FROM RABBI HAYON



There is little merit in setting unrealistically grand expectations for ourselves if it will be impossible for us to attain them.

This month we enter the Hebrew month of Elul, during which we're directed to prepare ourselves mentally and emotionally for the heavy spiritual work of the Days of Awe before they arrive next month. Jewish tradition instructs us to use this time to plan deliberately for how we will use our time for repentance and atonement during those holy days.

Like all things, however, it is possible for us to err in our preparations by spending too much time planning. The 19th century Chasidic master Rabbi Hayim of Zanz cautions us against this misstep in the following parable:

There was once a poor country farmwoman who had many children. No matter how the children begged for food, she had very little to give them. One day, much to her delight, she found an egg.

She gathered her children and exclaimed: "Children, our troubles are over. I've found an egg! But because I am clever, I will not eat the egg. Instead, I will ask our neighbor for permission to set it under her hen until a chick is hatched. Oh, I am a clever woman! And we will not eat the chick, but will let her grow until she lays eggs, and those eggs will hatch into chickens. And those chickens, in turn, will lay many more eggs, and we'll have many chickens and many eggs. Oh, I am a

clever woman! We will not eat any of the chickens or the eggs, but will sell them and buy a heifer. And we will not eat the heifer, but will raise her into a cow, and will wait until she calves. And we will not eat her then, either, and we'll have many cows and many calves. Oh, I am a clever woman! And then I'll sell all the cows and all the calves and buy a field, and we'll have land and crops and livestock to graze, and we won't need anything more!"

As she continued speaking in this way, she was absentmindedly playing with the egg. All of a sudden, the egg slipped from her hands and broke on the ground.

Rabbi Hayim taught: "And so it is with us. Before the High Holy Days arrive, everyone plans for the great acts of repentance and self-improvement they will undertake. We think to ourselves, 'I'll do this, and I'll do that.' But the days slip by while we are engaged in idle deliberation, and our grand thoughts never lead to action. What's worse, one who makes such great resolutions may fall even lower after noting that they have failed to attain their lofty goals for these holiest of

days. Therefore, let every person exercise great caution not to occupy themselves with great spiritual goals which they will be unable to attain, God forbid!" The rabbi's teaching is unexpected, perhaps, and surprising: could a great spiritual master such as Rabbi Hayim of Zanz really have counseled his followers to avoid setting ambitious spiritual goals for themselves?

Upon reflection, the wisdom of Rabbi Hayim's parable begins to shine through. There is little merit in setting unrealistically grand expectations for ourselves if it will be impossible for us to attain them. That experience will only serve to diminish our confidence in ourselves and discourage us from pushing ourselves toward objectives which are rigorous but achievable. Instead, let us set spiritual goals for ourselves which we can realistically expect to achieve; even if these plans are relatively modest, by accomplishing them, we will accrue greater feelings of confidence in ourselves, which will then allow us to plan for ever larger and more ambitious goals for ourselves in subsequent years.

As the High Holy Days approach, the time is now right for us to begin planning how we will use these sacred days for growth and self-improvement. Let us plan thoughtfully about how we hope to make ourselves better in the coming year, building plans and goals for ourselves which are grand enough to be meaningful, but modest enough to remain realistically within our grasp.



Often these voters are overlooked by other campaigns or difficult to reach by phone or door-knocking.

In partnership with the Center for Muslim & Christian Studies, Houston, Congregation Emanu El will be hosting an academic course on Qu'ran and Torah on Friday nights **September 13 – December 13** (except October 11) from **7:30 p.m. – 9:30 p.m.**, with an optional dinner starting at 7:00 p.m. The course will be taught by Dr. Ida Glaser and Khurram Rehmatullah of CMCS, and Stefani Carlson, Director of Lifelong Learning of Congregation Emanu El, and will include participation by international students and guest teachers. The course will introduce students to the concept of reading the holy books of different faith traditions together. Students will develop skills in intertextual reading through a series of studies of characters common to the Torah and the Ou'ran, from Adam to Moses.

The course may be audited or taken for CMCS Houston credit or for credit through another institution. Auditing students who complete the class and group participation and short writing assignments will be awarded a certificate of completion. Dinner will be provided by Houston Catering Concepts and the cost is \$5 per person for members and \$10 per person for community guests. The deadline to register is **September 6**.




New Member Brunch Sunday, September 15, 12:00 p.m.



BOOK REVIEW:

Not From Here, the Song of America by Leah Lax **Tuesday, September 17, 6:00 p.m.**


Not From Here, the Song of America is a powerful book by author Leah Lax relating the amazing true stories of immigrants and refugees who fled to the United States from around the world. It relates their struggles and determination to make a new life in America despite obstacles and hardship. These are the stories of immigrants prepared to risk everything in order to survive, never giving up hope of achieving the American dream.

The book will be reviewed by the author, who, in writing the book, uncovered the lost history of her own Jewish family and discovered

a larger context for her own family story. The stories in this book demonstrate that all Americans are also immigrants.

Leah Lax joined the Lubavitcher Hasidim at age 16. She entered an arranged marriage at age 19 and lived in the Hasidic community with her husband and seven children for 30 years. In 2002, she left that community to lead a secular life and live openly as a gay woman. She later graduated from the University of Houston with an MFA in Creative Writing. She had earlier completed her undergraduate studies at the University of Texas at Austin.

GENERAL INFORMATION

CHILDCARE

Registration in advance MUST be received in order to prepare for the appropriate number of caregivers. The cost is \$10 per child, per service. ACCESSIBILITY

The only reserved seats during the High Holy Days are for those that request this access ahead of time. When contacting Christian, please include the services you plan to attend. Those requesting accessible seating may be granted a maximum of four additional seats for family members. Please note this seating will be released 15 minutes prior to the beginning of services.

HEARING LOOP

The Barish Sanctuary is equipped with an Induction Loop System which transmits audio signals directly to one's telecoil (T-coil)-equipped hearing aid.

CLOSED CAPTIONING

To ensure those who are hard of hearing can enjoy and participate in our beautiful High Holy Day services, we will be providing closed captioning for all Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur services in the Barish Sanctuary except for the children's services.

For those watching remotely, we intend to use the StreamText platform and will provide the appropriate URL in upcoming synagogue communications.
