FROM RABBI HAYON



Difficult times remind us to count our blessings – to remain grateful for the countless gifts we enjoy every day. And they also invite us to recommit ourselves to the core Jewish principles of hospitality and tzedakah at this season of the year.

This week, the worldwide Jewish community welcomes the brightness of Chanukah into our homes. As we all know, since the Jewish calendar is based on a modified lunar schedule, the dates of Chanukah shift from year to year. And as it shifts, we may notice that our perspective on the Festival of Lights changes along with it.

At times, when our celebrations fall closer to our Christian neighbors' celebration of Christmas, the festive gift-giving aspects of Hanukkah may feel more prominent to us; when Chanukah includes the night of the winter solstice, December 21st, we may experience even more powerfully its symbolic themes of bringing light into dark places. This year, however, Chanukah begins on December 2nd closer to Thanksgiving than to Christmas - and as a result, I find myself reflecting on the ways in which Hanukkah can be experienced as an extension of our practice of gratitude.

Over the past month, we have had many opportunities to think about the plentiful comforts and privileges we

by Noah Aronson. We here at Emanu El were honored to be part of Noah's latest endeavor, The Chai Project: 18 New Songs for 18 Communities. In 2018, Noah collaborated with clergy teams and lay-leaders, fellow musicians and songwriters, community choirs, poets, recording engineers, producers and many more to create individualized musical works celebrating the unique life of each community. (For those who may not know, the Hebrew word for life is Chai – and the letters that spell it equal 18.)

Our Emanu El team consisted of Rabbi Hayon writing the lyrics, Alex Navarro arranging for many instruments, and me consulting, singing and working with our choirs to prepare for the recording and this upcoming performance. We recorded our song with Nathan Malek at SugarHill Studios here in Houston. The full album will be released at Chanukah time, and you can currently hear our recording when you check out the concert on our homepage at emanuelhouston.org.

In crafting the lyrics for our song, Rabbi Hayon found examples from our sacred texts to match each of the three instructions:

I will do justice Speak up for those who are not free Like Abraham and Sarah Their words still speak in me
I will love mercy
And the neighbor by my side
Like Moses taught our people
As he led us through the night
I will walk humbly
I will learn and give and grow
Like Ruth said to her people
"Where you go, I will go!"

Just as we learn from our biblical ancestors, we also see role models within our own congregation upholding these principles: people who work toward justice and equality, who strive to always be welcoming, who often do without being asked. This concert will provide an opportunity to delve more deeply into these ideas of justice, mercy, and humility, as we envision our next 75 years here at Emanu El.

The chorus of our song features our well-known Hebrew text: Hinei Mah Tov... How good and how pleasant it is for brothers and sisters to dwell together. We are so honored to welcome Elana and Noah back to our bimah, as so much of their music has become part of our regular prayer experience here at Emanu El. I cannot wait to gather together with all of you to begin celebrating this most wondrous community.

Congregation Emanu El Seeks Blood Donors in Honor of Rabbi Walter, Loved Ones

Several Options of Involvement Available to Donate Blood, Platelets

In response to congregants asking how they could help Rabbi Roy Walter in his battle with cancer, Congregation Emanu El is asking individuals to donate blood in honor of Rabbi Walter or a loved one.

Individuals who indicate that they are giving for Rabbi Walter will also enable the Rabbi to accrue 'credits' towards his needs for blood, which is a normal part of treatment and recovery.

To aid in this process, there are several options available:

Emanu El is partnering with MD Anderson to host a
platelet drive for Rabbi Walter at MD Anderson's
facility, 2555 Holly Hall on Sunday, December 16th.
There are six spots available at each of the time
slots – 10:00 a.m., 12:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m. – on a

- first-come, first-serve basis and registration can be done on EmanuElHouston.org. It takes approximately two hours to complete the process.
- 2. MD Anderson also advises individuals to think about scheduling an appointment at their MD Anderson Blood Donor Center located at 2555 Holly Hall St. Free parking is available at the Holly Hall location with hours of operation on Tuesday Thursday from 10:00 a.m. 6:00 p.m. and Friday Monday from 10:00 a.m. 5:00 p.m.
- Lastly, a community-wide blood drive will be held in conjunction with Emanu El's annual Purim Carnival on Sunday, March 24th. More details to come.

Please note that platelets can be donated every 48 hours while 'whole blood' can be donated every 56 days. In order to give blood, one must be in good general health and feeling well. Individuals must be at least 17-years old, weigh at least 110 lbs., have a photo ID and not be pregnant.

Emanu El Seeking to Create Euchre Play Group



In response to a call out for congregants to inform the synagogue on what they would like to see, a member of our congregation is seeking to start a Euchre play group at Emanu El.

Euchre is a card game that is popular in the Midwest (Ohio,

Michigan) and similar to one played in South Africa, called Klaverjas. Euchre is a trick-taking card game most commonly played with four people in two partnerships with a deck of 24 cards (Nine through Ace). Each player is dealt five cards. Similar to Bridge (but much, much simpler), there is at most two rounds of bidding to select a trump suit and play begins.

The one anomaly is that only in the trump suit, the jack of that suit is the highest card (the right Bower) and the jack of the other same-color suit is the second highest card (left Bower). Otherwise, cards are ranked as expected with an Ace being the highest and the 9 being the lowest. The object of each hand is for the team that selected the trump suit to take three "tricks" out of a possible five. The team gets one point for taking three or four ticks, two points for taking all five tricks. If the team is unsuccessful, the other team gets two points for

"Euchring" them. The first team to reach ten points wins.


