FROM RABBI HAYON



One can make the case that Jews are compelled by our tradition to participate actively in the work of democracy – even though we are not compelled by American law to do so.

You will have received this month's *Bulletin* right around Election Day for this year's midterm elections. It is still too early for any solidly verifiable numbers, but it seems clear (even as I write these words in October) that voter turnout this year will far surpass that of other years in recent memory.

Voter-turnout records are unusual for a midterm election, and are especially notable here in Texas, where the percentage of eligible voters who show up at their local polling place is traditionally very low.

Of course, voter apathy is not endemic only to Texas; America in general struggles with sluggish turnout at the polls. In the 2018 presidential election, a meager 55% of voting-eligible Americans cast their ballot (and presidential elections are when turnout rates are highest!). This rate places our country near the bottom of all industrialized democratic nations. The voter-turnout ranking list is topped by countries like Belgium (where 87% of eligible adults cast their vote) and Australia (79%), where nationwide voting is compulsory under the law.

Interestingly, Israel also lands very close to the top of the list; in the Jewish state, 76% of eligible voters make their voices heard by casting a ballot for the party of their choice. But voting is not mandatory for Israelis, so why would this be the case? How can we explain the fact that Israelis are so engaged and enthusiastic about voting while Americans are not?

It is possible that the roots of Jewish democratic engagement lie deep in the layers of Jewish text and tradition. Deuteronomy 16:18 commands: "You shall appoint magistrates and officials for your tribes, in all the settlements that the Eternal your God is giving you, and they shall govern the people justly." The rabbinic commentators derive from this verse that the people themselves ("You shall appoint...") are responsible to actively participate in the selection of their leaders; the responsibility should not be abrogated to prophet or kings. Moreover, the Israelites are instructed to choose officials who will best represent the interests and priorities of their local home communities ("...for your tribes"), so they will be represented faithfully in the highest levels of government.

Hence, one can make the case that Jews are compelled by our tradition to participate actively in the work of democracy – even though we are not compelled by American law to do so. A national population of engaged citizens and enthusiastic voters is always healthier and more sustainable than one which suffers from apathy and disinterest, and it is reassuring to know that this lesson – which is deeply-seated among our brothers and sisters in Israel may indeed have Jewish roots – may have begun at last to make its way into our national culture in America at large. This, after all, is the best way for all of us to ensure that our elected officials "shall govern the people justly." May it be so.

Emanu El Responds to Pittsburgh Tragedy

The below text from Rabbi Oren Hayon was e-mailed to the congregation on Saturday, October 27th following the tragedy at Tree of Life Congregation in Pennsylvania.

Today was a dark and heart-rending day for all of us. Our community has been shaken to its core by this morning's unthinkable murders in Pittsburgh. Both as Jews and as Americans, we are sadly well-acquainted with violence and bigotry, but the horror of this crime is especially shocking. For an anti-Semitic terrorist to take the lives of innocent people at prayer, during the tranquility and sweetness of Shabbat, is an unprecedented event in our nation which must be grieved with seriousness and intention.

This evening, our entire congregational community is united in our desire for comfort and healing. We mourn alongside the victims' families and loved ones, and we hope to share with you very soon about how our Jewish community will be responding to the spiritual needs of our congregational family during this very dark time. Until then, we take comfort from the words of the Kaddish, which reassures us that God, who is the Maker of Peace on high, will in time bring peace and wholeness to this suffering and fragmented world.

As always, our congregation's leadership is working quickly and in close collaboration with our security and law enforcement partners to ensure your safety and peace of mind, and our full clergy team stands ready to offer emotional and pastoral care as needed. Tonight, the entire Jewish community remains strongly united to our vision of peace and goodwill, even as we share these bitter tears of grief and loss.

May God grant peace to those who mourn and comfort the bereaved among us. Amen.


Emanu El Hosts RAC – Texas Section Conference

Emanu El Seeking to Create Euchre Play Group



In response to a call out for congregants to inform the synagogue on what they would like to see, a member of our congregation is seeking to start a Euchre playgroup at Emanu El.

Euchre is a card game that is popular in the Midwest (Ohio,

Michigan) and similar to one played in South Africa, called Klaverjas. Euchre is a trick-taking card game most commonly played with four people in two partnerships

with a deck of 24 cards (Nine through Ace). Each player is dealt five cards. Similar to Bridge (but much, much simpler), there is at most two rounds of bidding to select a trump suit and play begins.

The one anomaly is that only in the trump suit, the jack of that suit is the highest card (the right Bower) and the jack of the other same-color suit is the second highest card (left Bower). Otherwise, cards are ranked as expected with an Ace being the highest and the 9 being the lowest. The object of each hand is for the team that selected the trump suit to take three "tricks" out of a possible five. The team gets one point for taking three or four ticks, two points for taking all five tricks. If the team is unsuccessful, the other team gets two points for "Euchring" them. The first team to reach ten points wins.

Several Options of Involvement Available to Donate Blood, Platelets

In response to congregants asking how they could help Rabbi Roy Walter in his battle with cancer, Congregation Emanu El is asking individuals to donate blood in honor of Rabbi Walter or a loved one.

Individuals who indicate that they are giving for Rabbi Walter will also enable the Rabbi to accrue 'credits' towards his needs for blood, which is a normal part of treatment and recovery.

To aid in this process, there are several options available:

- Emanu El is partnering with MD Anderson to host a platelet drive for Rabbi Walter at MD Anderson's facility, 2555 Holly Hall on Sunday, December 16th.
 There are six spots available at each of the time slots 10:00 a.m., 12:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m. on a first-come, first-serve basis and registration can be done on EmanuElHouston.org. It takes approximately two hours to complete the process.
- MD Anderson also advises individuals to think about scheduling an appointment at their MD Anderson Blood Donor Center located at 2555 Holly Hall St. Free parking is available at the Holly Hall location with hours of operation on Tuesday – Thursday from 10:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. and Friday – Monday from 10:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.
- Lastly, a community-wide blood drive will be held in conjunction with Emanu El's annual Purim Carnival on Sunday, March 24th. More details to come.

Please note that platelets can be donated every 48 hours while 'whole blood' can be donated every 56 days. In order to give blood, once must be in good general health and feeling well. Individuals must be at least 17-years old, weight at least 110 lbs., have a photo ID and not be pregnant.

Medicare Part D – Volunteers Available to Assist

ATTENTION SENIORS: Your current PDP sponsor should provide you with an Annual Notice of Change about your current prescription drug plan. Review that Notice, which may describe changes in your Plan, including changes to the premium, co-pay, and the drugs covered. If you are satisfied with the changes and want to remain in that Drug Plan, you probably will be notified that you do not have to do anything to stay in that Plan for 2019. However, you might be advised that you current plan will be discontinued or merged with another plan for 2019. In such case, you may want to review your options before accepting that change.

If you want to change, or consider changing, to another Plan, the Emanu El Social Action Committee will provide a trained volunteer to assist your analysis of alternatives. To make an appointment between October 15th and December 7th, please call (713) 529-5771, ext. 212 and leave your name, phone number, and the day(s) and time(s) you would like to meet. One of our volunteers will call to help you and schedule an appointment. Do not wait until the last minute to make your call.

To change your Prescription Drug Plan, you must sign up by December 7th. The change will be effective January 1, 2019.

When you come for your appointment, please bring: your medicare card, your drug list (name, dosage, frequency of each) and benefit record from your current PDP plan or pharmacy print out of drugs purchased in 2018, if available.

If you want to sign up for a Medicare PDP for the first time, follow the same procedure, and a volunteer will return your call to schedule an appointment.


