FROM RABBI HAYON



Our sacred texts provide the framework for our ethical identity, our spiritual culture, and our national coherence as a Jewish people; in very real ways, these stories make us who we are. In her excellent book *Reader, Come Home* (2018), Dr. Maryanne Wolf explores the wondrous miracle of the human brain which has – only recently in its evolutionary history – learned to read.

The ability to read, she explains, has contributed significantly to the neuroplasticity in our brains. It is this aspect of human beings which has allowed our cognition and behavior to adapt more swiftly and efficiently to the stimuli we face than any other species on earth.

Wolf argues that the advancements in our ability to read have come at a cost, however. The book's subtitle is "The Reading Brain in a Digital World," and through its pages, Wolf points out that because of our current digital domain, the way we read today is drastically different than the way our parents or grandparents did. Although the quantity of reading we do on an average day today – an estimated 100,000 words per day – is much higher than in any earlier generation, we read most of them by skimming lightly over the text's (or digital screen's) surface, never plunging down into what Wolf calls "deep reading."

"Deep reading" is what we engage in when we find ourselves immersed in a gripping plot or feel the thrill of inhabiting the skin of a compelling fictional character. It is the practice which develops the "contemplative dimension" of our brains and fortifies our innate abilities of insight and empathy. Wolf issues a stern warning about what losing the capacity for deep reading will do for our inner lives, and for society at large.

Inspired by the strength of Wolf's data and the power of her encouragement to return to deep reading, I wanted to chose something substantial for my summer reading this year. I decided on William Faulkner's classic novel Absalom, Absalom! I remembered loving Faulkner's prose when I read his other work many years ago, and so I was eager to spend my vacation immersing myself in his writing once again.

I only got a few pages into the book, however, before I hit a wall. The book was more difficult than I expected. Everything that I once loved about Faulkner's writing – the intricate structure of his prose and the lyrical complexity of his characters' dialogue – was now a struggle to navigate. This book that I had saved as a treat for my vacation turned out to be disappointingly tedious.

Perhaps Maryanne Wolf was right. Maybe my ability for deep reading has been compromised by the digital age; maybe my attention span has become irreversibly fragmented by all the time I spend doing surface-level reading of tiny words on a screen, rather than old-fashioned type printed on a page. My struggle with Faulkner was both disappointing and worrying – have I permanently lost my capacity for deep immersion in

stories, plots, and characters?

Fortunately, Wolf includes a note of hope and encouragement in *Reader, Come Home*. The neuroplasticity of human brains, which enabled our adaptation to the digital environments in which we now do most of our reading, is also key to our ability to recapture the skill of deep reading. Like so much else in life – building new skills in physical exercise, art, or music – all we need to do is practice. Our brains are masterful at building and strengthening the connections in their internal wiring which are needed to accomplish new tasks. To regain the wonderful and enduring gifts of deep reading, all we have to do is read more.

We Jews are "the people of the book"; for a hundred generations we have inherited and reveled in our collective love for words and stories. Our sacred texts provide the framework for our ethical identity, our spiritual culture, and our national coherence as a Jewish people; in very real ways, these stories make us who we are. If we neglect, or, God forbid, lose our ability to read deeply, we risk undermining a significant and beloved part of our Jewish identity.

Whatever your summer plans hold, I hope that you'll set aside some time for reading – the old-fashioned kind, with words printed on paper pages. Whenever we see each other next, I'll be eager to hear about the stories and insights you will discover in the pages of a book. And I'll be sure to share with you my impressions of what I'm sure will be a challenging but rewarding rediscovery of William Faulkner. Happy reading!



You will receive an email from orders@ simpletix.com which will be sent to the email address on file in vour ShulCloud account in early September. You can print your

pass at home or simply save it on your phone to be scanned when you arrive at the building for services. Passes will be scanned before you can enter the building. Your name will be on your pass, and passes are NOT transferrable.

FALL ISRAEL SPEAKER Dr. Meron Medzini, "Golda during the Yom Kippur War: an Eyewitness Account"

Wednesday, September 6, 7:00 p.m.

Congregation Emanu El is pleased to welcome Professor (Emeritus) Meron Medzini, of Hebrew University in Jerusalem, as our Fall Israel Speaker. Dr. Medzini, who in his capacity as Director of the Israel Government Press Office, Jerusalem, in the Office of the Prime Minister, served as spokesman for Prime Ministers Levi Eshkol, Golda Meir and Yitzhak Rabin, is a compelling speaker with a unique insider's perspective on Israel's political history.

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Yom Kippur War, a brief but tremendously impactful conflict that began with surprise attack on Israel by a coalition of Arab states led by Egypt and Syria, triggered a confrontation between the U.S. and the U.S.S.R., and ultimately set the stage for the 1978 Camp David Accords. A new film, *Golda*, starring Helen Mirren as Israel's prime minister during this pivotal moment in history, will be released later this month. Dr. Medzini, who in addition to his experience in public office is the author of the 2016 book, *Golda Meir: a Political Biography*, served as a consultant on the film. He will share with us his firsthand knowledge of the behind-the-scenes political drama, both during and after the war, and its far-reaching implications.


Mayoral Candidate Forum at Emanu El

It's a great first job experience and looks strong on a college application. TAs work Sunday mornings and are paired with our Helfman Religious School teachers or staff members for mentoring and growth opportunities and work closely with their adult partners throughout the year.

All TAs must be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and be enrolled in a Jewish Day School or our Upper School program. Upper School enrollment is currently open and can be found on the Helfman page of the Emanu El website.

Congregation Emanu El has long valued the resources and opportunities it offers members who are building their adult identities, Jewish family values, and careers. With the help of several Endowment Funds like the Robert Reichek Young Adult Engagement Fund, the Ed Wulfe Youth Leadership Fund, and the Shirley Barish Memorial Fund, rising high school graduates and young professionals are enjoying meaningful and inspiring Jewish-themed experiences.

Helfman Graduates

In May of this year, six special young men and women graduated from the Helfman Religious School, marking the completion of twelve or more years of religious school at Emanu El. Their evolution from unique students into a tight-knit group of close friends was shared at a moving Shabbat service celebrating their milestone achievement. Each student shared a bit about their experiences, and many noted the life-changing role that their trip to Israel, funded by the Shirley Barish Memorial Fund, played in their final year.

Rabbi Pam Silk, who watched this group evolve, explained it best: "The goal of the 12th grade is to create and promote a mindset and framing to help launch our students into the next stage of life. Through speakers, field trips, and teaching opportunities, we help them focus on what a Jewish future looks like. The students attend by choice, not parental pressure. It is invaluable to witness."

Stefani Carlson, Director of Lifelong Learning, adds that the Teaching Assistant program has been integral in providing continuity and connection to our Jewish tradition and values. "Serving as a TA is a visible example of what our students' future can look like as a young professional. TAs give back to younger students, of course, but is the opportunity to see themselves as congregational leaders that matters most. It is often their first real job. It is an opportunity to develop responsibility and be depended on. They are called 'teaching' assistants because they are in fact the next generation of Jewish educators. So many of our current teachers started out as TAs. Many go on to become Jewish professionals and teachers for other congregations. But it all began here. The TA program is a shining jewel in our congregation."

Young Professionals and Families

"Programs addressing the interests and needs of young professionals are pivotal in growing a base of support in our spiritual community," shares Becca Schwartzberg, Youth and Young Adult Engagement Coordinator. "Happily, our young professionals' program at Emanu El (aimed at those who are between 21-40) has thrived and evolved, with the valuable support of the Robert Reichek Fund." Each month, the temple plans a program on a variety of topics to engage and enlighten young professionals, e.g., a Chanukah-themed cocktail event, or 'Torah on Tap,' a gathering at a local venue to hear a talk of interest given by Rabbi Fixler. There have been "JED Talks," where community members have spoken about their journey, and how it has affected their Judaism...or how Judaism has impacted their course in life. And once a quarter, the temple hosts its signature event, Warehouse Shabbat, for young professionals and anyone young at heart.

For the past two years, Emanu El has taken young professionals on a three-day Southern Jewish Heritage trip, first to Memphis, and most recently, to New Orleans. The Reichek Fund underwrites all expenses, enabling both singles and couples to enjoy a transformative weekend, reinforcing their southern Jewish identity and generating interesting conversations. "The Reichek Fund has generously addressed the financial and time barriers young professionals may feel, creating opportunities for expanded Jewish community and education," explains Rabbi Fixler.

These experiences have been a win-win for everyone involved. "I have received multiple thank you notes from participants who went on these trips," shares Robert. "We can see how it's making a difference and we are excited to continue our support. It's so satisfying to watch this unfold...and more than I ever hoped for."

Leading by Example

Both Emanu El students and young professionals have benefitted from a concept former Board president Ed Wulfe, of blessed memory, envisioned for developing leaders in our congregation. "Ed always expressed the importance of consensus building and listening, and making sure that everyone's voice counted," shares his wife. Lorraine. "He echoed the need for 'servant leadership,' a phrase coined by Robert Greenleaf in his essay, The Servant as a Leader. A servant leader focuses on the growth and well-being of people and the communities to which they belong. They share the power, put the needs of others first, and help people develop and perform as highly as possible. In Ed's mind, the best leader is one who can touch your heart," she explains. "The Ed Wulfe Youth Leadership Fund was established with this goal in mind."
