FROM RABBI HAYON



By recommitting ourselves to shunning baseless hatred of our neighbors and fellow citizens, we contribute to the vital work of nurturing kindness and unity, and fortifying harmony in our neighborhoods.

In the middle of our summer calendars, falling in the hottest season of the year, is a Jewish holiday that is often largely overlooked in Reform communities. The holiday, which begins this year in the evening of **August 12**, is Tisha B'Av, the ninth day of the Hebrew month of Av. Tisha B'Av is a somber day of memory, dedicated to fasting and mourning for the destruction of the great Temple in ancient Jerusalem.

The reason that Tisha B'Av is observed only minimally in Reform Judaism is because, while we recognize the tragedy of the destruction of the Temple, we recognize that the end of cultic worship and animal sacrifice was a necessary precondition for the Judaism we know and love today: a religion lived in synagogues, study halls, and academies of learning all over the globe – not simply in the Holy Land. It is difficult to feel genuinely nostalgic for forms of faith and worship we have no intention of replicating or returning to, but to jettison completely the observance of Tisha B'Av is an unhelpful overcorrection.

When looking back at the destruction of the Temple a century or two after the catastrophe, the rabbis of ancient Israel offered an enduring moralistic teaching. Although in a literal sense, the Temple was destroyed by the invading

Roman legions, the rabbis suggested that there was a deeper spiritual calculus at play beneath the surface. Since God is all-powerful, they reasoned, and since the fate of the Jews are held in God's hands, surely God intended to teach us some sort of lesson by allowing the Romans to destroy the Temple. What, then, was the spiritual lesson God meant for us to learn from Tisha B'Av?

The rabbis' conclusion was that God permitted the cataclysmic destruction of the Temple in order to teach the people about the grave consequences of what they called "sinat chinam" – groundless hatred between people. Society during the Roman era had become increasingly unkind, self-centered, and callous, they pointed out, and as a result, God needed to deliver a powerful shock to Jewish society to convince them to wake up from their complacency and unkindness, and recommit themselves to acts of compassion, patience and tenderness for others. For the ancient rabbis, then, the spiritual agenda of observing Tisha B'Av was less about a romantic yearning for the Temple, and more

about the spiritual necessity of eliminating gratuitous hatred and hostility from our communities.

Seen from this perspective, Tisha B'Av retains a deep and useful value for Reform Jews today. Although our contemporary lives in Houston's Jewish community seems endlessly far away from our distant ancestors' worship rites in the Temple in Jerusalem, the critical importance of combating *sinat chinam* is timelessly relevant. By recommitting ourselves to shunning baseless hatred of our neighbors and fellow citizens, we contribute to the vital work of nurturing kindness and unity, and fortifying harmony in our neighborhoods. The ancient rabbis' spiritual gloss on the tragic destruction of the great Temple can help us – even today – to build a stronger and more compassionate community, so that the suffering and loss of the past can help bring about a more empathetic and compassionate future.


Expecting moms are invited to sample one class as a 'preview' before their little one arrives to meet some of the other moms and hear their testimonies.



the world: How could a family of whom nobody had ever heard of, who lived a comfortable but in no way extraordinary life, give such a high amount of money?



BOOK REVIEW:

Not From Here, the Song of America by Leah Lax **Tuesday, September 17, 6:00 p.m.**

Not From Here, the Song of America is a powerful book by author Leah Lax relating the amazing true stories of immigrants and refugees who fled to the United States from around the world. It relates their struggles and determination to make a new life in America despite obstacles and hardship. These are the stories of immigrants prepared to risk everything in order to survive, never giving up hope of achieving the American dream. The book will be reviewed by the author, who, in writing the book, uncovered the lost history of her own Jewish family and discovered a larger context for her own family story. The stories in this book demonstrate that all Americans are also immigrants.

About the author: Leah Lax joined the Lubavitcher Hasidim at age 16. She entered an arranged marriage at age 19 and lived in the Hasidic community with her husband and seven children for 30 years. In 2002, she left that community to lead a secular life and live openly as a gay woman. She later graduated from the University of Houston with an MFA in Creative Writing. She had earlier completed her undergraduate studies at the University of Texas at Austin.

SBMIE 2024: Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience

The participants on the Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience trip returned home safely on Saturday, July 6, having had the experience of a lifetime. Following the emotional heaviness – and physical beauty – of our time in Poland, we arrived in an Israel that was very different from our previous visits.

In any other year, we would have been surrounded by crowds of visitors and crossing paths with numerous other groups of teens and young adults from all over the world. This summer, we were welcomed to an Israel almost completely devoid of tourists. Shops and restaurants were eerily empty. At many of the museums and historical sites we visited, we were the only group there. We saw only two Birthright buses in three weeks, rather than the dozens we would have expected. Hotels were still hosting Israeli families, both vacationers and those displaced from their homes, but were empty of foreigners.

Based on the list provided to us by our partners at RootOne, it is likely that we were the only group of teens from the U.S. in all of Israel for the first couple of weeks we were there. It was not until the penultimate night of our trip that we crossed paths with another teen group (from NFTY/Habonim Dror), and they were just beginning their travels.

It is a testament to Congregation Emanu El's dedication to Israel education, and a reflection of the trust that our families put in our leadership team, that we were able to do what so few other organizations could in putting together this trip at this time. Our participants rose to the occasion, representing our community beautifully in their respect for, and eagerness to engage with, the places and people we visited. They received well-deserved compliments everywhere we went.

The major benefit to the quiet was that it allowed us to get to know Israelis in a much more personal way. Our presence was noted and appreciated – and not just by vendors. Everywhere we went, people were curious about us, approaching the group to thank us for coming and to learn about where we came from. While we did not experience any sirens or alerts, and only changed one day's plans for security reasons, we did modify our itinerary whenever possible to lean in to personal connection with Israelis. For example, on our Friday night in Jerusalem, we were unexpectedly invited to join the community of our kibbutz hotel for a special Kabbalat Shabbat with music, dancing and treats, before heading to services — a moment of connection that transcended any language barriers.

Our speakers included not only politicians and journalists – and an inspiring Holocaust survivor – but also several young adults, who shared both their current/recent experience in the IDF and their visions for a brighter future. We also added several days of volunteering: with Leket, Israel's largest food bank; with the Jaffa Institute, a social services organization working in some of Tel Aviv's poorest neighborhoods; with Yad LaKashish, an organization supporting the elderly in Jerusalem through arts education and artisanal workshops; and with Galgal Hozer, an organization providing food, clothing, and other necessities to people in Netivot and the Gaza Envelope area. In each encounter, we saw firsthand how much Israel needs our support and values our presence, especially now.

Thanks to our partnership with RootOne, and the Houston Jewish Community's relationship with the Leo Baeck Education Center in Haifa, our students also had an unprecedented opportunity to build deep relationships with a group of Israeli teens. In our first week in Israel, we spent a full day at Leo Baeck, gathering first for icebreakers, conversation, and lunch with 15 Israeli teens and their teachers, and then for a special Pride Shabbat service with Ohel Abraham, the Reform congregation associated with the school, after which the Israeli teens returned with us to our hotel for Shabbat dinner and more time to visit.

Individual Israeli teens from the group met up with us throughout our time in Haifa, hanging out with our teens at the beach and hotel. Later, five of the Israeli teens attended a leadership development session provided by RootOne/Mosaic, after which they spent four full days with our group in Jerusalem, sharing hotel rooms, meals and activities with our teens. The mifgash (gathering) ended with a bittersweet Havdalah, at which we all said "l'hitraot" – we'll see you again!

While we still had another week left of our trip, during which we explored the beauty and diversity of Israel's south, this moment encapsulated our feelings about Israel and the trip overall. We are grateful to have had this time to get to know Israel so deeply, and to support the Israeli people during such a challenging moment, and we cannot wait to return.

We are grateful to the Barish family, and their extraordinary support of Israel education, for making this gift to our students possible.
