Emanu El Hosting Special in Uniform Director Lt. Col. Tiran Attia Wednesday, October 24th at 7:30 p.m.



Several years ago, a sermon by Congregation Emanu El's Rabbi Roy Walter given on a Shabbat evening shined light on a division of the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) called "Special in Uniform" that aimed to integrate young people with autism and other disabilities into the IDF.

On Wednesday, October 24th at 7:30 p.m., Emanu El and the Jewish National Fund (JNF) will host the director of Special in Uniform, Lt. Col. (Res.) Tiran Attia. This program held in the Barish Sanctuary at Emanu El is co-sponsored by Jewish Family Services, the Texas Region of the Friends of IDF and Kehillah High School.

Attia serves at the helm of this program which is sponsored by JNF and not only allows young people with autism and disabilities to serve in the IDF, provides them with a sense of nationalism.

Following their service, Special in Uniform helps usher its graduates towards a self-sufficient life, through employment or other meaningful societal involvement.

Over the course of his distinguished 28-year career in the IDF, Attia has commanded a tank, the IDF's

High Holy Day Message from your President

The below remarks from President Rodney Roth were shared during Erev Rosh HaShanah services.

Shanah Tovah,

I would like to welcome those who are joining us for the first time as new members, our long-standing members, our guests, and those who may be joining us from distant places through our live streaming broadcast – a special warm welcome to all of you. When I started crafting ideas for this evening's message, I consulted with a few colleagues, including a few past presidents and our clergy team, on the key to a successful high holiday message. While most were not reluctant to provide sound guidance, the advice I decided to implement, originated from the 32nd president of the United States, and my father's namesake, Franklin Delano Roosevelt. His advice for delivering a successful message can be summarized by three main attributes - be sincere, be brief, and be seated!

But seriously, as we start to settle in, with the comforting blend of enthusiasm and optimism for a sweet New Year, and the all-encompassing beauty of familiar words and music we are about to hear, I would like to reflect on the rich history of this congregation as we approach our 75th anniversary – in particular, those 190 founding families, that included my grandparents, who paved the way and crafted the vision that we continue to follow to this day. I marvel over the fact that since our humble beginnings in June 1944, this congregation has continued to gather for services and torah study every week, notwithstanding, the cold war, the Iraq war, the devastation of Hurricane Harvey, and most recently the loss of the Houston Texans to the New England Patriots.

Lightheartedness aside, as we approach our 75th anniversary in the coming year, I have to ask the questions: Why as a congregation have we been able to persevere all of these years? How have we been able to grow from a community of 190 families to nearly 1800, with a robust budget and endowment? And how do we position ourselves for the future? Let me offer my thoughts.

First, it is because at every stage of our rich congregation's history, our predecessors, who sat on this same bimah, appreciated and respected what they had inherited. Rabbi Kahn, of blessed memory, and all previous leaders both professional and lay, gave their time and talents to protect and nurture this precious asset so that they too could pass it on to their children and community.

And how do we position ourselves for the next 75 years? Simply, my friends, the answer is inscribed on the walls of our beautiful sanctuary – Do justly, love mercy, walk humbly with God and Be a light unto the Nation. Those powerful words communicate the essence by which we as Jews live; with spiritual meaning and dedication to the service of the Jewish people and all humanity.

Each of us has different interests and touch points for connection to synagogue life, and different levels of commitment to our practice of Judaism. Each of us has different ways in which we want to make this world a better place, and different ideas about how to support Israel. Therein lies the beauty of our congregation with its wealth of opportunities to get involved, meticulously developed by our predecessors and nurtured by today's rabbis and committee leaders. From Adult Education to Budget and Building Maintenance, from Early Childhood Education to Social Action and planning the Cantorial Concert and Gala for our 75th anniversary, there is something to peek everyone's interests and inspire you to get involved. I want to encourage you this year to find a least one way to involve yourself more deeply in our community; I promise you will find it fulfilling and meaningful.

Our fundamental belief in universal inclusion motivates us to create an inviting and lively environment in this, our spiritual home. I would like to promote a community that is not only warm and welcoming but also inclusive of new ideas, the pursuit of understanding and planning for a robust future.

And so, as we prepare to pray and learn together in the coming days, we celebrate how collectively blessed we are to have such excellent spiritual leadership – Rabbis Hayon, Silk, Fixler, Walter, and Cantor Simmons. We celebrate our professional staff who ensure that our programs are fulfilling, energetic, and stimulating, and that this magnificent architectural space remains a source of pride for its members and community.

We celebrate our Becker School and Helfman Religious School, and all of the educators that diligently share their talents and love with us and our children. While we celebrate all of these gifts that our forbearers have blessed us with, we optimistically look forward to continuing this rich legacy as we prepare to celebrate our 75th and beyond.

On behalf of my wife Robin, and our children, Gavin and Cameron, let me wish each of you, your families, and your loved ones, a Shanah Tovah – a sweet year of good health, happiness, peace, and celebration. Amen.



A graduate of Bellaire High School, Judge Emmett received his undergraduate degree in Economics at Rice and Masters' of Public Affairs degree at the University of Texas at Austin. A former member of the Texas House of Representatives, Judge Emmett has received numerous awards and honors during his accomplished career including Distinguished Alumnus of Rice University, the Distinguished Public Service Award from the Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs, and the Presidential Call to Service Award.

Lindner raised to local and even national notoriety during Hurricane Harvey. The meteorologist served as a reassuring voice during the storm, calmly updating millions via news conferences and Twitter about rising water levels across the greater Houston metropolitan area.

A 2003 graduate with a degree in meteorology at Texas A&M University, Lindner started at the Harris County Flood Control District as an interim in 2003 before coming on full-time a year later. He has since risen to the ranks of Harris County's chief meteorologist.

Blood Drive to be held **Sunday, March 24, 2019** at Emanu El; Congregants Encouraged to Give Blood at Blood Centers in Interim

In response to congregants asking how they could help Rabbi Roy Walter in his battle with cancer, Congregation Emanu El is asking individuals to donate blood in honor of Rabbi Walter or a loved one.

Individuals who indicate that they are giving for Rabbi Walter will also enable the Rabbi to accrue "credits" towards his needs for blood, which is a normal part of treatment and recovery.

To aid in this process, Emanu El is partnering with MD Anderson to host a blood drive on Sunday, March 24th inconjunction with the Purim Carnival.

MD Anderson also advises individuals to think about scheduling an appointment at their MD Anderson Blood Donor Center (located at 2555 Holly Hall St). Free parking is available at the Holly Hall location with hours of operation on Tuesday – Thursday from 10:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. and Friday – Monday from 10:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Platelets can be donated every 48 hours while 'whole blood' can be donated every 56 days.

In order to give blood, once must be in good general health and feeling well. Individuals must be at least 17-years old, weight at least 110 lbs., have a photo ID and not be pregnant.

New Roof Installation Underway; Two Parking Areas Impacted During Project

Emanu El Seeking to Create Euchre Play Group



In response to a call out for congregants to inform the synagogue on what they would like to see, a member of our congregation is seeking to start a Euchre Play Group at Emanu El.

Euchre is a card game that is popular in the Midwest (Ohio, Michigan) and similar

to one played in South Africa, called Klaverjas. Euchre is a trick-taking card game most commonly played with four people in two partnerships with a deck of 24 cards (Nine through Ace). Each player is dealt five cards. Similar to Bridge (but much, much simpler), there is at most two rounds of bidding to select a trump suit and play begins.

The one anomaly is that only in the trump suit, the jack of that suit is the highest card (the right Bower) and the jack of the other same-color suit is the second highest card (left Bower). Otherwise, cards are ranked as expected with an Ace being the highest and the 9 being the lowest. The object of each hand is for the team that selected the trump suit to take three "tricks" out of a possible five. The team gets one point for taking three or four ticks, two points for taking all five tricks. If the team is unsuccessful, the other team gets two points for "Euchring" them. The first team to reach ten points wins.






Becker Update
