FROM RABBI HAYON



Gazing upon the tent of worship they had built, shining in the dark desert, they saw clearly – as we soon will too – how marvelous it feels to participate in building a place where holiness may dwell.


According to a well-known legend, the great Hasidic master Rabbi Menachem Mendel of Kotzk was once visited by a group of his disciples. He turned to them and asked a provocative question: "Where does God live?" Laughing, they responded, "What a thing to ask! God is everywhere, and the whole earth is full of God's presence!"


The great rabbi rebuked them with a slight smile, and proceeded to answer his own question: "God dwells wherever we let God in."

Some of Judaism's holiest writings describe our ancestors' efforts to build dwelling-places for God. During their wanderings in the wilderness, the ancient Israelites lovingly constructed a portable sanctuary dedicated to the worship of the Eternal. Upon their arrival in the Promised Land, they erected a great Temple on a Jerusalem hilltop, to which Jews throughout the region made seasonal pilgrimages to bring their offerings to God. After the Temple was destroyed and our forefathers were scattered in a worldwide diaspora, they built synagogues in every place they called home. We Jews have built holy spaces for ourselves in virtually every corner of the world: Europe and the Middle East, North Africa and Asia, the Americas and the islands of the Pacific Ocean.

In each generation, we have heard echoes of God's ancient directive from the Torah: "Let them build a holy place,

that I may dwell among them" (Exodus 25:8). Throughout the centuries, each time we have set ourselves to the sacred work of creating enduring spaces for study, gathering and prayer, these endeavors have been made possible by the material and spiritual support of the entire community.

Today, our congregation stands together to begin a new historic undertaking in the life of our synagogue. Last month we officially announced the commencement of an ambitious capital improvement project for our campus, and a fundraising campaign called "L'Dor VaDor: For Emanu El's Future" to support it.

This initiative, which is described in detail in the L'Dor VaDor mailed to your homes, represents a momentous new chapter in our congregation's history, and the long-awaited fulfillment of a campus master plan that our predecessors imagined and hoped for. It also comprises vital elements of security, accessibility, and hospitality to enable Emanu El to fully execute our mission and vision for robust and transformative Jewish life in the 21st century. I hope that all of you have taken the time to explore the details of the plan laid out in these campaign materials, and I urge you to visit the webpage about L'Dor VaDor at www.emanuelhouston.org/forourfuture/ for more information.

Our ancestors knew well that any significant effort of this sort required broad and enthusiastic support from the entire community. The Book of Exodus includes a stern instruction from God before the Israelites could begin the work of constructing their tabernacle in the desert: "You shall accept gifts from every person whose heart is moved!" (25:2) God knew – as we do – that the project to expand and enhance our historic campus will require everyone's help if it is to succeed. I am asking you to join me in making whatever meaningful gift you can give to ensure that this exciting project will become a reality.

It is true, of course, that God's presence exists everywhere. What makes a place holy is the purpose and principles shared by those who spend time there. It is our willingness to "let God in" that enables us to feel the Divine presence in our community and in the softest parts of our generous hearts.

What made our ancestors' ancient wilderness tabernacle so wondrous was the widespread and open-hearted impulse throughout the entire community that moved everyone to donate their own meaningful gifts: a silver shekel here, a wooden spool or skein of colored yarn there. And when they did, every member of our ancient people giving the gifts of their hearts, the construction of that holy marvel was quickly completed. Gazing upon the tent of worship they had built, shining in the dark desert, they saw clearly – as we soon will too – how marvelous it feels to participate in building a place where holiness may dwell.



Rodeo Tot Shabbat


Friday, March 1 Dinner 5:45 p.m., Service 6:15 p.m.

The Project

The L'Dor VaDor capital campaign will fund a transformational construction project to expand Emanu El's learning and gathering spaces and ensure a welcoming, secure, and accessible campus for all. The cornerstone of the project will be the Jerold B. Katz Family Center for Jewish Learning, a new two-story education and multipurpose building that will replace the temporary classrooms adjacent to the Gaylor Parking Facility.

Our goal is to raise \$20 million with your help.

- // Single point of entry for entire campus adjoining the Gaylor Parking Structure
- // Reception area that also serves as a security point
- // Eight state-of-the-art Helfman Religious School classrooms
- // Flexible multipurpose spaces for education classes, parent groups, lectures, meetings, life-cycle celebrations, and social gatherings
- // New Sisterhood shop located on the first floor near the new entrance
- // Modernized and expanded restrooms that are accessible to people with disabilities
- // Enclosed courtyard for outdoor programming
- // Second floor skybridge to connect Jerold B. Katz Family Center for Jewish Learning with existing education building, combining all buildings into a single unified campus

Emanu El Teens Participate in L'taken Social Justice Seminar

In January, nine of Emanu El's teens traveled to Washington, DC for a long weekend to participate in the L'taken Social Justice Seminar, a program hosted by the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, our movement's advocacy and justice arm.

Our temple's teens, along with Rabbi Fixler and Becca Schwartzberg (Youth and Young Adult Engagement Coordinator), joined about 300 other high school students from around the country. They spent three days learning about the American legislative process and our movement's approaches to various social justice issues, including economic justice, reproductive freedom, LGBTQ+ rights, and climate justice.

Then, on Monday morning, these well informed and newly empowered teens went to Capitol Hill to lobby the offices of their senators and representatives on the issues about which they are passionate. Our students visited the offices of Senators Cornyn and Cruz and Representatives Fletcher and Green and lobbied on antisemitism, voting rights, and gun violence prevention.

Rabbi Fixler says, "It was incredibly powerful to watch these teens stand in the offices of their congresspeople and deliver their speeches with passion and conviction. They spoke beautifully and powerfully, and our congregation could not be more proud." The program was transformative for our students. Here are a few of their reflections:
