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THE ROOK IE JAIME BARRIA

Jaime Barria sailed through the minor leagues in 2017, posting solid earned run averages in each of his three stops — Inland Empire (A Ball, 2.48), Mobile (AA, 3.21) and Salt Lake (AAA, 2.45).

So it came as no surprise early in the 2018 season when Angel starters Matt Shoemaker and Andrew Heaney were forced to the disabled list with injuries that Barria got the call to the majors. No surprise to anyone — except Jamie Barria.

"I'm only 21 years old," Barria said at the time (he turned 22 on July 18). "I thought this moment would come, just not so soon."

But the rookie from Panama pitched well beyond his age, becoming a consistent winner and solid starter for an Angel

rotation that had been hit hard by injuries all season and, in reality, previous seasons as well.

How hard hit? In early July, eight of the nine potential starting pitchers for the Angels this season had been on the disabled list. Barria was the only one not injured.

Barria had carved out quite a nice resume in the minors including making the California League Mid-Season All-Star team in 2017, being selected to the Futures Game (where he pitched one scoreless inning and struck out two batters) and twice being named the Angels Pitcher of the Month. He had risen to the No. 6 prospect in the organization — this after signing as an international free agent back in 2013 when he was just 17 years old.

On June 1, Barria threw six shutout innings against Texas and 45-year-old Bartolo Colon in a 6-0 Angel win. It was the largest age gap in Angel history (21 years, 318 days). "When he debuted, I was barely one year old," Barria said of Colon. "It's really impressive. It was a great moment to share with him and watch him pitch."

The club's gifted defender at shortstop, Andrelton Simmons,

has had high praise for the rookie.

"He's been amazing the whole year. He's not fazed at all. It doesn't matter who he's pitching against, he's always composed. They might get a couple hits here and there but he comes back at hitters and that's all you can ask of a pitcher, especially a young guy."

Angels skipper Mike Scioscia agreed.

"His poise is well beyond what you would expect a young 21-yearold coming up to the Major Leagues," Scioscia said. "Anytime you have outings like he's had, it can't help but make your footprints a little bit deeper.

"He's shown us a lot. He's shown us a lot coming through our Minor League system, and he's shown us a lot in the looks he's had so far in the major leagues."

From May 3 to June 1, Barria won four straight decisions, the longest win streak for any Angel pitcher this season.

"He has a tremendous future in front of him. He can be an anchor in our rotation for years to come if he continues to grow and learn," said pitching coach Charles Nagy.

Barria is also not the first player from Panama to grace the Angel roster — Hall of Famer Rod Carew is a Panamanian (as is Yankee legend Mariano Rivera).

"Mariano was a legend because I pitched," said Barria. "I loved how he attacked hitters. The hitters knew the cutter was coming, but it didn't matter."

And now it is Barria who is carving out his own legacy in the game.

The minor leagues of baseball are embedded with thousands of prospects. They're young, green, new to the game, full of wideeyed optimism. The dream of "The Show" drives them as they tumble along back roads in busses and vans from one small town to the next.

For a 14th round draft selection like Justin Anderson, the road seems longer, harder. Uphill.

Hope is the constant companion. Reality a far distant, rarely discussed, relative. The towns and the years whiz by: Orem in 2014, Burlington in '15, Inland Empire in '16, Mobile in 2017.

But here it is in 2018 and there he is in the middle of the Angel locker room and Angel bullpen. None other than Justin Anderson.

"They called me when I was in [triple A] Salt Lake. The next thing I knew I was in Houston with the Angels and warming up in the bullpen. I had called my family and my girlfriend Briana because I'm from that part of Texas. They were all in Houston when I got on the mound for the first time.

"I lost it," said the right-hander, who learned that the Angels were playing the Astros in a text from his girlfriend. "I was like, 'You gotta be kidding me," he told the *Los Angeles Times*.

"I did not see this coming at all. I kinda was feeling like I could make a push this year, definitely. For it to come as fast as it did was totally unexpected.

"I guess there was a big crowd but I could only hear my family. I was so focused."

It was April 23 and Anderson pitched one scoreless inning. In his first seven games, he didn't allow a run while striking out 15 batters in 10.2 innings.

A month later, May 23, he got his first Major League win in Toronto.

"It was all a blur, those first two or three days," Anderson recalled. Those folks in the stands in Houston might well have been the only ones who believed Justin Anderson would make it to the big leagues. After all, he was a 25-year-old who began the season in AA Mobile and with a career minor league record of 21-27.

But he made some adjustments this past off-season. Enough adjustments it turns out that changed his game from suspect to prospect.

"I worked out at the Texas Sports Center back home, made adjustments and continued to make changes when I got to spring training. It was a combination of things I was working on: velocity, spin and location were all together."

"This guy's stuff is really good, but he gets hit," his agent Jay Franklin said. "The stuff is really good, but there was no angle. The fastball would be flat. The breaking ball would be flat. You have to have tilt and deception to keep those guys at the Major League level off it."

Anderson's role with the Angels has been flexible in the first two months. He's been a middle-inning reliever and a closer.

"I am just here to do whatever the team needs me to do," says Anderson.

"He's prepared long and hard for this opportunity," Manager Mike Scioscia said. "Through trial and error, he's figured out some things that will make him a more dynamic pitcher."

With a fastball that sits just under 100 miles an hour and a wicked slider, Anderson's stay in an Angels uniform could be quite long.

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












The 2018 season marks the Halos' 53rd season at Angel Stadium, their home for 53 of their 58 seasons. After spending their first five years of existence playing at Wrigley Field and Chavez Ravine, the Angels landed in their new home in Orange County. Since opening the doors for its first exhibition game April 9, 1966, Angel Stadium has played host to some of the Club's memorable events including seven Western Division clinching games (1979, 1982, 1986, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2014), three All-Star Games (1967, 1989 and 2010) and the 2002 World Series, including the Angels Game 7 victory over the San Francisco Giants to clinch the franchise's first championship. Angel Stadium has also seen several individual Halos leave their indelible marks on the game of baseball. Whether it be the four Angels no-hitters, Rod Carew's 3,000th hit, Reggie Jackson's 500th home run, Don Sutton's 300th win or Albert Pujols' 600th home run, Angel Stadium has housed some of Major League Baseball's most prestigious accomplishments.

Presently, Angel Stadium sits as baseball's fourth-oldest ballpark, trailing only Boston's Fenway Park, Chicago's Wrigley Field and Los Angeles' Dodger Stadium. Affectionately known as "The Big A", Angel Stadium has seen over 116 million fans pass through its gates since 1966, including a current stretch of 15 consecutive seasons of three million fans, a streak only the Angels and Yankees have achieved since 2003.

After an Aug. 31, 1964 groundbreaking ceremony, Anaheim Stadium, as it was originally known, was completed in 1966 at a cost of \$24 million.

The facility's centerpiece was a giant A-frame scoreboard standing 230 feet high and was the source of the stadium's nickname.

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With a seating capacity of 43,250, Anaheim Stadium was built with "Convenience, Comfort and Courtesy" in mind. Narrow foul territory areas and quickly rising decks gave fans an up-close view of the action. Gradually inclined ramps, escalators, wide aisles and helpful ushers as well as three surrounding free ways, 26 entrance lanes and 28 exit lanes added to the Big A's accessibility.

Anaheim Stadium under went construction to enclose the stadium in 1979 for additional seating to accommodate the football Rams. Seating capacity was increased to 64,593 for baseball and more than 70,000 for football. A total of 108 executive style boxes were added to surround the rear of the Club Level. In addition to the Stadium Club, there were two other private dining areas designed for groups — the Stadium Pavilion and the Football Press Box.

At that time, the Big A board was preserved and moved to the edge of the parking lot adjacent to the Orange Freeway behind the right field area.

When the Rams left for St. Louis, Anaheim Stadium's primary tenant remained the Angels, who originally signed a 35-year contract (through 2001). Renovations began Oct. 1, 1996, to revert the 30-year old structure back to a baseball only facility and the ballpark was renamed Edison International Field. The total cost for the stadium renovation was estimated at \$100 million and the project was completed in time for the

Angels Opening Day, April 1, 1998. New enhancements were added all around the ballpark but perhaps the most noticeable is the center field waterfalls and rock formation that come together to form an "A". Settled inside the waterfall's rapids are water geysers that originally shot water into the air whenever an Angels player hit a home run.

Other unique features of Angel Stadium include terraced bullpens in the outfield, widened concourses, new restroom and concession areas, familyoriented seating sections, state-of-the-art club-level and dugout-level suites, a youth-oriented interactive game area and landscaped courtyards (with statues in remembrance of Gene Autry and Michelle Carew).

In addition, Angel Stadium includes two full-service restaurants: The Knot Hole Club (a sports bar located at the club level down the right field line) and The Diamond Club (an upscale restaurant with outdoor seating on the field level behind home plate). In 2014, the newest luxury seating area was added to the ballpark with the opening of HALO, now known as the Don Julio Club.

During the 2016 and 2017 offseasons, Angel Stadium underwent several major upgrades. The first round of improvements began immediately following the 2016 season when a new state of the art LED stadium light system were installed. This past offseason, Angel Stadium received one of it's largest technological enhancements to date. The new right field display is currently the third largest in Major League Baseball at 9,500 square feet and features 7.7 million LEDs. Eight ribbon displays totaling 1,168 feet in length were installed along the seating fascia to provide additional statistics and graphics. The largest of these included the entire

Also installed prior to the 2018 season was a new state-of-the art sound system. The main seating bowl now has 300 speakers plus more than 50 subwoofers and is powered by 200,000 watts.

With the enhancements made throughout the course of the last several years, Angel Stadium proudly maintains the title of the fourth-oldest ballpark in the Majors while offering its guests access to some of the latest technological amenities. As a result, Angel Stadium continues to be one of Southern California's most unique sports venues.

Nestled in the corner of the Angel Stadium parking lot is one of the ballpark's most recognizable features, "The Big A" message board. With the completion of Anaheim Stadium in 1966, the facility's centerpiece was a giant A-frame scoreboard standing 230 feet high. At the time, it was the largest scoreboard ever constructed and became the source of the stadium's nickname. The Big A's original home was just beyond the left field wall where it served as the facility's main scoreboard for over a decade. When the stadium underwent construction to accommodate the Los Angeles Rams in 1979, The Big A was preserved and moved to its current location in the southeastern corner of the parking lot, adjacent to the 57 freeway. Contractors used a 125-ton crane and two large dollies to move the structureover 1,200 feet across the stadium lots.

The Angels have long utilized The Big A to celebrate each of the clubs victories. After every Angel win, both home and road, the 70-foot wide halo atop the Big A is illuminated for fans both inside the ballpark and out to see. It is customary for the halo to remain lit until dawn the day following a victory. The Angels are one of the few sports franchises whose post-victory tradition signals a win to all within sight of their facility.

Since its construction in 1966, The Big A has undergone several modifications and facelifts. The scoreboard's original color palette was all white with a gold halo before becoming green, gold and beige when the stadium was renamed Edison Field. In February, 2002, with the club switching their uniform scheme back to red as the primary color, the Big A was painted red and beige. The landmark then underwent additional changes after the 2009 season when the structure was painted all red. A new full-color display was added to the front facade replacing the former dot-matrix board and a new halo was placed at the top. A third extensive renovation took place prior to the 2018 season as part of AngelStadium's overall enhancements. The Big A received a new LED marquee, illuminated Angel Stadium sign, fresh coats of paint with a new modernized LED Halo adorning the top of the famed structure.

As it currently sits, the Club has the ability to display full pictures, texts and graphics as well as turn the halo nearly any color it desires. The most commonly displayed colors on the structure's crown are red, white, blue, green and orange.





In May of 2003, Carole and Arte Moreno were introduced as the third owners in Angels franchise history and their impact was immediate. The Moreno's have guided the franchise to six A.L. West Division titles and 15

consecutive seasons drawing over three million fans, resulting in a total home attendance over 46 million in their tenure.

The Morenos' focus is balanced between baseball, business operations and fan experience. In 2009, the Halos were voted the top franchise in professional sports in "Fan Value and Experience" by voters in a fan poll by *ESPN the Magazine*. In the poll, the Angels ranked in the top three among Major League teams for 10 consecutive seasons (2003-2012).

Carole and Arte's support of the baseball operations department has culminated in key free agent signings of players such as three time N.L. MVP Albert Pujols, nine-time Gold Glove outfielder Torii Hunter, 2009 World Series MVP Hideki Matsui, 2005 A.L. Cy Young Award winner Bartolo Colon, 2004 A.L. MVP Vladimir Guerrero, and several others. In 2014, the Moreno's signed two time A.L. MVP Mike Trout to a six-year contract extension and recently committed to a five-year deal with Justin Upton.

Since purchasing the Club on May 22, 2003, the Angels have sported a 1292-1094 record (.541 winning pct.). During the family's tenure, the organization has continued to cultivate players from its farm system. Their dedication has paid dividends in the development of significant players such as Trout, Gold Glove outfielder Kole Calhoun, Garrett Richards, C.J. Cron, Matt Shoemaker and Cam Bedrosian among several others.

Over the past 15 years, Carole and Arte have strengthened the Club's commitment to local communities and beyond. In January of 2004, the Moreno's established the Angels Baseball Foundation concentrating on investments in education, health care, arts & sciences and community-related youth programs to experience the positive attributes of baseball. The Angels Foundation distributes annual grants to various programs within Southern California. In 2010, the Angels were privileged to host their third All-Star Game (also 1967 & 1989). In conjunction with MLB's All-Star Legacy Fund, the foundation funded renovation of softball fields at Anaheim's Pioneer Park (into the MLB Angels All-Star Complex) as well as the special-surfaced field for the Miracle League of Orange County for disabled youth. The foundation regularly donates tickets, memorabilia and ballpark experiences to the various groups and fundraisers.

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In addition to their responsibilities with the Angels and various committees within MLB, the Moreno's were part of ownership of the former Single-A Salt Lake Trappers of the Pioneer League. Under their leadership, the Trappers won three championships. Carole and Arte were also original investors in the Arizona Diamondbacks (including their 2001 World Series championship) and in a partnered ownership of the NBA's Phoenix Suns.

The Moreno family is also active in their own philanthropic efforts. In 1997, Carole and Arte established the Moreno Family Foundation to support nonprofit organizations focusing on youth and education as well as investing in educational scholarships in K-8, high school and college. Their favorite charities include St. Vincent de Paul, St. Mary's Food, Bank the Barrow Neurological Institute, Boys & Girls Clubs, United Methodist Outreach Ministries (UMOM) family homeless shelters, American Heart Association and Fresh Start Women's Foundation. The Moreno's were previously members of the Little League Foundation's Board of Trustees, which assists Little Leagues in every state and more than 70 other countries.

Carole was born in Reno, NV, and moved often as the daughter of a career Air Force man. She spent much of her youth in Fredonia, KS, and went on to earn a degree in journalism from the University of Kansas. Arte is native of Tucson, AZ, and served his country in Vietnam as a member of the U.S. Army. After his tour of duty, he attended the University of Arizona, graduating with a degree in marketing. In 2005, *Time Magazine* selected Moreno as one of the 25 Most Influential Hispanics in America. Carole and Arte Moreno are parents of three children.





DENNIS KUHL, CHAIRMAN

Dennis Kuhl begins his 15th season with the Angels after joining the Club on November 10, 2003. He was initially appointed as the Angels' seventh President before a promotion to Club Chairman on Nov. 14, 2009. Kuhl's focus centers on renewed efforts in the area of civic affairs and community outreach. Kuhl also oversees

the Angels' flagship radio station KLAA AM830.

Under his leadership, the Angels have shown tremendous growth and advancement in key business initiatives, including sponsorship and marketing revenues, as well as nationwide expansion and promotion of the Angels' brand. Kuhl also played a key role in working with Major League Baseball in hosting of the 2010 All-Star Game.

Kuhl is actively involved in several Southern California charities. He serves as president of the "Light the Night" event which supports the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society and is a founding board member of The Pacific Club IMPACT Foundation/Lott Trophy. Kuhl works with Susan G. Komen for the Cure serving as one of the "Pink Tie Guys," a select group of advocates speaking out to find a cure for breast cancer. Additionally, he serves on the advisory boards for the South County Outreach, Anaheim Performing Arts Center, Anaheim YMCA, Rivals For The Cure, Irvine Public School Foundation and the Angels Baseball Foundation Board of Directors. A champion of community involvement, Kuhl's efforts span across Orange County and beyond. He is a member of the Board of Governors at Chapman University and on the executive committee for Cycle & Walk for the Cures. He is on the board of directors for several nonprofits: The Children's Education Foundation of Orange County, the Los Angeles Sports Council, Boys and Girls Club of Anaheim, The Tiger Woods Foundation, the Noble Vikings Charity of Orange County, the Literacy Project Foundation and the Alzheimer's Association of Orange County & Newport Beach.

In 2014, Kuhl served as a co-chairperson for the United Cerebral Palsy Golf Classic and a co-chairperson for the annual Red, White & Greens Golf Tournament to benefit the Susan G. Komen Foundation.

A Boonton, N.J. native, Kuhl graduated from the University of Arizona in 1970 with a degree in business administration. In honor of his late father, he established the Bud Kuhl Wood Bat Invitational in 2007 with annual proceeds donated to local charities. Kuhl also initiated scholarships in his father's name to the Eller School of Management at the University of Arizona. In 2009, he was named the 'Business Man of the Year' by the Anaheim Chamber of Commerce. Kuhl currently resides in Newport Beach.



JOHN CARPINO, PRESIDENT

John Carpino was named the eighth president in Angels history on Nov. 14, 2009. At the age of 59, he oversees all areas of business, sales, marketing and communications. Carpino's top priority is the fan's value and experience in all areas of the game including concessions, merchandise, promotional items and ticketing. As the principal

executive in charge of business operations, he has helped the Halos welcome over three million fans through Angel Stadium turnstiles for 15 straight seasons. Carpino was also an integral part of the 2010 MLB All-Star Game, hosted at Angel Stadium, and was involved in the negotiations for the extension of the Club's television agreement with FOX Sports West.

The Chicago native continues to seek out ways to create value for Angel fans, focusing not only on the game inside the lines, but on the entire ballpark experience. Carpino has guided the Angel brand with a focus on affordable pricing and providing a quality family environment. Under his leadership, Carpino's team has also established Angel Stadium as one of the premiere destinations in California for non-baseball events such as concerts, Supercross, Monster Truck and corporate events.

As one of the initial executives Arte Moreno appointed after taking ownership of the Club, the 2018 season marks Carpino's 15th with the team, having previously held the position of senior vice president. Carpino has led the Angels to unprecedented financial growth in the sponsorship, marketing and ticketing divisions. He oversaw the general manager selection processes in 2011 & 2015 and has assisted in the acquisition of high-profile Angels such as Albert Pujols, Andrelton Simmons and Shohei Ohtani. He has created a stronger, more viable partnership with Los Angeles based radio and television partners, and oversees KLAA AM830, the home of Angels Baseball. His vision and creativity have brought an emphasis on the Angels' heritage with a reintroduction of the Angels Hall of Fame with yearly inductees, the hosting of Angels Fan Fests and the celebration of the Angels 50th Anniversary. Popular giveaways have been provided including several Guinness© record-breaking items and items showcasing the continuing popularity of the Rally Monkey. His efforts continue to create a brand that connects socially and in sync with current cultural trends.

Carpino's promotion followed six seasons as the Club's Senior Vice President of Sales and Marketing during which he oversaw all aspects of marketing, promotions and ticket sales for the Angels. He began his professional career in 1982 in the billboard industry, including stints in Tucson, AZ; Chicago, IL; Phoenix, AZ and Los Angeles, CA. In 1985, he joined Moreno at Outdoor Systems, a billboard company (which later became Viacom Outdoor in 2000 and CBS Outdoor in 2005) and spent 18 years in the Phoenix and Los Angeles markets. Carpino oversaw \$200 million in sales for the western region.

Born in Chicago, IL, Carpino is a 1982 graduate of the University of Arizona with a degree in business administration. He currently serves on CHOC Children's Foundation Board of Directors and served for three years on the Executive Board for the Orange County United Way. He and his wife Elizabeth are involved in numerous charitable efforts throughout Southern California and support the Angels Baseball Foundation. John and Elizabeth have three children and reside in Laguna Beach.



BILL BEVERAGE, CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICE

Bill Beverage enters his 15th full season as the Angels Chief Financial Officer after joining the organization in Nov. 2003. As the Angels CFO, his duties include managing the day-to-day finances of the organization.

Prior to his current position, Beverage served

as both controller and CFO during his 18-year career in the outdoor advertising industry.

MOLLY JOLLY, SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION

Molly Jolly became the highest ranking woman in the Angels organization in just her third year with the team (2003) and remains an integral part of the primary operations of the Club. She is in her 18th

season with the Angels as Senior Vice President, Finance & Administration. Molly spent three years (2001-03) as Director of Finance for the Angels and Anaheim Ducks before her current appointment.

A native of Naples, Florida, Molly oversees all financial matters, including strategic initiatives, reporting and planning, budgeting, accounting and payroll. She is also responsible for office administration, including legal and risk management, human resources and information services. Additionally, she oversees financial operations at Angel Stadium for non-baseball events such as Supercross, Monster Jam and concerts.

Before joining the Angels and Ducks in 2001, Molly spent 11 years working for the Atlantic Richfield Company (ARCO), including six years (1989-94) at ARCO Alaska in Anchorage, serving as an Inventory Accountant, Financial Analyst and Electronic Commerce Manager. In 1994, Molly was transferred to ARCO Corporate in Los Angeles where she worked as an Internal Control Advisor and Project Manager. She was promoted in 1996 to Financial Manager and Strategic Planning Senior Consultant for the ARCO Products Company. Molly began her career in 1988 as an auditor for Arthur Anderson LLP in Boston, MA.

A 1988 graduate of Holy Cross with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics/Accounting, Molly graduated from the Anderson School at UCLA with a Masters degree in Business Administration in 1999. Molly is a Board Member and 2nd Vice Chair for the Girl Scouts of Orange County and a past Board Member and Treasurer for CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) and Friends of CASA, as well as a sustaining member of the Junior League of Orange County. In 2016, Molly chaired the Friends of CASA Holiday Luncheon and Fashion Show and in 2011, she was nominated as 'Chief Financial Officer of the Year in Orange County' by the Orange County Business Journal. She and husband Burt reside in Villa Park.



TIM MEAD, VICE PRESIDENT, COMMUNICATIONS

Tim Mead begins his 39th season in the Angels organization and 21st as Vice President of Communications. He oversees media relations, publicity and broadcasting for the Club.

Before his current appointment, Mead spent four seasons as assistant general manager (1994-97)

under former GM Bill Bavasi.

Mead, 59, began his career with the Angels as an intern in the Public Relations Department in 1980. He was appointed director of media relations in 1985 and later assistant vice president of media relations in 1991. During his tenure in media relations, Mead and his staff have been responsible for the handling of media during the Angels' 1986, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2008, 2009 & 2014 postseason appearances, the 1989 and 2010 All-Star Games at Angel Stadium and the Halos memorable World Series run in 2002.

Mead was the recipient of the 2000 Robert O. Fishel Award for PR excellence, recognizing the "active non-uniformed representative of Major League Baseball whose ethics, character, dedication, service, professionalism and humanitarian efforts best represent the standards propounded by Robert O. Fishel." He was also honored in May 2005 with the first Distinguished Alumnus Award for Athletics by his alma mater Cal Poly Pomona. Mead was honored in 2012 by the American Diabetes Association and the Orange County Father's Day Council as one of four

Father of the Year recipients. The award, given annually since 1999, is bestowed to 100 men from across the nation who "portray and epitomize family, citizenship, charity, civility and responsibility in their everyday lives."

In April 2002, Mead took part in the Joint Civilian Orientation Conference (JCOC) designed by the Department of Defense. He was one of 60 civilians chosen by the Pentagon to attend the conference, traveling to the Pentagon, Norfolk Naval Air Station in VA, Sheppard Air Force Base, Sheppard, Texas, Fort Bragg and Camp Lejeune, NC and Ofutt Air Force Base in Omaha, Nebraska to see the United States Strategic Command Center. The trip is designed to present a clearer picture and understanding of the military to civic and community leaders across the country.

The Athens, Greece native is a 1980 graduate of Cal Poly Pomona with a bachelor of science degree in communications. He is a member of the board of directors for the Ronald McDonald House (Orange, CA) and assists other charitable groups and programs such as Amigos de los Niños, the Sunburst Youth Academy and GRIP (Gang Reduction Intervention Program) in Orange County. Mead also serves on the advisory committee for the sports management program at Long Beach State and the Dean's advisory board for the College of Communications at Cal State Fullerton. He and his wife Carole have one son, Brandon.



NEIL VISERTO, VICE PRESIDENT, SALES

Beginning his 10th season with the Club, Viserto is the Angels Vice President of Sales. He oversees sales and marketing of tickets, premium suites, corporate sponsorship and new media. He previously served as the Angels Director and Senior Director of Corporate Sales during his tenure with the team beginning in

2009. Under Viserto's guidance, the Club has seen substantial growth in corporate sponsorship as well as a broader scope of business ventures. In 2017, the Halos drew over three million fans for the 15th consecutive season.

Prior to joining the Angels, Neil held several executive positions in television and sports including sales management positions at WJLA/ABC in Washington, DC; KMEX/Univision in Los Angeles and served as Vice President of Broadcast & Marketing for the Washington Redskins and Vice President, Sportslink LA a division of Adlink Cable Sports sales.

He began his working career as an institutional money market broker for Noonan, Astley & Pearce in New York City before heading to the television and sports industries. Born in NYC, Viserto is a 1986 graduate of Colgate University with a Bachelor of Arts in Economics. Neil and wife Susan reside in Yorba Linda, CA with their two children.





BILLY EPPLER, GENERAL MANAGER

Billy Eppler enters his third campaign as Angels General Manager in 2018. He was named the 12th GM in Club history on October 4, 2015, agreeing to a four-year contract through 2019. Eppler oversees all aspects of the Club's baseball operations and reports to Owner Arte Moreno.

In 2017, the Halos were not eliminated from playoff contention until Game #158 despite several injuries that befell the Club. For the playoff chase, Eppler acquired proven all-stars Justin Upton from Detroit and Brandon Phillips from Cincinnati.

The 2017 off-season was filled with activity for the Angels and Eppler. On November 2nd, the Club agreed to terms on a five-year contract with Upton. With needs at second and third base, Eppler traded for Ian Kinsler (Dec. 13) and signed Zack Cozart (Dec. 15) to a three-year deal. Eppler capped off the Club's winter landing the dual talent Shohei Ohtani from Japan (Dec. 8).

Eppler, 42, is a native of San Diego, CA. He graduated from the University of Connecticut with a Finance Degree in 1998 and began his sports career as an intern in the Washington Redskins scouting department. He started his baseball career with the Colorado Rockies organization, where he was hired in January, 2000 as an area scouting supervisor for Southern California. He would eventually join the front office as the Assistant Director of Pro Scouting & Player Development from 2003-04.

From 2004 through 2015, Eppler worked his way up the New York Yankees baseball operations department. He was initially hired as Assistant Director of Baseball Operations, Nov. 1, 2004. Eppler would eventually be promoted to Director of Professional Scouting from 2006-09 and Senior Director of Professional Personnel from 2010-11. He finished his fourth season as Assistant General Manager and first as Vice-President in '15. His responsibilities for the Yankees and assisting General Manager Brian Cashman included player acquisitions, roster composition and management, staffing and personnel decisions, and player contract negotiations. In addition, he oversaw all phases and personnel in the Yankees' Major League and professional scouting departments both domestically and internationally.

Eppler credits Cashman for much of his professional growth during his time in New York. "I have the utmost respect for Brian and cannot thoroughly thank him for the guidance he has provided."

Eppler and wife Catherine have two sons and reside in south Orange County.



STEVE MARTONE, ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Steve Martone (mar-TONE), 37, came to the Angels in 2016 following nine years in baseball operations with the New York Yankees, including the 2009 World Championship campaign. From 2014-15, he has served as Yankees Manager of Professional Scouting. Originally hired by New York in April of 2006 as

a baseball operations intern, Martone was promoted to Assistant of Baseball Operations in December that same year. In that capacity, he focused on player tracking & data collection, research for arbitration & grievances as well as technology initiatives. In March of 2014, Martone was promoted to Manager, Professional Scouting where he dealt with 40-man roster composition, departmental budget, MLB depth charts and targeting of players.

The Houston, TX native graduated from the University of Houston in 2005. Martone and wife, Laura, have three children.



JONATHAN STRANGIO, ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Jonathan Strangio, 29, enters his seventh year with the Angels in 2018, third as Assistant General Manager. Following the 2014 season, Strangio moved up to Manager, Major League Operations where his responsibilities included 40-man roster construction, rules and CBA compliance, baseball analytics, salary

arbitration, and contract negotiation. He joined the Club as a baseball

operations intern in 2012 before a promotion to Coordinator, Baseball Operations after the 2012 campaign.

A native of Long Island, NY, Strangio graduated from Harvard University in 2010 where he was a four-year varsity pitcher on the Crimson's baseball team. Upon graduation, he was hired by the New York Mets as a baseball operations intern. Strangio and wife Alexandra reside in Los Angeles, CA.

The Angels victory on May 29 in Detroit was by the final score of 9-2.

It was also Mike Scioscia's 1600th career win as a big league manager —all with the Angels — but in addition to reaching a nice, round number the win meant so much more — it surpassed Tommy Lasorda for 20th all-time.

Scioscia of course played his entire 13-year big league playing career under Lasorda with the Dodgers. It was indeed a special moment in baseball history but for the ever-loyal Scioscia currently the longest-tenured manager in all of baseball— he took the accomplishment in stride. Like usual.



He also, as usual, politely deflected the attention away from himself.

"It reflects on our organization that we have been going in the right direction and it has given me the chance to be here long



enough to be part of our fair share of wins. I don't look at it as a personal accomplishment," Scioscia told FOX Sports West.

Scioscia is, however, quick to praise Lasorda, the Hall of Famer and winner of two World Series championships as a skipper...and a man who truly bleeds Dodger Blue.

"He supported me incredibly as a player," Scioscia told the *Orange County Register.* "I know he wants us to do well, but he's very quick to point out, not as well as the Dodgers. He's made that very clear."

The teacher is proud of the student.

"It took a better man than me," Lasorda told the Orange County Register. "He is great. I am happy for him. He is one of the greatest managers and one of the greatest players that God ever put on this earth. I am so proud of him."

Scioscia now ranks second all-time among manager wins with only one franchise. Walter Alston — the Dodger manager before Lasorda — won 2,040 contests over his 23 campaigns in the dugout.

What is VASCEPA?

VASCEPA is a prescription medicine used along with a low-fat and low-cholesterol diet to lower high levels of triglycerides (fats) in adults.

It is not known if VASCEPA changes your risk of having inflammation of your pancreas (pancreatitis).

It is not known if VASCEPA prevents you from having a heart attack or stroke.

It is not known if VASCEPA is safe and effective in children.

Do not take VASCEPA if you are allergic to icosapent ethyl or any of the ingredients in VASCEPA. See the end of this summary for a complete list of ingredients in VASCEPA.

Before taking VASCEPA, tell your doctor about all of your medical conditions, including if you:

- have diabetes.
- have a low thyroid problem (hypothyroidism).
- have a liver problem.
- have a pancreas problem.
- are allergic to fish or shellfish. It is not known if people who are allergic to fish or shellfish are also allergic to VASCEPA.
- are pregnant, or planning to become pregnant. It is not known if VASCEPA will harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. VASCEPA can pass into your milk, and may harm your baby. Talk to your doctor about the best way to feed your baby if you take VASCEPA.

Tell your doctor about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and dietary or herbal supplements.

VASCEPA can interact with certain other medicines that you are taking.

Especially tell your doctor if you take medicines that affect your blood clotting (anticoagulants or blood thinners).

How should I take VASCEPA?

- Take VASCEPA exactly as your doctor tells you to take it.
- Do not change your dose or stop taking VASCEPA without talking to your doctor.
- Do not take more capsules than what is prescribed by your doctor.
 - If you are prescribed the 0.5-gram capsules, you should not take more than 8 capsules each day.
 - If you are prescribed the 1-gram capsules, you should not take more than 4 capsules per day.
- Take VASCEPA capsules whole. Do not break, crush, dissolve, or chew VASCEPA capsules before swallowing.
- If you miss a dose of VASCEPA, take it as soon as you remember. However, if you miss one day of VASCEPA, do not double your dose when you take it.

- Your doctor may start you on a diet that is low in saturated fat, cholesterol, carbohydrates, and low in added sugars before giving you VASCEPA. Stay on this diet while taking VASCEPA.
- Your doctor may do blood tests to check your triglyceride and other lipid levels while you take VASCEPA.

What are the possible side effects of VASCEPA?

If you have liver problems and are taking VASCEPA, your doctor should do blood tests during treatment.

The most common side effect of VASCEPA is joint pain. As with all drugs, you may experience a serious side effect when taking VASCEPA. Talk to your doctor if you have a side effect that bothers you or does not go away.

These are not all the possible side effects of VASCEPA.

Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects. You may report side effects to FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

How should I store VASCEPA?

- Store VASCEPA at room temperature between 68° to 77° F (20° to 25° C).
- Safely throw away medicine that is out of date or no longer needed.

Keep VASCEPA and all medicine out of the reach of children.

General information about the safe and effective use of VASCEPA.

Medicines are sometimes prescribed for purposes other than those listed in Patient Information Leaflets. Do not use VASCEPA for a condition for which it was not prescribed. Do not give VASCEPA to other people, even if they have the same symptoms you have. It may harm them. You can ask your pharmacist or healthcare provider for information about VASCEPA that is written for health professionals.



THEFTIRST 1,000 GAMES PLAYED

Mike Trout played in his 1,000th career game earlier this season....and what a career it has been (so far).

Since making his debut July 8, 2011, the Millville, NJ native has amassed a .308 average with 216 doubles, 43 triples, 224 home runs, 617 RBI, 178 stolen bases and 752 runs scored up until his milestone game. Below you will find a summary of some of Trout's many accomplishments:

- His 224 career home runs are tied with Joe DiMaggio for 17th most all-time by an American Leaguer in their first 1,000 career games.





YES, HE PLAYED FOR THE ANGELS TONY CONIGLIARO

A native of Swampscott, Massachusetts, Tony Conigliaro played the bulk of his career with the Boston Red Sox and hit a home run in his first at-bat at Fenway Park in 1964 at only 19 years old. A year later, he became the youngest player to lead his league in home runs when he hit 32 in 1965, his second full season in the big leagues. He also became the youngest American League player to reach 100 home runs when he hit No. 100 at 22 years and 197 days old, just 65 days older than the major league record holder at the time (Mel Ott - 22 years, 132 days).

Conigliaro's early promise of on-the-field greatness went unfulfilled however after he was struck in the face by a pitch on August 18, 1967 in a game against the Angels. The pitch fractured his left cheekbone, dislocated his jaw and severely damaged the retina in his left eye.

He missed all of the 1968 season but returned to play two more years in Boston, hitting a career-high 36 home runs for the Sox in 1970, when he also drove in 116 runs. He was traded after the season to the Angels, but declining vision led him to announce his retirement in 1971. He attempted another comeback for the Red Sox in 1975, but ended his career after batting just .123 in 69 plate appearances. That year, after an excellent spring training, he made





Boston's regular-season roster and got the team's first hit of that season and later the club's first home run. He was outrighted to Triple-A Pawtucket in mid-June and he retired shortly after.

Conigliaro originally signed with the Red Sox in 1963 after graduation from St. Mary's High School in nearly Lynn. In his only minor league season he hit .363 with 24 homers and 74 RBI in 83 games for Wellsville (earning New York-Penn League MVP Rookie of the Year honors). He broke in with the Red Sox in 1964, and after hitting that homer in his first at-bat at Fenway Park he finished the '64 campaign with a .290 batting average and 24 home runs to earn an All-Rookie selection.

Conigliaro passed away in 1990 after an eight-year struggle to return from a massive heart attack that left him severely handicapped. He was 45 years old.

Tony Conigliaro had a heckuva career while it lasted. Unfortunately, it was cut short due to injury, an injury I was there to witness before briefly playing with Tony Conig or Tony C — that is what I called him — as an Angel.

When I think of Tony as a young player, I think back to the very nice swing he had. It wasn't necessarily a hard swing or a violent swing. He would closely follow every pitch and he didn't get fooled during an at-bat. I will never forget his swing.

He was an All-Star player at a young age but I was on the Angels team bench when the injury occurred. Jack Hamilton — who actually passed away a few months ago — was on the mound for us in Boston. The ball got away from him and it is just that simple. It was up and in and it just got away from him.

As I best recall it, Tony C did not move. He got hit straight on. It was, at least from where I was sitting, like he froze. It is embedded in my brain that he didn't try and move away from it. He just got nailed.

At the time it happened, I would not have thought it would have the lingering effects that it did. You don't think there and then that someone's career might be over. I have actually seen some other guys get hit which initially seemed to be worse than when Tony got hit. Don Mincher got hit by Sam McDowell, and that was a bloody mess, and I think of when Paul Schall — who also just passed away — was hit by Jose Santiago of Boston and that seemed worse. But what happened to Tony cost him his career.

Part of that career included time with the Angels. I remember his last game with us well. He had struck out a few times in that game — we were playing in Oakland I believe — and on his way back to the dugout he pitched his helmet in the air and swung and hit it with his bat. He hit the helmet as square as you could hit in and someone yelled he should hit the ball that hard. I think that is the night he decided to give it up and retire.

And that is unfortunate because you never want to see a serious injury and you never want to see where an injury changes someone's entire career. I feel the way he started out, if he had played 15 years in the big leagues, he would have been in the Hall of Fame.

Clyde Wright won 100 games in the big leagues over a career which spanned 10 seasons, including eight with the Angels from 1966-73. The 1970 season was his best as he won 22 games, was named to the All-Star team and tossed a no-hitter, the first in Angel Stadium.

Mike is blessed with great speed but one of the things that really separates him from other guys in baseball who run well is how he is built overall.

When you look at the way he is built, it does make you scratch your head a little to think he is fast as he is. The best comparison to me is Bo Jackson, who I got to play with. The combination of size and strength and speed is very unique. Another guy who sort of fits that bill was Rickey Henderson though he didn't have the same size as Mike or Bo. Most of the speedy guys are half Mike's size.

Speed plays well for all parts of Mike's game. He can get to those balls in the field more than most guys can get to. At the plate he can beat out a hit that most guys can't beat out. It is also one of the aspects of his game that helped get him on the radar of so many people when he was breaking in with the Angels organization, along with the stolen bases early on.

The stolen bases have come down in recent years, however. When

you are 240 pounds and you are consistently diving into the ground, the body is not meant to take that sort of beating. It can also lead to injury like we saw last year in Miami. At the same time, he is smart enough to make those adjustments and to learn from it. Still it is a big part of his game overall.

I think last year he made an effort to steal more bags and stealing bags is more than just speed. It takes a lot of work. You work on your lead, how you scout the pitchers, how you take that first step. Maybe that came easy to him early on. Other teams make adjustments to your game and, again, he is smart enough to use the speed, which has always been there, and go beyond the cat-and-mouse antics that take place within the game itself. You try and stay ahead of everything in this game as best you can.

HERITAGE GENE AUTRY'S COWBOY CODE

The movies, radio dramas, television episodes and comic books of Gene Autry — Gene Autry the founder and original owner of the Angels — always had storylines with Gene Autry doing the right thing or helping folks make the right choices in tough situations. In the late 1940s a formal code of ethics immerged and was known by his fans as "Gene Autry's Cowboy Code" or the "Cowboy Commandments."

Author Holly George-Warren researched the origins of "Gene Autry's Cowboy Code" and wrote about it in her award-winning book *Public Cowboy No. 1: The Life and Times of Gene Autry.* Here's an excerpt:

Gene's Ten Cowboy Commandments began to evolve from such Autry-related publicity as the item "Nine Cardinal Rules Govern Production of All Autry Films," which ran in the 1949 press book for the film "Riders in the Sky." As early as August 1947, Gene had pronounced cowboy code mandates during his Melody Ranch radio show dramas. Gene's PR team promoted his Cowboy Code, which was referred to in the 1948 Life magazine feature, and fan magazines began to publicize the rules as they evolved. Tenets promoting an ethical, moral and patriotic lifestyle had an affinity to those of such youth organizations as the Boy Scouts, which developed similar doctrines. The rules were a natural progression of Gene's philosophies going back to his first *Melody Ranch* programs - and early pictures.

GENE AUTRY'S COWBOY CODE

- 1. The Cowboy must never shoot first, hit a smaller man, or take unfair advantage.
- 2. He must never go back on his word, or a trust confided in him.
- 3. He must always tell the truth.
- 4. He must be gentle with children, the elderly, and animals.
- 5. He must not advocate or possess racially or religiously intolerant ideas.
- 6. He must help people in distress.
- 7. He must be a good worker.
- 8. He must keep himself clean in thought, speech, action, and personal habits.
- 9. He must respect women, parents, and his nation's laws.
- 10. The Cowboy is a patriot.



When he watches the video, or glances at the photo, it probably looks different than it would have had the personal milestone happened a year or so earlier.

For Mike Trout, he too sports a bit of a different look this season. Sure, he is putting up his typical MVP-like statistics but he is also doing something this season he has never done up until this 2018 campaign.

Both Trout, Hermosillo and several of their Angels teammates are putting, well, safety first.

Hermosillo sports a face-guard as part of his batting helmet. It is a bit of a new trend in the big leagues which most recently become en vogue by the likes of Jason Heyward in 2013 and Giancarlo Stanton in 2015 after his 2014 season came to an abrupt end when he was hit in the fact with a pitch. Hermosillo didn't even wear one in spring training.

Trout meanwhile wears the similar face-guard — a plastic extension that helps cover his face — on offense and when he is on base he adds a big red mitten that covers his entire left hand. While it sure isn't going to win any fashion awards it helps protect his fingers when he runs the bases (Trout, of course, last season went on the disabled list for the first time after suffering a torn ligament in his left thumb while sliding headfirst into second base).

In March, Trout made the decision to add to his head-wear after getting hit by a pitch in spring training. "I was thinking about it before," Trout told reporters then. "That sealed the deal."

Shohei Ohtani does not (yet) wear the face-guard but when the pitcher/designated hitter has a bat in his hands he sports protective padding on his right hand (his throwing hand), elbow (his throwing elbow) and ankle at the dish.

Catchers Martin Maldonado and Rene Rivera (both used to masks) have also decided to add a face-guard to their batting helmet as has teammate Jefry Marte.

The Stony Brook (NY) Department of Athletics this summer announced the Stony Brook Athletics Hall of Fame Class of 2018, which includes the Angels righthander.

Tropeano is another in a long line of Stony Brook baseball standouts who have gone on to play at the professional level. Following his junior season in 2011, he was selected in the fifth round of the 2011 MLB Amateur Draft by the Houston Astros and three years later became the third former Seawolf to reach the major leagues when he made his debut with the big league club. During his three-year career as a Seawolf, Tropeano earned 25 victories on the mound that was, at the time, tied for the school record, and posted a 2.85 career ERA, the program's All-time Division I record and fourth best overall. His 12 victories in 2011 topped the America East Conference and still stands as the single-season record along with fellow HOF inductee Tyler Johnson (12 in 2012). He struck out 275 batters, the fourth most in Stony Brook history.

The Class of '18 will be inducted on October 19 as part of the weekend's homecoming celebration. The Stony Brook Athletics Rita and Kurt Eppenstein Hall of Fame began in 1991.

Blake Parker was a hit at the University of Arkansas. Literally. A hit. Selected by the Chicago Cubs in the 16th round of the 2006 amateur draft, upon leaving The Natural State, the Fayetteville-born Parker started his pro career as a catcher. That after ending his college career as an infielder.

During his junior year with the Razorbacks, Parker played third base. As a junior he hit .246 with six home runs and 28 RBI. He added 10 stolen bases. As a sophomore he hit 10 homers.

The experiment with the bat however did not last very long. In his first pro season in the Cubs organization he hit .224 with two different teams. The next season, Parker was on the mound working on a new career.

In 198 career minor league games, Parker hit .226 with two home runs. He made his big league debut with the Cubs in 2012 and in parts of six seasons in the majors, Parker is still looking for that first big league at-bat and, thus, that first big league hit.

The Angels selected outfielder Jordyn Adams out of Green Hope High School (Cary, NC) as their first pick (1st round, 17th overall) in the 2018 First-Year Player Draft.

Adams, 18, hit .453 with five doubles, three triples, a home run and 15 RBI during his senior season at

Green Hope. During his junior season at Blythewood High School in South Carolina, he batted .494 with 18 RBI and one home run. He also stole 26 bases, including five in one game for a school record. Also among his highlight was his participation in the 2017 Under Armour All-America Game at Wrigley Field where he hit a walk-off single in the 11th inning. The 6-2, 175-pound outfielder is committed to play both baseball and football at the University of North Carolina.

2018

The North Carolina-born Adams is the second consecutive high school outfielder to be selected with the Angels' first overall pick. Last season, the Halos chose Jo Adell (Ballard High School in Louisville, KY) with the 10th overall pick. It also marked the Angels having selected a high school player with their first selection of the first round in consecutive seasons for the first time since Randal Grichuk was selected 24th overall in 2009, (followed by Mike Trout at 25th overall) and Kaleb Cowart was the 18th overall selection in 2010.

JORDYN ADAMS

The Angels have held the 17th overall selection in the draft on three previous occasions, with all three players reaching the Major Leagues within

three years of their selection: Dennis Rasmussen (1980 Draft), Eduardo Perez (1991 Draft) and C.J. Cron (2011 Draft).

The Angels then selected infielder Jeremiah Jackson (2nd round, 57th overall) from St. Luke's Episcopal School (Mobile, AL) to complete their selections on the first day of the 2018 First-Year Player Draft.

Jackson, 18, completed his senior year with a .644 batting average with 54 runs scored, nine doubles, four triples, 15 home runs and 49 RBI. Jackson has started at shortstop for St. Luke's Episcopal since he was a seventh-grader, helping the Wildcats win a pair of state championships. Additionally, in 12 appearances as a pitcher this season, he went 3-1 with a 2.55 ERA in 24.2 innings pitched) and 42 strikeouts. Jackson is the first Alabama high school middle infielder to be selected within the first three rounds since Bo Jackson was picked by the Yankees in 1982. He has a college commitment to Mississippi State University.

The Angels in 2018 chose high school players with both of their first two picks in a draft for the first time since 2010 when Cowart and Cam Bedrosian (29th overall) were selected.

On Day 2 of the 2018 First-Year Player Draft, the Halos drafted eight players — each a right-handed pitcher and four with North Carolina ties during rounds 3-10.

With their third round pick (93rd overall), the Angels selected righthander Aaron Hernandez from Texas A&M University, Corpus Christi. Standing at 6-foot-2 and weighing 170 pounds, he posted a 3-5 record with a 4.55 ERA, and struck out a career-high 102 batters in 83 innings this season to become the seventh hurler all-time in school history to reach the 100 strikeout mark.

The Halos' fourth round pick (121st overall) was right-hander Kyle Bradish, a junior from New Mexico State University. Bradish compiled a 25-8 record with 311 strikeouts while holding opponents to a .220 batting average over 272 innings during his three collegiate campaigns. He was named to the All-Western Athletic Conference First-Team as well as the All-WAC Tournament Team and NCAA Lubbock All-Regional Team.

With their fifth round pick, the Angels selected outfielder/righthander William English from Western International High School. English committed to play with the Tennessee Volunteers. Right-hander Austin Warren, a senior from UNC Wilmington, was selected as the Angels' sixth round pick. He enjoyed an 8-0 record with two saves, a 1.75 ERA and 60 strikeouts in 46.1 innings in his last collegiate campaign.

The Angels also selected their fourth NC native, right-hander reliever Andrew Wantz, as their seventh pick. Wantz went 23-8 with a 3.80 ERA with 278 strikeouts in his four seasons at UNC Greensboro, and he was named the Southern Conference Co-Pitcher of the Year and Collegiate Baseball National Pitcher of the Week in his sophomore campaign.

The Halos' chose another pitcher with their eighth round selection, Tyler Smith, from Canisius College in Buffalo. Smith finished his junior season with a 3-0 mark and a 0.30 ERA.

To round out the club's top 10 selections he Halos' ninth round pick and second selection from the state of Michigan — was Jake Lee, a senior at Oakland University. He finished his third campaign with the Golden Grizzlies tallying a 13.38 SO/9 and 112 strikeouts. Ben Morrison from Western Kentucky University with their 10th selection. Morrison led the team with 10.89 SO/9 and six saves and was named to the All-Academic Team during his sophomore campaign.

The Angels finished the three-day draft selecting 40 players, including 25 from college and 14 from high school. They drafted 29 pitchers, 10 position players and one two-way player. The Halos selected 22 players from the southern region of the nation, including six from the Carolinas. Four draftees have Southern California ties.

As of mid-June, 23 players had agreed to contract terms with the Angels.

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

The most accomplished active home run hitter in baseball, Pujols started the 2018 campaign seventh all-time with 614 homers. Adrian Beltre and Miguel Cabrera, for the sake of comparison among today's sluggers, both had 462 home runs as of Opening Day.

In addition to No. 600 one season ago, Pujols passed Jim Thome and Sammy Sosa (the homer to surpass Sosa also saw Pujols become the most decorated home run hitter ever born outside the United States). With his first 16 home runs this season, Pujols tied Ken Griffey, Jr. (he officially tied Griffey on July 12 when he hit two homers at home against Seattle).

Willie Mays sits fifth all-time with 660 homers.

Pujols also this season moved into baseball's top-10 list in doubles. Pujols is the only hitter in baseball history to rank in the top-10 in home runs and doubles.

Albert Pujols entered the record books here in 2018. Sound familiar?

As the hits keep coming, Pujols continues to climb that all-time list of immortal hitters. His 3,000th career hit earlier this season did more than make the highlights and add to his Hall of Fame resume. It also tied him with Roberto Clemente....and the trend has continued during these warm summer months. Al Kaline (3,007). Wade Boggs (3,010). Cap Anson (3,011). Rafael Palmeiro (3,020). Lou Brock (3,023). Interestingly enough the man who now holds the 26th spot is none other than Rod Carew, the only other player to record his 3,000th hit as an Angel.

Carew ended his brilliant career with 3,053 hits. Pujols' three hits on June 12 gave him 3,055 for his career, passing Carew and tying Rickey Henderson for 25th all-time. And the march continues: Craig Biggio (3,060). And so on. And so on.



There are a lot of monikers for the term RBI/runs batted in. Ribby or ribeye are among the most popular.

Albert Pujols is baseball's active leader in steaks. He began this season ninth all-time and he has surpassed Jimmie Foxx, Ty Cobb and Stan Musial to date. Next up? Lou Gehrig (1995 RBIs) and then Barry Bonds (1996 RBIs).

Pujols entered the 2018 campaign with 1918 runs batted in. When he drives in his 2000th career run, he will be fifth all-time. In his first 10 seasons he averaged 123 RBI. The last two seasons have seen Pujols average 110 steaks. Pujols with the Angels has eclipsed the 100-RBI plateau on four different occasions.

Hank Aaron is baseball all-time leader with 2297 RBI over his 23 seasons. This is Pujols' 18th season.



Heaney is going Andrew to remember turning 27 years old. After all, the lefty threw one of the best

games - if not the best game - of his career, tossing his first career complete game and shutout in a 1-0 win at home against the Royals.

"It is amazing," Heaney told Fox Sports West's Alex Curry right after the game before a bucket of Powerade was dumped on him by his teammates. "I was glad we got the win and it was a lot of fun. We had a good game plan going into this game."

It marked the first shutout by an Angel since Ricky Nolasco (July 1, 2017 vs. Seattle) and first complete game one-hitter for the team since Ervin Santana (June 16, 2012 vs. Arizona).

The standout performance also marked the first one-hit shutout by an Angels southpaw since Chuck Finley in 1989 and Heaney became the first player in the big leagues to throw a one-hit shutout on his birthday since Vicente Palacios of the Cardinals in 1994.

The last Angels hurler to throw a shutout on his birthday? You would have to go all the way back to Andy Messersmith and August 6, 1971 vs. Minnesota.

Heaney recorded 13 groundouts, 10 flyouts and four strikeouts. He threw 116 pitches and teammates and coaches, needless to say, were impressed.
