FROM RABBI HAYON



The barn-raising of this new year will require all of us to pitch in, standing together with purpose and patience. It will require mindfulness and unity, and it will at times require willingness to compromise comfort or convenience for the sake of the community's needs. At the end of last year's High Holy Days, I had already begun looking forward to this year's. We had learned so much about the COVID-19 coronavirus in the preceding six months, and were getting better at undertaking the public health measures that would keep our community safe. A few months later, safe and effective vaccines were developed at "warp speed" and were swiftly delivered to millions of Americans.

All of these factors, combined with the low levels of community transmission and hospitalizations here in Houston, inspired high hopes that this year's High Holy Days would be a grand homecoming – a long-overdue reunion of our entire community in our congregation's sacred space.

Today, as the reality of our return to in-person holiday worship grows closer, however, it is becoming clearer to me that imagining these holidays as a joyful "homecoming" experience will not be the most accurate way of thinking about them. Instead, I'm imagining this year's High Holy

Days as an old-fashioned barn-raising.

In 18th- and 19th-century rural America, when a family living in a farming community needed to construct a barn for the storage of their animals or produce, the entire community would gather together to assist with the project. Barns are big and expensive, and building one required more labor and capital than would normally be available to a single family, and so all of the neighbors would pitch in to help. Barn-raisings helped make certain that farmers' material needs were met, but perhaps more significantly, they helped cement the bonds of friendship and trust between neighbors.

We need your hands to hold the Torah scroll as we fully unroll it around the perimeter of Feld Hall.



A Seat at the Table by Joshua Halbertstam

A summary of our September book selection, "A Seat At The Table" by Joshua Halberstam Elisha is a Chassidic Orthodox Jew, the beloved son of a revered Rabbi, and the descendant of a long line of rabbis whose path he is expected to follow. He leaves his insular Chassidic world to attend a secular college, promising to remain unchanged. However, experiencing enlightenment in this new environment, and meeting free-spirited Katrina who influences his emotions and expands his vision of the world, affects Elisha in ways that he never could have imagined. Elisha is desperately seeking to take his own path without destroying his loving relationship with his family, with his father.

This beautifully written book is a depiction of family bonds and interactions with need for connection and love. The story elicits compassion, understanding, disappointment and forgiveness intertwined with wonderful Chassidic tales of wisdom from Jewish tradition.

ENDOWMENT FUND SERIES

In passing, there is life. In passing, life passes from one generation to another. Judaism teaches that in passing, there is a celebration of life; to honor and remember those that have left us and to cherish their memories; to keep our beloved ancestors alive and use their memories to guide us into the future. We carry their names on by bestowing them onto our children. We celebrate their lives and their memories annually when their names are read at Yahrzeit.

There is more to losing someone close to us than what initially meets the eye. When we lose someone, particularly someone special, doing something in their honor helps us feel more alive; using what they taught us can help us to feel more connected when we do mitzvot in their honor. It reflects their life, their teaching, the things they loved most about life; it is the celebration of how they lived their lives and the path forward for those who survive after them.

This month's Endowment Fund Series focuses on Emanu El members that paved the way forward for us by establishing funds that honored their loved ones. Tributes like these enable us to let others know that our loved ones were here, were alive and had inspirational lives that made a difference in the world. Here are a few examples.

The Cersonsky Fund: Founded by Eileen Cersonsky in honor of her husband Leonard. He loved flowers and he loved the cemetery, and so Eileen wanted to make the entrance beautiful in his memory. The fund is utilized for the floral landscaping at the entrance to the cemetery to help those entering begin their journey with the beauty of the flowers and those beautiful loved ones we honor when we enter.

The Pasternak Fund: Matt Pasternak established this fund in honor of his brother, who died in 2008. Cary had

always been interested in maintaining and improving the cemetery. His business was with architectural antiques, and he loved landscaping. Matt and his sibling, Jan decided to honor their brother by setting up this fund in his memory. A current project includes improving the esplanade on Bissonnet in front of the cemetery through the "Adopt an Esplanade" program in Houston. The family has already developed plans and has presented them to the city and are awaiting approval.

The Kagan/Rudy Fund: This fund was started by Morris Kagan and Israel Rudy to focus on the Chapel in the cemetery. The initial plans for Emanu El Memorial Park called for the oval space at the center of the park to be set aside. On that space, we constructed a beautiful and inspiring chapel for prayer and meditation. The chapel is built in the shape of a hexagon: the shape of the inside of the Star of David. The tiered seating is reminiscent of

an old synagogue atop Masada in Israel. The tiles on the floor are reminiscent of the tile floors in other ancient synagogues in the Holy Land. There is a dedication wall behind the eternal flame, listing all those who made the chapel possible.

For those of you not familiar, Emanu El Memorial Park is the name of our cemetery. It was always meant to feel like a park. Judaism teaches that we are all equal in death. With both of these in mind, and the desired parklike atmosphere, all stones are required to be flat. When you enter Emanu El Memorial Park, you can focus on the memories of your beloved and the beauty around you.

Throughout Jewish history, whenever a Jewish

community has gathered to undertake the formation of a congregation, its first action has customarily been to establish a cemetery – even before constructing a house of worship. The history of Emanu El is no different; we, too, purchased the land for our Emanu El Memorial Park even before acquiring the property on which our Temple building stands. Our founders understood, just as we do, that as part of the expression of our faith, we must have a place to celebrate our loved ones' lives, to honor their teachings, and set aside a dignified place for them to be laid to rest.

High Holy Day passes are sent to members in good standing by mail and will be received during the first two weeks of August. If you do not receive a pass during this time, please call the synagogue at 713.529.5771.

A notice was sent to the congregation in mid-July surrounding our guest pass policy. A truncated version of this notice can be found below:

While we are hopeful that our sanctuary will be at 100% capacity for this year's in-person services, we understand circumstances in our community could require us to operate with a reduced capacity of attendees. [At fullest capacity, the Barish Sanctuary and Feld Hall holds 1900 seats.] We also know from our survey that many of our members are not comfortable attending services in a filled sanctuary. As always, members in good standing are our priority and therefore should have the greatest access and ability to attend in-person worship. With the goal of maximizing space for our members and our Emanu El family, the temple Board recently approved a guest pass policy allowing those with the following non-member status to attend this year's High Holy Day services at Emanu El in person:

Individuals who are members in good standing of URJ congregations and follow the 2021 URJ Reciprocity policy.

Out-of-town family of members and staff.

Students enrolled in Emanu El's Basic Judaism class.

Those in Houston for medical-related circumstances, who are also members of URJ synagogues outside of the Houston Metro area.

Those who are new to Houston (three months or less), who have not yet joined a congregation.

Local college students.

In keeping with our philosophy of "members first," we are unable to provide guest passes to the following groups for in-person worship. With that, we welcome and encourage everyone to view our services digitally, through our multiple livestreaming platforms including:

Local family of members and staff who are not members of Emanu El.

Those who are in town for medical-related circumstances who are not members of a URJ congregations in their home city or state.

Members of local congregations.

Non-member teachers in our schools.

Are you heading out of town for the High Holy Days? If you are planning to worship at a congregation near your travel destination, you are eligible for reciprocity. TECHNICAL SUPPORT

Our goal is to make your experience as easy as possible in connecting with us during these High Holy Days. Members of the synagogue staff will be available during weekday business hours in addition to during our High Holy Day worship services to provide assistance to our congregants. PARKING

Only individuals with High Holy Days passes or handicap placards will be permitted entry to the Emanu El campus. All parking on Floors 1 and 2 of the Gaylor Parking Facility will be reserved for handicap-accessible use. The West Lot is reserved for Rabbi's Circle members with a required pass. For the duration of the High Holy Days, we will run satellite sites that open an hour prior to services. Buses will run continually from the satellite parking lots to and from Emanu El.

For Erev Rosh HaShanah and Kol Nidre, park at the Medical Clinic of Houston at 1707 Sunset Blvd. The parking garage entrance is located on Rice Blvd. On Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur Day, park at Rice University. We will use the Rice South Stadium Lot (with overflow in the Greenbrian Lot). A special entrance to the South Stadium Lot will be open between Gates 8 and 9, specifically for our Emanu El guests. This entry point is located on University Blvd. between Montclair and Stockton.

ACCESSIBILITY

The only reserved seats during the High Holy Days are for those that request this access ahead of time. When contacting Tiffany, please include the services you plan to attend. Those requesting accessible seating may be granted a maximum of four additional seats for family members. Please note this seating will be released 15 minutes prior to the beginning of services.

The deadline for Rosh HaShanah is Wednesday, September 1 and Yom Kippur is Friday, September 10.

CHILDCARE

We regret that we will be unable to offer childcare options this year for our High Holy Days due to COVID restrictions in place.

HEARING LOOP

The Barish Sanctuary is equipped with an Induction Loop System which transmits audio signals directly to one's telecoil (T-coil)-equipped hearing aid.

CLOSED CAPTIONING



Brotherhood provides closed captioning for our High Holy Day worshipers who are hearing impaired. The Brotherhood provides this service at all on-site Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur HoustonMediaSource services except for the children's services.

For those watching remotely, we intend to use the StreamText platform for a second straight year and will provide the appropriate URL in upcoming synagogue communications.

EMANU EL RETURNS TO TELEVISION IN '21

For a second straight year, Emanu El engaged with Houston Media Source (HMS) to broadcast its primary worship opportunities during the holy days on public access television.

HMS broadcasts on channel 17 on Comcast/Xfinity – the primary cable provider in Houston proper. The broadcasts are also available on AT&T U-Verse, Sudden Link and Phonoscope on channel 99. Please note that some highrises and multi-unit dwellings may not be included in this availability due to various restrictions.

The broadcast schedule will begin with Rosh HaShanah Unplugged on Monday, September 6 at 6:00 p.m. and continue the next day with Rosh HaShanah morning services at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday, September 7.

The early Kol Nidre services will be broadcast at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, September 15, with the Yom Kippur morning services airing at 10:30 a.m. on Thursday, September 16.




