FROM RABBI HAYON



Perhaps the key to Rabbi Simeon's teaching is that both holidays are acknowledgements of the power and value of human relationships.

This month, a very special but little-known Jewish holiday will begin on the evening of **July 23**. The festival, an ancient Jewish celebration of romantic love, came into being centuries ago at the hands of the sages in Jerusalem.

Sometimes called, the Jewish Valentine's Day, Tu B'Av falls on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Av (its name comes from the Hebrew letters spelling the word "Tu," which have a mathematical value of 15), and the accounts of how it was observed in antiquity are stirring and beautiful.

According to legend, the observance of Tu B'Av was inspired by the romantic poetry of Shir HaShirim, the biblical Song of Songs. When the summer full moon would reach its peak, glowing brightly above the ramparts of Jerusalem, young Jewish women would dress all in white and parade outside the city walls, dancing together in the fields. The men would soon follow, hoping to find love in the warmth of the summer night.

The first-century rabbi Simeon ben Gamliel said: "The most joyful days for the Jewish people are the 15th day of

Av, and the Day of Atonement." [Mishnah Ta'anit 4:8] At first glance, this teaching strikes us as surprising and incongruous. How can one draw a comparison between Yom Kippur, the most solemn day of the Jewish calendar, and the light-hearted frivolity of Tu B'Av?

Perhaps the key to Rabbi Simeon's teaching is that both holidays are acknowledgements of the power and value of human relationships. On Tu B'Av, the Jewish Valentine's Day, loving couples are drawn closer to one another, while Yom Kippur invites us deeper into relationship with ourselves and with God. The two holidays are paired in Rabbi Simeon's philosophy in order to remind us that we must employ both reflection and joy to enrich the bonds that tie us to other people, and to the deepest part of ourselves as well.

NEWS FROM AROUND THE CONGREGATION

Plotkin Assumes Role of PEPRJ President



Emanu El Program Director Jason Plotkin assumed the role of President of the Program & Engagement Professionals of Reform Judaism (PEPRJ) on June 30.

Plotkin, who had previously served as vice president and has been a member of the PEPRJ board since 2017 takes the reins of the organization from Bryan Bierman, who stepped down to become Execu-

tive Director at Temple Israel in Westport, Conn. Bierman served as president from 2019 through June of 2021.

In becoming the president of PEPRJ, Plotkin becomes the first Emanu El staff member at the head of a Union of Reform Judaism (URJ) professional affiliate organization since the late Rabbi Robert I. Kahn served as president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis from 1973-1975.

By virtue of his position, Plotkin will also serve on the URJ North American Board of Trustees joining Emanu El member Dolores Wilkenfeld, who currently serves as an honorary vice chair on the board.

Plotkin's rise to the role of president comes after a short tenure as vice president, which started at the onset of 2021. He had previously served as membership chair of PEPRJ and during his tenure doubled the membership roster of the organization to over 100 participants and welcomed PEPRJ's first members from the conservative movement, which lacks a similar organization.

"The next few years as non-profits adapt to the lessons of COVID, they will put a further emphasis on the engagement and communications work that is the backbone of our PEPRJ membership's portfolio," said Plotkin. "Synagogues are understanding the ways in which we must adjust, and our organization has taken significant leaps during the COVID pandemic as a result."

PEPRJ is planning an in-person conference this November in the Atlanta suburbs hosted by Temple Sinai.

During the pandemic, the organization has launched small groups in the areas of communication and engagement. In addition, weekly gatherings to share information and resources as well as monthly educational workshops have become commonplace in the digital space.

Over the course of the two-year program, which begins in March 2022, Lucy will connect with a world-class

faculty and colleagues from around North America to gain the skills and knowledge to become an "extraordinary teacher of teachers." Lucy will be traveling to Chicago four times per year for intensive four-day seminars. Stefani Carlson, Director of Congregational Learning, is a graduate of Cohort 7 of MTEI and is active in the alumni network. Our whole Helfman learning community is excited for Lucy to have this incredible opportunity! We are grateful to the Houston Jewish Federation for their financial support of this and other excellent professional development programs for our teachers and staff.

Stefani Carlson, Director of Congregational Learning, was recently accepted into Cohort 7 of the Jewish Theological Seminary (JTS) William Davidson School Executive Doctoral Program (EdD). Beginning in August 2021, Stefani will join a distinguished international group of senior educators in a two-year course of advanced training in research designed to "engage them as thought leaders in pedagogy, curriculum design, and communal engagement." The first year will be conducted entirely online; the second will involve periodic travel to New York. Research and writing of the qualifying paper and dissertation are expected to take two to three years beyond the cohort coursework. Stefani is delighted to have this extraordinary opportunity to enhance the learning environment at Congregation Emanu El and is grateful to the community for its support.

BOOK REVIEW:

Becoming Eve: My Journey from
Ultra-Orthodox Rabbi to Transgender Woman
(DIGITAL)

Sisterhood hosts bi-monthly book reviews throughout the year that are open to the public. July's book review will be led by our congregant, Ed Septimus.

PLEASE NOTE: This book review will be held by Zoom and the information to access will be emailed ahead of time to those who register. We are exploring moving to HYBRID or IN-PERSON when our book review schedule begins anew in the fall.

A summary of our July book selection, *Becoming Eve: My Journey from Ultra-Orthodox Rabbi to Transgender Woman*, by Abby Chava Stein:

Abby Stein was raised in a Hasidic Jewish community in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn. She was isolated in a culture that lives according to laws and practices of eighteenth-century Eastern Europe and shuns most aspects of modern life. Stein was the first-born son in a dynastic rabbinical family – a direct descendant of the Baal Shem Tov – who was destined to become a leader of her Hasidic sect. Instead, she embarked on a courageous journey of self-affirmation, acknowledging to herself and to her family that she was born in the form of a male – with the mind, heart, soul, and body of a female.

privileged to hear GFC's new director, Rabbi Erin Mason, giving a heartfelt pep talk to the counselors around the havdalah campfire. "Someone has given their most precious thing to you, entrusting it to you. And we are going to return it to them not the same, but even better." She went around the circle, asking each of the many counselors to share their intentions. "Make memories." "Have fun." "Spread happiness." They called out one by one.

Sunday morning, we woke up ready for our big task of welcoming all of the families to camp. After a quick breakfast and a surprisingly brief and tearless goodbye to Levi, we assumed our positions just outside the dining hall. In past years, parents could park and walk their children to their bunks and help get them set up. This year, they were going to drive up, have a quick goodbye outside their cars, and then be on their way. Faculty members were assigned to greet them, offer to take a photo, and then escort the campers to a nearby tent where they would get their bunk info and head off to their cabins.

I watched families get out of their cars for extended hugs with their precious ones. After 15 months of being together, of anxiety about the unknowns ahead, here was a glimpse of normal out on the sunny fields. There was a mix of elation at finally being able to go to camp and sadness at letting go of the people you love most in the world.

Opening day was a huge success. All of the COVID testing went smoothly, and everyone arrived at the places they needed to be. Everyone on the GFC staff breathed a sigh of relief that everything happened without a hitch. As assistant director Ethan Lane-Miller said, "Despite the things that make camp different this year, it's still the most normal thing these kids have done in over a year."

We have certainly crossed over and arrived on the other side of a turbulent sea. We are still wearing masks at camp, and there are still many COVID precautions, but it is a huge step to be able to experience camp. How sweet is freedom!

In Support of Our Youngest Learners

Aligned with Jewish belief, practice, and tradition, Congregation Emanu El views children as capable learners with individual abilities who have a right to an outstanding education. Focusing on the importance of creating a love of learning and a deep understanding of Jewish values in our youngest congregants, and with the goal of providing families the opportunity for their preschool-aged children to receive and embrace a Jewish education, the Becker School (formerly Becker Early Childhood Center) opened its doors in 1990. The school has now grown from 36 to 200 students, ranging from 15 months to six-years-old. In 2020, Becker added a new Kindergarten class, and provided a number of music, art, and other enrichment activities for the first time.

Its diverse community makes Becker a unique learning environment. Fifty percent of the students' families are members of Congregation Emanu El and sixty percent of the families have at least one family member who is Jewish. Although many religions and ethnicities are served by Becker, the school's goal has always remained the same: to nurture children to grow intellectually, spiritually, socially, and emotionally in an environment that respects each child, family, tradition, and the positive values of Judaism.

"Having our family's name on the Emanu El pre-school, which helps teach young children the values we believe in and cherish, is a source of pride to our family. The Becker School is a model of early childhood education, and we kvell every time we hear the wonderful comments people share with us about the amazing staff and work of our school."

"The Becker School's principal belief that young children are capable, strong and filled with an insatiable sense of wonder is what allows us to stand out in the world of early childhood education," says Sarah Williams, Director of the Becker School. "In order to implement best practices in teaching, learning and creating nurturing environments built on Jewish values, we rely heavily on Becker Early Childhood funds," she continues. "With the help of these and other Endowment funds, we provide purposeful learning materials in our new Becker Studios, an extraordinary Transportation Fair and Spring Garden Celebration and other meaningful engagements with our families."

While the Becker School is an entry point into Jewish learning for our young students, it has also become a

reentry point for many of their parents. Witnessing their children learn about and start sharing their knowledge of the Jewish traditions and values has renewed parents' interest in their pursuit of Jewish life as a family. "This is one of the many gifts an early childhood Jewish education brings to our congregation," explains Sarah.

"Our Becker families are so fortunate. The temple's Early Childhood Endowment Funds continue to help enhance our facilities and programming, as well as provide children the opportunity for an outstanding Jewish education," adds Sarah. "Despite the year of the pandemic, the Becker School continues to grow, instills a love of learning and Judaism in children and their families, and stands out among its peers in the early childhood arena."

"Sugar's Library was named for my mother, Shirley Becker, affectionately known as 'Sugar' to her grandchildren, to whom she loved to read. We hope that this space brings the same joy of reading to Becker students that she brought to her own children and grandchildren. She was a blessing to our family and we hope that Sugar's Library continues to be a blessing to the Becker School."

The Barish Sanctuary is equipped with an Induction Loop System which transmits audio signals directly to one's telecoil (T-coil)-equipped hearing aid.






