FROM RABBI HAYON



As we enter this season of joy and celebration and remember Esther's heroic story, let's remember to cultivate both of those critical Jewish survival skills: the ability to work for redemption and peace, and the sensitivity to be aware of God's invisible touch surrounding and supporting us at all times.

The Book of Esther, the central text of the upcoming holiday of Purim, has several features which make it unique among the books of the Bible. It's the only one set in the kingdom of Persia, for one thing. And it's one of only two biblical books named for a woman (the other one is the Book of Ruth, which we'll read later this spring during Shavuot).

But what sets Esther apart from the rest of the biblical books is its most curious feature: it is the only prose book of the *Bible* which does not mention God at all.

Unsurprisingly, over the centuries, Jewish commentators and rabbis have debated about what it means for God to be absent from the pages of the *megillah*. For some, the Purim story is powerful precisely because God never makes an appearance in it. Because it is essentially a secular story, its account of the Jews' salvation may emphasize the value of human cleverness, ingenuity and solidarity with each other.

For others, however, the absence of God in the *Book of Esther* is merely an illusion. According to this school of thought, God only appears to be absent, but is in fact present just behind the scenes, carefully orchestrating the action and gently guiding Esther, Mordecai, and the entire Persian Jewish community toward safety and redemption. God is only temporarily invisible in the story because the characters are unable or unwilling to detect God's presence in their midst.

Perhaps both interpretations are true at the same time. It may well be true that we bring about our own salvation most effectively by using the gifts of our hearts and minds, and by fortifying the supportive relationships we share with other around us. And at the same time, God's existence is woven invisibly through the fabric of our world, and we must attune ourselves to notice its nearness when we might otherwise easily overlook it.

Updated Masking Policy – Effective March 1

BOOK REVIEW:

Concealed by Esther Amini

Sisterhood hosts bi-monthly book reviews throughout the year that are open to the public. March's book review will be led by our congregant, Rabbi Pam Silk.

PLEASE NOTE: This book review will be held by Zoom, and the information to access will be emailed ahead of

time to those who register.

A summary of our March book selection can be found below:

Esther Amini grew up in Queens, New York, during the freewheeling 1960's. She also grew up in a Persian-Jewish household., the American -born daughter of parents who had fled Mashhad, Iran. In *Concealed*, she tells the story of being caught between these two worlds: the dutiful daughter of tradition-bound parents who hungers for more self-determination than tradition allows.

Exploring the root of her father's deep silences, and explosive temper, her mother's flamboyance and flights from home, and her own sense of indebtedness to her Iranian-born brothers, Amini uncovers the story of her parents' early years in Mashhad, Iran's holiest Muslim city; the little-known history of Mashhad's underground Jews; the incident that steeled her mother's resolve to leave; and her parent's arduous journey to the U.S., where they faced a new threat to their traditions: the threat of freedom.

In this poignant, funny, entertaining, uplifting memoir, Amini documents how family members build, buoy, wound, and save one another across generations; how lives are shaped by the burdens of loyalty and legacy; and how she rose to the challenge of deciding what to keep and what to discard.

This year's honoree, Dolores Wilkenfeld served as president of Emanu El's Sisterhood from 1961-1963, and as president of the congregation from 1983-1985. She was also president of what is now known as Women of Reform Judaism and the World Union for Progressive Judaism, as well as other organizations. She tutored hundreds of Bar and Bat Mitzvah students for over 50 years, making an indelible

impression on students and parents alike. Dolores has been honored by many organizations, including the Houston Assembly of Delphian Chapters, Houston Joint Committee for Reform Judaism in Israel, Jewish National Fund, and many more. Emanu El's Sisterhood is honored to have this opportunity to salute her accomplishments.

A Security Message from Congregation Emanu El

Dear Congregants,

Last month, the hostage crisis at Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas, brought national attention to what we in the Jewish community are keenly aware: the rising threat of antisemitism is real. We are incredibly grateful and relieved that Rabbi Charlie Cytron-Walker and the three congregants escaped without physical harm. The personal accounts of their heroic escape captivated a national audience. They also prompted discussions, both locally and nationally, about synagogue security.

Synagogues and Jewish organizations understand that security is a daily concern. At Emanu El, security is our highest priority, and we regularly assess our security needs. Below we have shared some information that you may find helpful. Please note that many details about our security protocols are not shared beyond the security team.

We employ ADM, a private security firm, to keep our congregation and campus safe. Our security team and staff communicate regularly with local law enforcement agencies and other organizations. When other institutions are threatened, additional patrols are quickly deployed around our campus. Over the past decade, Emanu El has been awarded several Homeland Security grants through the Nonprofit Security Grant Program ("NSGP") to invest in security infrastructure. Applications for this year's NSGP are currently being prepared by our Security Committee. We also conducted active shooter training for our staff shortly before the onset of Covid, and planning is underway for additional staff training as well as active shooter/ situational awareness training for our members on our Emanu El campus. We will update you as the information becomes available.

Furthermore, the Jewish Federation of Greater Houston is working on a comprehensive approach to security for the entire Houston Jewish community. The Federation is working with Secure Communities Network (SCN) to hire a local, full-time director who will serve as a representative of SCN. They hope to have this position filled this spring. The Federation also reports that SCN will provide additional training to the community as early as this month. As many of you know, Rabbi Charlie and the other hostages credited active shooter training with saving their lives. In July 2020, The Houston Federation's Jewish Response and Action Network (JRAN) hosted "Countering an Active Threat," led by Brad Orsini of the Secure Community Network.

In the wake of the Colleyville event, Harris County District Attorney Kim Ogg joined with area police chiefs, constables, faith leaders and ADL to announce a unified front against antisemitic violence. Our Jewish community was well-represented and included Rabbi Hayon.

Farb Fund Grant Validates Importance of Dedicated Anti Human Trafficking Program Based in Texas Medical Center

Congregation Emanu El is proud to have a fund that supports small and emerging organizations throughout the Greater Houston area that improve life for underserved Houstonians. That was the late Aubrey M. Farb's vision when he approached Rabbi Roy Walter with the idea in 1984 and continues to make an impact to this day.

A recent grant was awarded to the Anti-Human Trafficking Program (AHTP) and its Medical Director Mollie Gordon, an associate professor in the Baylor College of Medicine's Menninger Department of Psychiatry.

"I wanted to thank you again for your family's support of our work through the Aubrey & Sylvia Farb Community Service Fund. It was the first community grant our program received and validated the importance of a dedicated Anti-Human Trafficking Program. Since receiving the grant, we have gone on to secure funds from national foundations, as well

as state and federal grants," noted Gordon.

According to Gordon, their team, along with PATH partners in Houston, have trained thousands of healthcare professionals, screened more than 600 patients for trafficking and violence (more than 70 percent of whom were trafficking victims and 85 percent of whom are domestic victims of human trafficking who live in Harris County), trained numerous doctors as part of their clinical post-doctoral program, provided thousands of clinical service hours, written papers and books, and advocated at the national and international level to inform Anti human trafficking efforts. In December, they trained more than two dozen international governments in Anti Trafficking efforts.

zations to more than 175,000 people in need each week. Founded in 2003, Leket Israel helps impoverished people throughout the country, regardless of their age, gender, ethnic background or religion. They run several projects, including Sandwiches for Kids, which was launched in 2006. There are 850,000 children suffering from hunger in Israel, and many of them go to school without sufficient meals. In order to help feed these children, volunteers make and distribute 7,500 - 8,000 sandwiches every morning in 40 cities.

Helfman Religious School students who travel on our Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience (SBMIE) trips to Israel participate in Leket's "Harvest Helpers" program, working in the fields to rescue produce that would otherwise go to waste.

This activity helps to provide fresh fruits and vegetables for Leket's thousands of clients and is directly related to the Torah's instruction that the gleanings of Israel's fields should go to those in need. In 2018, Emanu El teens picked over 2,000 pounds of onions for Leket. We can't wait to see what our 2022 SBMIE group will pick!

She has served as Head of Political Affairs at the Mexican Embassy in Colombia, Titular Consul of the Mexican Consulate in San Pedro Sula, Honduras; Representative of Mexico to the Organization of American States (OAS), she served for two years as Chargé d'Affaires at the Embassy of Mexico in Ireland. Cantor Josh Breitzer of Brooklyn's Congregation Beth Elohim (CBE) and Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion's (HUC-JIR) Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music be serving as the Rabbi Robert & Rozelle Kahn Scholar-in-Residence during the weekend of **April 22** at Congregation Emanu El.

The scholar-in-residence program is funded by the Rabbi Robert & Rozelle Kahn Lectureship Fund which has since its creation brought top Reform scholars to our community as guests.

A member of the CBE clergy team since receiving ordination from HUC-JIR in 2011, Cantor Breitzer leads the community through prayer and song, teaches chanting and ritual skills to people of all ages, and helps turn special moments into sacred occasions. During his decade of innovative cantorial stewardship, CBE has become a beacon of dynamic, pluralistic ritual activity, attracting international attention and growing to over 1000 member units.

Named by *The Forward* in its "Soundtrack of Our Spirit" series as one of the best new Jewish music voices, Cantor Breitzer has sung at concert halls and synagogues across the country. He appears throughout the PBS documentary *The Four Sons and All Their Sons: A Passover Tale* and helped create the New York Festival of Song's acclaimed cabaret *A Goyishe Christmas to You* in which he has performed every year since 2010. Among his most influential mentors were Pulitzer Prize-winning composer Yehudi Wyner, Cantor Lawrence Avery, and Dr. Jack Gottlieb, whose artistic legacy Cantor Breitzer continues to preserve and promote.

In addition to his congregational cantor duties, Cantor Breitzer is a dedicated instructor at the Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music where he advises and coaches students and teaches courses on integrative repertoire for Shabbat and Yom Kippur. An alumnus of the Clergy Leadership Program of the Institute for Jewish Spirituality, he strives to model in all his work how one might weave traditional and contemporary liturgical settings into a holistic, compelling prayer experience. His former cantorial interns have gone on to serve prominent communities throughout the progressive Jewish world.

Beyond his work at CBE and with our Reform Movement's seminary, Cantor Breitzer is also active in the American

Conference of Cantors (ACC). Originally elected to the ACC board in 2015 and to the officer team in 2016, Cantor Breitzer served from 2016-2019 as Vice President for Professional Development, External Policy and Placement and since 2019, as Vice President for Membership and External Partnerships.

New Residents Move Into Becker Chicken Coop






