morning services had been offered at the Bayou Center.

At a subsequent meeting in March, the Board approved the Ritual & Music committee's recommendation to add a contemporary service on Erev Rosh Hashanah to the current liturgical offerings.

In addition, a modified Rosh Hashanah morning service will feature elements of both "A Time to Pray" and the morning service from *Mishkan HaNefesh*, the new High Holy Day prayer book introduced at Emanu El last year. Many of the popular readings from 'A Time to Pray' are part of *Mishkan HaNefesh*.

A full High Holy Day worship schedule will be shared in upcoming editions of the *Bulletin*.

Memorial Plaques

Our vendor has indicated that they anticipate a turnaround time of as long as three months for memorial plaques due to the influx of memorial plaque requests that they receive prior to the High Holy Days from synagogues across the country.

This year's deadline for the *Book of Memory* for the Congregation will be on **Wednesday**, **August 2nd**.

This coming year will be the second in which we have utilized *Mishkan NaNefesh*, the Reform Movement's new prayer books for the High Holy Days. The books based on the post-High Holy Day survey were very well received.

encouragement, I was granted greater responsibility. Lessons learned from other leaders proved invaluable. I urge you to find your niche among our volunteers. A large organization such as ours requires all kinds of support, from financial, to intellectual, to sweat equity. High Holy Day ushering, tikkun olam actions, budgeting, welcoming, planning, teaching and grieving are experiences we share as a faith community. Each of us has talents and gifts to contribute. If our experiences compare, you will receive in return more than you gave and your gift to the community will lead to others.

Inspired by our rabbis and in preparing for this moment, I researched gratitude and found, in the Mishneh Torah, three types of blessing described: for deriving benefit, for fulfilling a mitzvah, and the blessing of thanks.

I have benefitted and am most grateful for your trust, patience and guidance during the last two years. In the quiet moments after becoming President there was this, "Flying by the seat of your pants precedes crashing by the seat of your pants." (Bill Walsh) Preparation precedes inspiration. I have drawn on the knowledge acquired in a lifetime as part of a variety of organizations and on the participatory leadership skills developed in formal and unconventional groups. Like a good quarterback, I have tried to keep my eyes downfield, even as the daily crush closed in. It is exhilarating to see our recent accomplishments and plans and humbling to know I was a part of the leadership in this journey together.

I have witnessed innumerable good deeds performed by and for this congregation. I will spend time at the Annual Meeting thanking my friends and colleagues more specifically. From the rather unique perch I have occupied, the commitment of clergy, staff, and congregants of all stripes has been awe-inspiring to observe. Each day there are those who spend time unobserved and those who go beyond their job descriptions for us. Leadership at any level attracts criticism, sometimes undeserved. To each of you who has seen beyond those moments to elevate the dialogue and stay the course, thank you.

And I have received more than my share of thanks. Don't get me wrong. Sometimes they lit the path. However, behind each occasion or decision drawing appreciation, there was a team of volunteers and staff who did most of the heavy lifting. As you encounter them, please express your appreciation to them.

At Shabbat services, Rabbi Fixler frequently suggests that one way to fill the moment of silent prayer is to list five things for which one is grateful, noting "I guarantee it will change your life." This lesson, reflecting teachings from the Mussar, stems from the term gratitude, hakarat hatov, "recognizing the good." These days, Rabbi, my list is much longer than five. I have been blessed and honored to observe the good as your President. It has changed my life. I look forward to continuing to build our future together.




