This year, the month of May is bookended by days of national memory for American Jews.

On May 4, we observe Yom HaZikaron, the day of mourning set aside to recall the members of Israel's armed forces who fell defending the Jewish State, as well as Israel's far too many innocent civilians who have been casualties of violent terrorism over the few decades of Israel's history.

And then on May 30, we observe America's own Memorial Day, on which we pause from work and school to mourn the deaths of those who have served our nation.

It is not unusual, of course, for a nation – whether modern or ancient – to set aside time for national mourning, in order to reflect on the values for which the nation was founded, and which principled individuals held so dear that they were willing to literally give their lives to uphold and defend them. And as American Jews, we are seized doubly by the impulse to remember.

In many ways, Jewish identity itself is built upon the capacity and the will to remember. Rabbi Abraham continued on page 2

Joshua Heschel is famous for having noted that the Jews' historic legacy is not found in long-lasting castles or monuments; instead, we have constructed for ourselves cathedrals of time. To be Jewish is to maintain enormous, elaborate structures of memory, which we carry with us throughout our lives' journeys. We carry these portable structures with us wherever we go – through times of celebration and times of displacement and loss.

The imperative of memory is encoded in the most primary guidelines of Jewish life: in our Bible, there are nearly 170 different appearances of variants of the Hebrew word lizkor, "to remember." Time and time again, we are adjured to remember the events and concepts that make us who we are: Remember the Sabbath day,

remember the Covenant, remember that you were slaves in Egypt. Each of these acts of memory serves to cement our understanding of who we are and where we came from – and enables us to transmit that self-awareness to each successive generation that will come after us.

And having mastered – or at least practiced – the art of memory comes to serve us well during a month like this one, in which our remembrances contribute to the upbuilding of national identity. Now our memories combine in a new sort of devotional work: remembering those whose sacrifice enabled the defense and preservation of our American homeland and the Jewish home in Israel. And we know well, as Jews and as Americans, that our work of memory is effective and consequential: it matters that we remember. It matters, in some inscrutable and unexplainable way: to the dead, and to us the living, and to the places we call home which endure as a lasting tribute to those whose lives were given to preserve them.

highlights of the annual meeting, which included updates from the outgoing president, Jeri Amundsen, and Senior Rabbi, Oren Hayon.

Gaylor becomes the president following two years as Senior Vice President of the synagogue. Prior to serving as Senior Vice President, Gaylor had served as the congregation's treasurer in addition to several years of service as a board member.

A Houstonian and lifelong Emanu El congregant, Gaylor will take the helm from Amundsen, who will now transition to the role of Honorary President following two years of service.

As the outgoing president, Amundsen had an opportunity to provide an annual report to the lay members of the congregation. In her comments, Amundsen shared that Emanu El's professional staff and lay leaders have found the right balance between in-person and digital programming through reflection on how great it has been to see the pews filled for joyous lifecycle celebrations, the service in honor of Barbara Loeser's 45 years of Emanu El, a hilarious Purim Spiel, and Sisterhood's "Music of the Night" program that honored Dolores Wilkenfeld.

Amundsen continued her remarks by lauding the schools at Emanu El –Becker School and Helfman Religious School – for all the work they have done to impact our youth during the last year while sharing the congregation's excitement that the Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience will return this summer, providing 25 Helfman 10th, 11th and 12th graders a 22-day trip of a lifetime as they depart for Israel in June.

Other highlights of the board and committee work this past year included: adopting a COVID vaccine requirement for all staff and faculty members; creating

a Sacred Belonging Task Force charged with exploring how Emanu El can be a place where everyone who comes through our doors can find a sense of belonging; hosting more than 60 new congregants in Feld Hall during a New Member Shabbat in the fall; and the creation of the first-ever senior staff level position in development.

During the congregation's elections, the members elected the following individuals to one-year terms to join Gaylor and Amundsen on the executive committee: Adam Pollock, Senior Vice President; Alana Pulaski, Vice President of Committees & Volunteer Management; Matt Pasternak, Vice President of Committees & Volunteer Management; fredi Bleeker Franks, Vice President of Education; Ben Miller, Vice President of Personnel; Philip Tenenbaum, Treasurer; and Dawn Blitz, Secretary.

Elected to three-year terms on the board were Scott Bormaster, Melissa Carson, Dan Gospin, Ronnie Kurtin, Beth Merfish, Adam Pogach, and Keith Remels.

Greta Pliskin was elected to fill the remaining year of a three-year term to end in 2024, while Patricia Baker, Larry Barr-Meyer and Jennifer Stockel were elected to one-year terms.

Remaining on the board are Richard Buxbaum, Nancy Parkans Ehrenkranz, Tammy Feldstein, Ivy Frank, Ralph Herring, Elyse Kalmans, Dora Klaff, Bruce Lessey, Laura Mayer, Diane Puschett, Bob Schaffer, Emily Schaffer, and Annie Stein.

This service will take place in person during Shabbat services and be streamed online for those unable to join us at the synagogue.


The Classics Tour the Notorious RBG Exhibit (in-person) Sunday, May 22, 3:00 p.m.

Our bi-monthly "Lunch & Learn" series examining Israel and the Middle East will continue in June as

our congregant Dr. Danielle Farah leads a presentation entitled, *Jews in Twentieth-Century Iran: National Belonging, Education, and Identity.*

Jews have lived in Iran for over 2,500 years, with a population of 100,000 at the community's height in 1945. During the twentieth century, Iranian Jews experienced rapid upward mobility, participated

in significant political and social movements, and integrated into several layers of Iranian society. This talk will explore the landscape of Jewish identity in Iran, with a special focus on Jewish-Muslim interactions, political engagement, and the intersection of education and integration. As we analyze how Iranian Jews navigated between their Iranian and Jewish identities in an era of new nationalisms, we gain insight into what Jewish emancipation and assimilation looked like in a Muslim-majority country.

Dr. Farah is a 2021-2023 Samuel W. and Goldye Marian Spain Postdoctoral Fellow in Jewish Studies at Rice University. She received her PhD in Jewish History from Stanford University in 2021. Dr. Farah's scholarship, which lies at the intersection of Jewish history, Middle Eastern history, education history, and transnational studies, examines interreligious encounters, national belonging, and Jewish identity formation in modern Iran and Turkey. As an Iranian American Jewish woman, her work aims to give voice to Middle Eastern Jews' experiences.


10th Grade Confirmation Family Ed

A summary of our May book selection can be found below:

It is 1943 and for four years, 16-year-old Stefania was working for the Diamant family in their grocery store in Przemysl, Poland, weaving her way into their lives and hearts. She even made a promise of betrothal to one of their sons, Izio, which had to be kept secret since Stefania is Catholic and the Diamants are Jewish.

Everything changes when the German army invades Przemysl, the Diamants are forced into the ghetto leaving Stefania alone in an occupied city, the only person to care for Helena, her six-year-old sister. And then comes the knock at the door. Izio's brother Max has jumped from a train headed to a concentration camp. Stefania and Helena make the extraordinary decision to hide Max and, eventually, 12 more Jews, as well. Then they must wait, every day, for the next knock at the door, the one that will mean death. When the knock finally comes, it is two SS officers, requisitioning Stefania's house for the German army. With two Nazis living below, 13 Jews hidden above, and a little sister by her side, Stefania has one more excruciating choice to make.

Sharon Cameron brings her extraordinary storytelling prowess to this depiction of real-life Righteous Gentiles Stefania and Helena Podgorska. This gripping page-turner explores the momentous decisions people make in the most desperate of circumstances and how one person truly can change the world.

Annual Meeting 2022

Report given by outgoing president Jeri Amundsen during the Emanu El Annual Meeting held on April 10, 2022. A video version of this report can be found on the congregation's Facebook page, website and YouTube channel. A recap of the annual meeting can be found on page 1 of this edition of the Bulletin.

Thank you again for joining us today. Two years ago, as we were preparing for our Annual Meeting, we were forced by the onset of COVID to quickly figure out how to conduct an annual meeting online. Our staff did a remarkable job pivoting to an online format. Last year, COVID again forced us to turn to Zoom for our Annual Meeting. And our staff nailed it again. But this spring, thankfully, the activity and operations in our building look more like 2019 – our students, staff, congregants and guests fill the halls and spaces of 1500 Sunset Boulevard with work, worship, study, and volunteering. So why are we meeting like this again, over the internet? We discovered that the online format in 2020 and 2021 attracted 75% more members to the Annual Meeting. With such a huge increase in participation in temple business, sticking to an online format was a simply a smart business decision.

Finding the right balance between in-person and virtual programming is something our staff thinks about a lot. It's encouraging and exciting to be back in a posture of planning rather than reacting.

Digital programming and live-streamed worship services provide access to many of our members. I am grateful for the increased accessibility, but I am thrilled that our campus is bustling with people again. After too many quiet months here, having people in the building again reminds me how important it is to connect with each other in this sacred place.

In recent months, our members and guests have filled the pews in the Barish Sanctuary for joyful celebrations, including the Shabbat Shira celebration in honor of Barbara Loeser's 45 years with Emanu El, the hilarious Purim Spiel, and the Sisterhood's spectacular Music of the Night, honoring Dolores Wilkenfeld. Feld Hall hosts Kiddush Luncheons and volunteer events such as Kids' Meals. As part of our Endowment Speaker Series we heard the thought-provoking Newsweek opinions editor Batya Unger-Sargon and in a couple of weeks, we will have the chance to learn and worship with the Cantor Josh Breitzer, our Kahn Scholar-in-Residence. Next week we look forward to celebrating the Second Night Seder with close to 200 people attending.

Our monthly Tot Shabbat services have drawn a capacity crowd of 150 nearly every month! The return of Friday night and Saturday morning services in the intimate Proler chapel was welcomed by many of our members.

The return of on-campus learning was easily to most significant boost of energy this year. Six days a week, the halls of Helfman and Becker are teeming with students and teachers. Last fall, Helfman welcomed back students to our campus and this spring invited, parents and caregivers back to the lively Sunday morning T'filah service, led by our clergy and song leader TAs. Director of Congregational Learning Stefani Carlson and her staff continue their dynamic approach to Jewish curriculum for Helfman students PreK thru 12th grades. Let me share some highlights we can all be proud of:

- This year's enrollment surpassed expectations, with more than 400 students.
- By the end of May, we will have celebrated the B'nei Mitzvah of more than 40 students here in the beautiful Barish Sanctuary. Kiddush luncheons have resumed.
- More than 50 students are scheduled for the next cycle of B'nei Mitzvahs beginning in the fall.
- Helfman provides leadership development and engagement for 57 outstanding teen TAs (teacher assistants).

- During our April 29 Shabbat worship, our Helfman Seniors will gather here on the bimah to celebrate the 2022 Helfman graduating class.
- In June, seventeen of our 10th graders will celebrate Confirmation during the Erev Shavuot service.

And I am delighted to share that, after two COVID-related postponements, this June, 25 Helfman 10th, 11th, and 12th graders will depart on the Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience for a 22-day trip of a lifetime. This trip is made possible by the vision and generosity of Marvin Barish and his family, as well as Stefani Carlson and our clergy.

Our youngest learners at Becker have also enjoyed being back in the classroom. Like most preschools throughout the country, Becker's enrollment dipped significantly at the beginning of the pandemic when families opted to keep their young kids at home. Today, Becker enrollment is bouncing back and has nearly doubled to 150 students, thanks to the innovation and intentionality of Becker Director Sarah Williams. Under her leadership, Becker's curriculum embraces the Reggio Emilia philosophy of early childhood education. This year Becker students enjoyed an expanded garden area and the addition of FOUR new learning studios, including Light and Shadow, STEM, Art, and Sensory – which stir imagination and creativity and support the idea that children learn in a variety of ways. Becker also added some feathered friends, with the arrival of six hens and a custom chicken coop. (You can check them out at the NW corner of the school.) I am also excited to report that Sarah Williams has been accepted into the Mandel Teacher Education Institute, a professional development program focused on supporting teachers through collaboration and centered in Jewish learning.

Our Becker families play a big part of the success of our preschool. The Becker PTO brought families back together with two successful fundraisers this year and will host an on-campus book fair this month. Thank you to Sarah and thanks to your staff for inspiring our youngest students to love to learn in a safe, joyful environment.

One of the best part of being president of the congregation is working alongside our staff. Emanu El's long history of a strong partnership between lay leaders and our staff and clergy continued this year with the Board of Trustees. Whether working on committees, setting up new initiatives, providing counsel to staff, and making decisions, our board worked hard, guided by the best interest of our members. A few highlights of the Board and committee work this past year include:

- Adopting a COVID vaccine requirement for our staff and teachers, in order to keep our community safe and healthy.
- Creating the Sacred Belonging Task Force, charged with exploring how to ensure Emanu El is a place where everyone who comes through our doors can find a sense of belonging.
- The membership committee helped organize a New Member Shabbat Dinner last fall, which hosted more than 60 new congregants in Feld.
- Following the creation of a first-ever senior staff level position in development the Director of Congregational Advancement, the Board's Search Committee conducted a nation-wide search, and was thrilled to find and hire Anna Shabtay for this position.

Diversifying and strengthening Emanu El's revenue streams has been a topic of Board conversation for many years. The Board's vision allowed us to create a position that focuses on building relationships with our members to create a culture of philanthropy, not simply just planning fundraisers. Anna's warm personality and professional experience allowed her to hit the ground running, listening, and getting to know our staff, lay leaders, and members. Her work with both Becker and Helfman on fundraising strategies is paying off, including an extremely successful Day of Giving for Becker that raised more than \$50,000 for Becker Scholarships. Anna also works with our Endowment Board to make thoughtful and careful use of our endowment funds to support our congregation. Each year, our operating budget includes a

proposed draw from our endowment, which fredi Franks will touch on in a moment, but neither the line item nor the balance of the funds gives tells the whole story of the temple Endowment Fund. In fact, the stories behind the 70+ funds that make up our endowment offer a glimpse at the history and growth of Emanu El. I hope you saw the year-long series in the temple *Bulletin* that highlighted not just how the funds are used, but the inspiring and heartwarming stories of the philanthropy of Emanu El families who the prioritized the future of Emanu El with the creation of the 70+ distinct funds. Please join me in thanking Stuart Gaylor for his leadership of the Endowment Board and the committee of Endowment Board Directors and other lay leaders for this beautifully researched and written series.

fredi Franks will share more details about the budget shortly. I want to thank all of members for choosing to belong to Emanu El. Operating a member-based nonprofit requires each of us to make a financial investment in Emanu El through our Annual Commitment. Your Annual Commitment is key to the success of our vibrant community and the future of Emanu El. We are committed to never letting financial hardship be a barrier to belonging to Emanu El. When our members endured unexpected economic challenges and uncertainty during Covid, our staff worked to ease their hardship with appropriate adjustments to their pledge. These unavoidable revenue reductions had a direct impact on our bottom line, leaving a deficit for the 2020 and 2021. This year's Annual Commitment packet will arrive in your mailboxes soon. If your circumstances have improved, please consider enhancing your annual commitment pledge to ensure the financial health of your spiritual home.

On a personal note, it's the end of my two-year term. My term began with the onset of COVID and ends this month, when life feels more like 2019 than 2020. I have joked with many that it's been the Pandemic Presidency. The opportunity to serve this congregation as president was an honor; to be trusted with leading Emanu El has been meaningful to me in ways I could not have imagined. Most importantly I am grateful for the people I have had the pleasure and privilege to work with and learn from and laugh with. I have had a front row seat to the work the clergy does in service to our congregants, our local and global Jewish community and to the stranger. If I did anything to make their jobs easier, I will consider my service a success. Rabbi Hayon, thank you for partnership and friendship. I've seen how your love for our congregation and respect for our rich history anchors your vision for what we hope always to be: a vibrant, vital Jewish community in the heart of Houston.

Rabbi Silk, thank you for always being there for me, as a Rabbi and a friend (and a recipe resource). I'm grateful for your steady presence and wise counsel whenever I need it.

Rabbi Fixler, thank you for helping me ask hard questions.

Cantor Simmons, thank you for the beautiful music that is a balm for the ups and downs of life.

David Lamden, we have tackled a lot of challenges the past two years together and managed to laugh through almost all of them. Thank you for your partnership and friendship.

Jason Plotkin, I am so glad we had the chance to work together these past two years. Thank you for always thinking ahead, always answering my texts promptly, and for approaching novel ideas with "how can we make that work." I trust everyone tuning in knows that you will be leaving Emanu El for a new and exciting position in Michigan at the end of May. We will miss you, Aliza and Isaac and wish you all the very best!

I also want to thank the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee for your support and dedication to Emanu El. I am excited for Stuart Gaylor to take the helm on May 1. Stuart's thoughtfulness, business acumen and ability to energize volunteers are the perfect combination to lead our congregation. Congratulations Stuart!

And finally, I want to quickly thank my family. I could not have done this job without the encouragement and support of my husband Arthur Feldman and my children, Norah, Harry and Penny. I know each of them welcomes an end to my endless texts back to them: "Sorry I can't talk right now," "Can't talk, walking into meeting" and "Meeting running long, will be home soon."

Pursuant to our bylaws, the congregation must be provided notice of the Board's decision. More details about the roles of our Board of Trustees and our members in these important decisions can be found in our bylaws, which are available on the temple website (www.emanuelhouston.org/about/). In accordance with our bylaws and the terms our current agreement with Rabbi Hayon, the next step involves working out the terms of the agreement.






