





# MLB DRAFT/ANGELS ANDRAFT ROUNDI PICK 10 PITCHER UNIVERSITY OF LOUIS VILLE REID DETIMERS

The Angels selected LHP Reid Detmers out of the University of Louisville as their first pick (1st round, 10th overall) in the 2020 First-Year Player Draft. The announcement was made by Angels Director, Scouting Matt Swanson.

Detmers, 20, finished his abbreviated junior season at the University of Louisville going 3-0 with a 1.23 ERA (22 IP – 3 ER) while leading the ACC with 48 strikeouts across his four starts. The left-hander struck out 10+ batters in three of his four outings, including a 15-strikeout performance in his final start of the season at Wake Forest.

"I think at the end of the day, we looked at it as (Reid) was exactly the type of player we wanted to bring into the system," said Swanson.

Upon the selection being announced on MLB Network, several on-air analysts immediately applauded the selection.

"I love this pick...he wins, he has been there for three years at Louisville – two years and this (abbreviated) year – and he is 20-6 in 30 games started. Somewhere you reward that," said Al Leiter, a former left-handed pitcher himself.

Leiter loves Detmers' fastball command and how he uses his fastball (which Leiter admits is not overpowering) to get to his off-speed pitch. Leiter also said that Detmers' curveball is one that helps set him apart.

"This is a great pick by Billy Eppler and the Angels. I love how he competes. He has guts and he gets after it and he wins...Reid Detmers can be in the big leagues next year."

Fellow analyst Harold Reynolds, who briefly played for the Angels during his successful career, pointed to Louisville's recent track record in developing big league players. He also compared Detmers to Dallas Keuchel.

Detmers was at MLB Network Headquarters in New Jersey for the show, sporting a bright red Louisville golf shirt. He immediately hugged his parents when the announcement was made.



It won't be long before Detmers, who was the No. 8 ranked prospect on MLB.com, wears Angel Red.

"I'm just going to follow their guidelines," said the young southpaw. "I'm going to do whatever they tell me to do and hopefully I can get that call soon. But if not, I'm still going to do everything to the best of my ability."

Detmers is the first pitcher the Halos have taken in the first round since Sean Newcomb in 2014 (15th overall). The Angels have held the 10th overall selection in the June draft on five previous occasions. The Club's most recent 10th overall selection, OF Jo Adell (2017 Draft), is currently rated by *Baseball America* as the top prospect in the organization.

#### **MEET REID DETMERS**



**2020:** Took the ball four times for the Cardinals before the season was halted, going 3-0 with a 1.23 ERA and 48 strikeouts in 22 innings... Moved into fourth on UofL's career strikeout list with 284 and tied for ninth with 20 wins... Struck out nine, including seven in a row, while picking up a win in his first start at Ole Miss on Feb. 14... Tossed six shutout innings with 14

strikeouts in a win over Valparaiso... Struck out 10 in five innings against Western Michigan... Tallied 15 strikeouts over six scoreless innings in a win over Wake Forest.

USA Baseball: Pitched for USA Collegiate National Team in 2019 summer... Arguably the top pitcher for Team USA, going 2-0 in three starts with just one run allowed in 12 innings... Picked up wins over Chinese Taipei and Japan, allowing one hit in each start and holding both teams scoreless.

**2019:** Made 19 appearances on the mound, starting 18 games. Went 13-4 with a 2.78 ERA in 113.1 innings. Set Louisville's singleseason strikeout record with 167 and tied the program record for wins. Allowed just one run in seven innings for the victory over East Carolina in the opening game of the Super Regional on June 7. Set the Louisville single-season strikeout record in the second inning against Illinois State on June 1. Tossed six shutout innings with 11 strikeouts in a win over Florida State on May 16. Won his 10th game at Virginia on May 10, becoming the 13th player in program history to reach double digit wins. Allowed just one hit in seven shutout innings for the win at Notre Dame on May 3. Retired 15 of the 16 batters he faced, 12 via strikeout, in a win over Alabama A&M on April 26. Struck out 10 for the fifth time in seven starts with the win over Wake Forest on March 29. Set a Jim Patterson Stadium record with 16 strikeouts against Georgia Tech on March 24. Allowed just one run over six innings at Duke on March 17 for fourth win. Worked third straight scoreless start with 7.2 innings of shutout ball against Boston College on March 8. ACC Pitcher of the Week after taking a no-hitter into the eighth before allowing a hit against James Madison on March 2, while setting a career high with 14 strikeouts in eight innings. ACC Pitcher of the Week after tossing seven hitless innings with a career-high 11 strikeouts against Brown on Feb. 22. Made the opening day start for the Cardinals against UConn on Feb. 15. Allowed just one run on four hits over five innings.

**2018:** Completed first collegiate season with 4-2 record, 4.85 ERA and 69 strikeouts in 18 appearances, including eight starts, and 55.2 innings pitched... Moved to 4-1 on the season after allowing just one run on four hits with five strikeouts in 5.2 innings against

Wake Forest in May 23 ACC Championship opener... Registered nodecision after pitching career-long 6.1 innings with just one run and five strikeouts on May 15 against No. 19 Indiana... Had career-high 10 strikeouts in six innings against Wright State on May 8... Won second straight start allowing just one run on four hits with five strikeouts in career best 5.1 innings at No. 15 Vanderbilt on May 1... Earned second win of the season while matching career long outing with 4.2 innings and only one run on three hits against No.6 Kentucky on April 17... Had five strikeouts in 3.0 scoreless innings of relief against No. 5 Florida State on March 30... Matched a career-high with seven strikeouts in 3.0 scoreless innings of relief to earn first collegiate win on March 4 against Western Carolina... Did not earn a decision in first career start after allowing two runs on four hits with four strikeouts in 4.2 innings... Registered seven strikeouts and allowed just one run on one hit in 3.0 innings of relief in collegiate debut on Feb. 18 against George Mason.

**High School:** Drafted in the 32nd round of the 2017 MLB Draft by the Atlanta Braves... Played final prep season at Chatham Glenwood High School... Attended and played at Nokomis High School for three years... Ranked No. 190 in the nation in the class of 2017 by Perfect Game, including the No. 21 lefty pitcher and the No. 3 player in the state of Illinois... Named to the All-Conference team all four years... Named to the All-State First Team... Made the 40-man Team USA roster... Finished senior season with a 9-2 record, 1.87 ERA and 153 strikeouts... Accumulated 27-5 prep record in four seasons... Totaled 110 strikeouts as a junior, 105 strikeouts as a sophomore and 90 strikeouts during freshman season for Nokomis.

**Personal:** Born Reid Kristien Detmers on July 8, 1999 in Springfield, Illinois... Parents are Kris and Erica Detmers... Has two siblings - Drew and Parker... Majoring in sport administration... Signed with Louisville after seriously considering Vanderbilt, Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana and Missouri... Person with greatest influence on athletic career is his dad who has always been by his side and pushes him to get better... Favorite movies are The Sandlot and Major League... Favorite TV shows are How I Met Your Mother, The 100, and Prison Break... Favorite cereal is Cinnamon Toast Crunch... Favorite candy bar is Snickers... Grandpa played college football... Dad played professional baseball at the Triple-A level for the St. Louis Cardinals organization.





The Angels concluded the 2020 First-Year Player Draft selecting OF David Calabrese (3rd round, 82nd overall), SS Werner Blakely (4th round, 111th overall) and LHP Adam Seminaris (5th round, 141st overall).

"It was all hands-on deck to pull this off and have a successful draft," said Swanson. "I think we look already back on this and are really thrilled with the four picks we were able to make."

Calabrese (cal-uh-bree-SEE), 17, was selected out of St. Elizabeth Catholic High School in Thornhill, Ontario, Canada. The fleet-footed outfielder was the top ranked Canadian prospect by Baseball America and participated in the Future Stars Series last fall at Fenway Park, hitting a stand-up, inside-the-park home run. He is currently a University of Arkansas commit.

Blakely, 18, saw his senior season at Detroit Edison Academy cancelled in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic but he hit .467 with 10 doubles, six triples, four home runs, 34 RBI, 44 runs and 24

stolen bases during his junior campaign (2019). The Auburn commit finished his prep career with 163 hits, 26 doubles, 19 triples and 103 RBI. Last summer, Blakely became the first player from Detroit to take part in the Under-Armour All-America game at Wrigley Field, starting the game at shortstop.


To round out their 2020 draft class, the Angels selected LHP Adam Seminaris from Cal State University, Long Beach in the fifth round. The junior pitcher from Chino Hills (20 miles east of Angel Stadium) appeared in four games (three starts) in 2020 going 1-0 along with a 1.23 ERA (22 IP – 3 ER) and paced the Big West with a 14.7 SO/9 (22 IP – 36 SO). Over his final two outings of the season, he tossed at least seven innings and combined for 24 strikeouts and three walks.

The Angels lost their second-round pick upon signing Anthony Rendon as a free agent.

- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. VASCEPA can pass into your milk, and may harm your baby. Talk to your doctor about the best way to feed your baby if you take VASCEPA.

**Tell your doctor about all the medicines you take,** including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and dietary or herbal supplements.

VASCEPA can interact with certain other medicines that you are taking.

Especially tell your doctor if you take medicines that affect your blood clotting (anticoagulants or blood thinners).

#### **How should I take VASCEPA?**

- Take VASCEPA exactly as your doctor tells you to take it.
- Do not change your dose or stop taking VASCEPA without talking to your doctor.
- Do not take more capsules than what is prescribed by your doctor.
  - If you are prescribed the 0.5-gram capsules, you should not take more than 8 capsules each day.
  - If you are prescribed the 1-gram capsules, you should not take more than 4 capsules per day.
- Take VASCEPA capsules whole. Do not break, crush, dissolve, or chew VASCEPA capsules before swallowing.
- If you miss a dose of VASCEPA, take it as soon as you remember.
   However, if you miss one day of VASCEPA, do not double your dose when you take it.
- Your doctor may start you on a diet that is low in saturated fat, cholesterol, carbohydrates, and low in added sugars before giving you VASCEPA. Stay on this diet while taking VASCEPA.

#### What are the possible side effects of VASCEPA?

VASCEPA may cause serious side effects, including:

- Heart rhythm problems (atrial fibrillation and atrial flutter). Heart
  rhythm problems which can be serious and cause hospitalization
  have happened in people who take VASCEPA, especially in people
  who have heart (cardiovascular) disease or diabetes with a risk
  factor for heart (cardiovascular) disease, or who have had heart
  rhythm problems in the past. Tell your doctor if you get any
  symptoms of heart rhythm problems such as feeling as if your
  heart is beating fast and irregular, lightheadedness, dizziness,
  shortness of breath, chest discomfort, or you faint.
- Possible allergic reactions if you are allergic to fish or shellfish.
   Stop taking VASCEPA and tell your doctor right away or get emergency medical help if you have any signs or symptoms of an allergic reaction.
- Bleeding. Serious bleeding can happen in people who take VASCEPA. Your risk of bleeding may increase if you are also taking a blood thinner medicine.

If you have liver problems and are taking VASCEPA, your doctor should do blood tests during treatment.

#### **How should I store VASCEPA?**

- Store VASCEPA at room temperature between 68° to 77° F (20° to 25° C).
- Safely throw away medicine that is out of date or no longer needed.

#### **Keep VASCEPA** and all medicine out of the reach of children.



DRAFT & DEBUT

Each June, the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft serves as a major crossroad in the lives of hundreds of high school and collegiate baseball players around the country. Being drafted is a major milestone and accomplishment after a lifelong childhood baseball journey including countless hours of practices and games from T-ball through the highest levels of amateur competition. The draft also signifies the beginning of a new professional baseball journey that will start in the lowest levels of the minor leagues in small towns around the nation. A select amount of those players will reach the ultimate baseball goal and play in the Major Leagues.

Outfielder Jo Adell, who turned 21 in April, is ranked by Baseball America as the top prospect in the Angels organization and is the third-highest rated prospect in all of baseball, according to the publication. Many media outlets have projected him to make his Major League debut during the 2020 season.

Adell was originally selected by the Angels in first round (10th overall) in the 2017 First-Year Player Draft out of Ballard High School in Louisville, Kentucky. His selection marked the first time the Angels selected an outfielder with their first pick in a draft since 2009 when the club used the first of their back-to-back first round









picks on Randal Grichuk (24th overall), who currently patrols the outfield for the Toronto Blue Jays.

The Angels second of those back-to-back first round picks in the 2009 draft was used on a high school outfielder from New Jersey named Mike Trout.

Adell and his family attended the MLB Network studios in Secaucus, New Jersey when Commissioner Rob Manfred called his name in the 2017 draft.

"For me it was a no brainer," Adell said about attending the draft. "I wanted to be there. I wanted the experience and wanted my family to be a part of it. Once you get in the draft room, you start wondering where I am going to go and what situation I'll be in. But when the time came around and the Angels picked me at 10, it was such a sigh of relief and I was just thrilled. All the uncertainty went away and I was just really excited to be a part of the organization."

As a child in Louisville, Jo grew up around a very athletic family. His father, Scott, played football at North Carolina State University and was selected by the New Orleans Saints in the 12th round of the 1992 NFL Draft. His older sister, Jessica – who Jo considers the best athlete in the family – was one of the nation's top softball players in high school and would go to play at the University of Tennessee and University of Louisville. She also competed on the track and field team at Louisville as a javelin thrower.

At Ballard High School, Adell was named the Gatorade Kentucky Baseball Player of the Year in 2017 after batting .562 with 25 home runs, 61 RBI, 22 stolen bases and 53 runs scored in his senior season. The 25 home runs led the nation and were four shy of the all-time Kentucky High School record in addition to being the highest single-season total in the state since the induction of BBCOR bats in

2012. His senior season was filled with meetings with Major League scouts and college coaches (he had committed to the University of Louisville before signing with the Angels).

During his senior season, Adell participated in several pre-draft workouts, showcases and games with other top projected picks from his draft class, including a very memorable pre-draft workout at Angel Stadium.

"My plane landed in LA a little bit late and that's not a great first impression when you're running late to your pre-draft workout. I got out of the taxi and realized I forgot baseball pants. I looked out at the field and since I was late, guys were already out there stretching in uniform and I come in with a pair of shorts on and a dri-fit shirt. I thought this can't be good! But I got out there, met some of the guys and talked with (Angels General Manager) Billy Eppler. And then I looked up at someone in the stands and it was Trout, who was injured at the time and was there watching the players. I'm like, wow, I show up late, in shorts, and Mike Trout's here watching me work out. This is not going to go well. But I had a good workout and you flash forward to the draft and the Angels still picked me!"

Following his draft selection, the Adell family made the trip to Anaheim to sign his contract, tour Angel Stadium, meet some of the Angels players and check out the Angels game against the Kansas City Royals that night. He was also interviewed during the game on Fox Sports West and KLAA AM830.

"That was a welcoming party for sure. It was awesome. I thought I was going to go in and meet a couple people and just watch the game. But then I got put on the jumbotron and my name was announced, I just felt the warmth of the people in the stadium and was really glad I was going to be part of the Angels system."

Adell's minor league journey began when he made his professional debut with the Angels affiliate in the Rookie-level Arizona Summer League. After playing in 31 games for the AZL Angels, he would be promoted to Rookie-level Orem and help lead the Owlz to a South Division Championship an appearance in the Pioneer League playoffs.

"It was a blast to play your first pro season and be able to go from the AZL into that competitive atmosphere with Orem. We had guys like Torii Hunter Jr. and Brandon Marsh and that energy from my teammates and the fans helped me to just relax and play and not be afraid to make mistakes. It was a great way to end the year and that team camaraderie was just unbelievable."

In 2018, Adell started the year with the Burlington Bees in the Midwest League where he was hitting .326 (31/95) when he was called up to Adv.-A Inland Empire in the California League where he would appear in 57 games for the 66ers. He would spend the final month of the year with Double-A Mobile. At just 19 years of age, he was five years younger than the average player in the Southern League.

"When I got to Double-A, it was different. It was tough and I struggled. Having pro-level coaching and being able to collaborate about making adjustments really helped me to make the jumps that I did. Having the mix between good coaching and my own ability to figure things out on the fly really helped me to move through those three levels that year."

After missing the first two months of the 2019 season with a strained left hamstring and sprained right ankle (both suffered during one play in Spring Training), Adell would make stops at the Angels top three affiliates

during the season. He started his year with six games at Inland Empire, followed by two months in Mobile before playing the final month of the season with Triple-A Salt Lake.

The outfielder has been honored by MiLB.com as an Organizational All-Star following each of his three minor league campaigns and he has also represented the Angels in the annual All-Star Futures Game in each of the last two seasons. In the 2018 game at Nationals Park in Washington D.C., Adell went 1-for-4 with a double, one run scored and an RBI.

"My first futures game in D.C., we had Torii Hunter as a coach and Pete Alonso batting in the three-hole. This wasn't a normal All-Star or All-American game that I had been a part of in the past. There were some great players and we wanted to win. It was a great experience."

In the 2019 game at Progressive Field in Cleveland, he led all players reaching base three times (single and two walks) and made a diving catch in the eighth inning to keep the score tied.

Following the 2019 regular season, Adell competed in the Arizona Fall League and had the honors of representing Team USA in Olympic qualifying tournaments in Mexico and Japan.

"Playing in the Tokyo Dome was an electric experience. The fans are cheering the whole game and all the selfishness that you can have on the baseball field was put aside. We are going in there to win as a team and everyone was locked in. The experience was unreal and that time in Tokyo was one of the better baseball experiences that I've ever had."


Entering the 2020 season, Adell is considered by many to be on the doorstep of making his Major League debut. He has attended Major League Spring Training camp in both 2019 and 2020 where he would go through daily practices with members of the Angels 40-man roster including several MLB All-Stars such as Justin Upton and Anthony Rendon as well as three-time MVP winners Mike Trout and Albert Pujols.

"The past two big league camps have been a great eye-opening experience. You look around and see the guys that are part of this team and see how much they know and what their routines are. The thing that separates guys like Trout, Pujols and Rendon are how they go about their work and they are consistent. It makes you want to do the same. That's what I want to do and I want to be the guy that puts it all on the line and is part of a great team."

Although he is just 21 years old, Adell has already started his own foundation, the Jo Adell Foundation, which promotes education, workforce skills, sports, leadership, and health and wellness in the Louisville area. Some of the recent foundation initiatives have included baseball camps, academic challenges, providing haircuts to students who can't afford to get one and an annual Thanksgiving Dinner event which distributes over 500 Thanksgiving dinners to Louisville area families in need.

Already a local role model, Jo and his sister Jessica filmed a public service announcement in April on the importance of social distancing that was posted on social media by Kentucky Governor Andy Beshear. The video featured ways to stay active and communicate digitally with friends and family while staying safe at home.

The ultimate baseball goal of playing the Major Leagues is on the horizon for Adell. His journey on and off the field from youth baseball to the draft and through the minors could serve as a blueprint for future generations of prospects on "The Road to the Show." The 2020 First-Year Player Draft takes place June 10-11 and although this year's draft will be just five rounds long, 160 players will have their names called and begin their journey in professional baseball.







JO ADELL - His athleticism, power, tools, and skills speak for themselves and everyone sees those. What has always impressed us - starting with when we met with him as an amateur high schooler -

**JEREMIAH JACKSON** - Exciting player to watch and be around. Shortstops with big-time power in their bat at such a young age are pretty rare. The power is very impressive considering he still hasn't hit his peak in terms of strength gains.

was his aptitude, character, and competitiveness.

**BRANDON MARSH** - Very disciplined approach at the plate - he knows what the strike zone is and won't leave it. He put a lot of work into his swing at the end of the 2019 season and had a strong finish to the Double-A season and showing in the Arizona Fall League. Very aggressive on defense and covers a lot of ground out there. He goes all out to catch any ball hit in his area.

**KYREN PARIS** - Kyren was the youngest player in the 2019 draft and someone we were excited to be there with our second pick. He's an impressive person and player, which is a credit to his family and upbringing. He's made a commitment to getting stronger and faster over the last year and showed up this year much stronger. His swing is very sound mechanically and we are excited to see how he develops moving forward.

**CHRIS RODRIGUEZ** - We're hopeful the injury that sidelined him is in his past. Well above average stuff and command of it. We know he has the stuff to pitch at the highest level, it's just a matter of him getting some innings. Very competitive on the mound.

**PATRICK SANDOVAL** - Got some Major League experience at the end of 2019 and he showed the ability to miss bats. His changeup is a special pitch - hitters don't make contact with it often. His velocity has ticked up over the last couple years and he's developed a consistency for his breaking ball as well. Was raised in the area and I know he's excited to hopefully pitch in front of family and friends.

**JOSE SORIANO** - Recovering from Tommy John surgery. He's big, physical, throws hard, and has an above average breaking ball that's hard to hit.

**AROL VERA** - Just getting started on his development path after we signed him last year. Hasn't even played in an official game yet. Exciting switch hitting shortstop with bat speed that can impact the game on offense and defense.

**HECTOR YAN** - Hector has a lot of deception in his delivery. It doesn't look like the hitters have much fun facing him. He's gotten stronger over the last couple of years and his velocity has also increased. Hitters really struggle against his fastball, which is pretty rare. He had a very impressive year as a 20-year old in the Midwest League.

#### **KEYNAN'S OREGON TRAIL TO THE ANGELS**

EVERY MLB DRAFT PICK HAS THEIR PATH TO PRO BALL;
KEYNAN MIDDLETON IS A PROUD NATIVE OF THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST



BORN: Portland, Oregon

**HIGH SCHOOL:** Milwaukie High School in Milwaukie, Oregon **COLLEGE:** Lane Community College in Eugene, Oregon

It is not necessarily hard to find Major Leaguers from The Beaver State. But it isn't easy either.

Last year Oregon natives such as Seth Brown (Athletics), Adam Cimber (Indians), Brandon Drury and Sam Gaviglio (Blue Jays), Jace Fry (White Sox), DJ Johnson (Rockies), Rocky Gale and Zac Rosscup (Dodgers), and Andrew Moore (Mariners) continued to get their feet wet at the game's highest level.

And more established big leagues like Nick Hundley, Jed Lowrie and Jimmy Nelson continued their successful careers, which is 30 years combined.

In 2017, Keynan Middleton joined the ranks. Hailing from the Pacific Northwest, the hard-throwing right-hander – who was born in Portland – has enjoyed both success and a brutal injury.

At Milwaukie High School, Middleton was a two-sport star: Baseball and basketball (he also played football). In college, it was more of the same before the Angels selected him in the third-round of the 2013 draft. He signed quickly thereafter and began his pro baseball in career, which was temporarily derailed two years ago after he underwent Tommy John surgery to repair a torn ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow.

It was a major blow to a blossoming career. As a rookie in 2017, Middleton appeared in his first 64 games. He posted a 3.86 ERA and a 6-1 record. He also recorded three saves.

In 2018, Middleton was fulfilling a key bullpen role. He pitched to a 2.04 ERA over the first 17.2 innings of that sophomore campaign. He also was not allowing the home run ball, something that hurt him as a rookie, and he was gaining more trust in the late innings with six saves and nine games finished.

He returned last year and posted a 1.17 ERA over 11 games pitched after spending 15 months rehabbing the injury.

Proud of the successful comeback and proud of his Oregon roots, Angel Magazine looks back at Middleton's time as a Milwaukie High School Mustang and a Lane Community College Titan...his Oregon Trail to the Angels.

#### **KEYNAN MIDDLETON**

**Q:** At Lane Community College, how polished or unpolished were you on the mound?

**A:** Very unpolished. I was basically lifting my leg and throwing.

**Q:** At what point did you realize you needed to drop one of the two sports and how tough a decision was that?

**A:** When the Angels took a huge risk in drafting me in the 3rd round. Hard to argue with that.

#### THE COACHES

Josh Blunt is the baseball head coach at Lane Community College. In his second season on the job, Middleton was on the team, mostly pitching in relief.

**Q:** Keynan played at Lane in 2013. What were your initial impressions of him as a pitcher?

**A:** I first saw Keynan around December of his senior year (in high school) as he came over for a workout and visit. His arm was electric and he had a very large body that could develop. His breaking ball was so sharp I remember our catcher having a difficult time receiving it.

**Q:** As a 19 year old pitcher, what was his greatest asset?

**A:** I think his athleticism was the most impressive characteristic as he was kind of an unknown baseball player early on. He was a two-sport college athlete as he was also a 1st team All-League basketball player. He could do some things on the field that nobody else could even dream of. I recall him fielding a safety squeeze near the first-base line. He slid in feet first and popped up to then throw a side angle to home. He didn't get the call but truthfully I thought the umpire called him safe because he had already shifted his eyes and body to first anticipating that there was zero chance of a play at the plate.

**Q:** Over 42 innings pitched he did not allow a home run. Is that a fluke-type stat?

**A:** Not surprising. His fastball is a two-plane ball That is really firm and his breaking ball at times is a plus, plus pitch to get guys out.

**Q:** Baseball requires a great deal of mental strength. How mature was he at that point in his career?

**A:** I would say that's probably the area he has developed the most. While at Lane most of his attention and passion was towards playing hoops. He happened to have a big league arm and a great athlete.

**Q:** Selected by the Angels in the third round of that summer's MLB first-year player draft, how much awareness did you have that Keynan was being watched so closely?


**A:** There were a lot of scouts to see him later in the year. At one point I recall counting 26 guys there. He was a little inconsistent at that stage of his career as one week he would throw seven innings with one run and two hits. While the next week he would throw four innings with seven, eight walks. He was still learning what his out pitches were and how to control his body more consistently to throw more strikes. I believe that year he was the first player drafted in the state of Oregon.

Greg Sheley was one of the basketball coaches at Lane.

**Q:** How much do you describe Keynan's skills as a two-sport athlete? **A:** I was fortunate to see Keynan play basketball many times during his time at Lane. He was very athletic. He could get to the rim and also shoot it from deep. He was a tough match up for opponents. I only saw him pitch a couple times during the baseball season as there was lots of rain the spring he played at Lane. I remember his raw talent on the mound and lots of scouts in the stands each time he pitched. His arm was live and intimidating.

#### **KEYNAN MIDDLETON**

Q: You could swing the bat in high school too, right?

**A:** People were more scared of me in the box than on the mound.

#### **SENIOR YEAR (HIGH SCHOOL) BASEBALL STATS:**

At the Plate: Keynan was a real offensive force: .532, 7 HR, 22 RBI, 28 Runs Scored, 28 SB (0 CS).

On the Mound: Keynan's lone loss was in the playoffs versus Andrew Moore who is now with the Reds: 6-1, 55 IP, 73 Ks.

#### THE COACHES

Daniel Lee was the head baseball coach at Milwaukie High School. He has a lot of memories from Keynan's time in high school:

**Q:** At your high school program, what were your initial impressions of Keynan as a pitcher/player?

**A:** The first time I saw Keynan pitch, he was actually pitching against us – he went to a rival high school his freshman year. We had gotten out to a pretty big lead in the first two, three innings, and Keynan came in the game in relief. He absolutely stacked our bats for the rest of the game. I didn't know who he was, but many of my players did, and when they told me he was a freshman, my initial impression was, 'Oh wow, three more years of this?' Thankfully he transferred to Milwaukie for his sophomore year.

**Q:** On the mound, what did you think was his greatest attribute?

**A:** You would never have guessed it by talking to him off the field, but he was so competitive on the mound. He never believed he should give up hit, a walk, a ball, anything. He obviously was phenomenally talented, but when he mixed that talent with a bulldog attitude on the mound it was pretty much unstoppable at the high school level.

**Q:** He was also a pretty good basketball player at that age. Do you have recollections of him on the basketball court too?

**A:** Well, for one, go to YouTube and type in 'keynan middleton block.' He was a great basketball player. In the state title, he was shooting the ball from SO far beyond the three-point line. It was very much like baseball, he just was beyond what virtually any other high school player could do. He was also a phenomenal football player. He didn't get quite as much notice as a football player, because our program was struggling a little then, but he really could have played any of the three in college.







**Q:** He has a pretty big personality. Has he always been so outgoing? **A:** YES! Keynan has always had a big smile, contagious laugh and something funny to say. Not so say he was never a sullen teenager, but it was very rare and very brief. He was always the life of the dugout and had a way -- I'm not even sure he was doing it on purpose -- of making his teammates confident and relaxed. He also had no hesitation making sure our opponents knew who the best player on the field was!

Kyle Bracy had the pleasure of being Keynan's high school basketball coach.

**Q:** What is your recollection of Keynan's time in high school?

A: He had such a tremendous impact on our program, school and community. I remember watching him play as a 6th grader and thinking 'wow' this kid is going to be special. He's a talent we don't see that often in our area. When he finally got to high school it didn't take long for him to have an immediate impact on our program. He helped lead us to two consecutive league titles in his junior and senior years. His senior year he led us to our first state championship game since 1954. That year he averaged 19 points per game and was first team all NWOC and 1st team all-tournament. He helped change the culture of our program not just with his talent but with his drive to win. Keynan hated losing more than anyone and he believed that we could compete with anyone. I think that is what makes him such a successful athlete - his drive to win and his competitive nature. Keynan was a quiet leader who led by example and was a great teammate. If we had a Mt. Rushmore of athletes at MHS Keynan would be on it. Everyone in our area knows what a great baseball player Keynan is but I'm not sure everyone knows how great of a basketball player he is. I honestly believe that if he committed to basketball that he could've played professionally at some level. The Angels landed a top-notch player and person in Keynan Middleton.

#### **KEYNAN MIDDLETON**

**Q:** Were you a better basketball player or baseball player growing up? **A:** Basketball for sure. Nobody came and watched me play baseball. We PACKED the gym for basketball and went to the state championship.

#### **RENDON AT RICE**

**ANTHONY RENDON** enjoyed a tremendous career at Rice University, where he garnered just about every award there is in college baseball and a lot of attention in his hometown of Houston.

Even Arte Moreno had Rendon on his radar as an amateur athlete.

"The AD called me and said, 'I got a player here that you need to see play," said Moreno.

Rendon also made a tremendous all-around impact on the Rice campus. Two former colleagues remember Rendon very well, including the type of person he is.

Wayne Graham was Rendon's coach at Rice. The winner of 1,173 games during his years as head coach at the program from 1992-18, the legendary Graham, now 84 years old, managed the Owls to a College World Series Championship in 2003.

Graham himself briefly played in the big leagues. Ironically both stints were under legendary managers. In 1963 he played in 10 games with the Phillies under Gene Mauch. The next year he played in 20 games for the Mets under Casey Stengel. Stengel is 12th on baseball all-time wins list with 1,905 wins and Mauch is next with 1,902 wins.



John Sullivan is in his 14th year at Rice as an assistant communications director where he is the primary media contact for Rice baseball.


Sullivan: This a funny exchange I witnessed. It was the Fall semester after he had just been named the NCAA College Player of the Year the previous spring - effectively winning the college baseball equivalent of the Heisman Trophy. A lot of the studentathletes take a Sport Management Class, and one of the class requirements is to be on the game-day staff at a home event handing out schedule cards, t-shirts, etc. I saw him handing out the schedule cards and came up and said hello. Immediately right behind me was the secretary who worked in the Women's Basketball Office but whose nephew was a pitcher on the team. I said to Anthony, 'Hey have you met Mrs. Santos, she works in the women's basketball office and her nephew is Abe Gonzales?' And Anthony said - and this is very much him - 'Oh hey, nice to meet you. I'm Anthony. I'm on the team too.' Mrs. Santos stood there (and with a classic YEAH I KNOW look on her face because he's a campus celebrity as Player of the Year) and delivered the stoic line of all time: 'Well... we'll have to look for you next time.'

Rodgers and Fregosi are two of five managers all-time who also played for the Angels. Del Rice was the club's third skipper and managed the team for one season (1972) after playing for the team for one season, the inaugural 1961 season, which was also Rice's 17th and final big league campaign.

In 1988, Moose Stubing managed the Angels for eight games (all losses) on an interim basis. His big league playing career was also brief - five games with the Angels in 1967.

Bobby Knoop's career with the Angels is one of the most celebrated in Halos history. He played in more than 800 games for the team and was a coach from 1979-96. He was inducted into the Angels Hall of Fame in 2013. Among his career highlights: A trip to the 1966 All-Star Game; four club MVP awards; and three Gold Gloves at second base. In 1994, he went 1-1 as Angels interim manager.






## **ARTE & CAROLE MORENO**

#### **OWNERSHIP**

In May of 2003, Arte and Carole Moreno were introduced as the third owners in Angels' franchise history and their impact was immediate. The Morenos have guided the franchise to six A.L. West Division titles and 17 consecutive seasons drawing over three million fans, resulting in a total home attendance of over 52 million fans. In July of 2018, Arte received the



The Moreno's focus is balanced between baseball, business operations, and fan experience. In 2009, the Halos were voted the top franchise in professional sports in "Fan Value and Experience" in a fan poll by ESPN the Magazine. In the poll, the Angels ranked in the top three among Major League teams for 10 consecutive seasons (2003-2012).

During their tenure, Arte and Carole's support of the baseball operations department has resulted in the acquisition of many key players, including three-time N.L. MVP Albert Pujols, perennial MVP candidate Anthony Rendon, nine-time Gold Glover Torii Hunter, 2009 World Series MVP Hideki Matsui, 2005 A.L. Cy Young Award winner Bartolo Colon, newly-elected Hall of Famer Vladimir Guerrero, four-time Gold Glove winner Andrelton Simmons and several others. In 2019, the Morenos signed three-time A.L. MVP Mike Trout to a record setting 12-year contract extension effectively keeping the eight-time All-Star a member of the Halos for the remainder of his historic career. Additionally, in December of 2017, the Morenos oversaw the successful recruitment of two-way player Shohei Ohtani, the offseason's most highly sought-after free agent.

Since purchasing the Club on May 22, 2003, the Angels have logged a 1444-1266 record (.533 winning pct.) while boasting a Top 10 payroll in 15 of their 18 seasons, including six campaigns in the Top 5. During the family's tenure, the organization has continued to cultivate players from its farm system. Their dedication has paid dividends in the development of significant current players such as Trout, David Fletcher, Griffin Canning, Justin Anderson, Keynan Middleton, and Cam Bedrosian with prospects Jo Adell and Brandon Marsh on the Major League horizon.

Over the past 17 years, Carole and Arte have strengthened the Club's commitment to local communities and beyond. In 2004, the Morenos established the Angels Baseball Foundation concentrating on investments in education, health care, arts & sciences and community-related youth programs to experience the positive attributes of baseball. The Foundation distributes annual grants to various youth programs within Southern California. The Angels



Scholars program works with the Orange County Office of Education and the college preparatory AVID program to award several annual college scholarships. Since purchasing the Club in 2003, the Morenos, Angels, and Angels Baseball Foundation have contributed over \$20 million to various charitable efforts with a primary focus in the Orange County area.

In 2010, the Angels were privileged to host their third All-Star Game (also 1967 & 1989). In conjunction with MLB's All-Star Legacy Fund, the foundation funded renovation of softball fields at Anaheim's Pioneer Park (into the MLB Angels All-Star Complex) as well as the special-surfaced field for the Miracle League of Orange County for disabled youth. The Foundation regularly donates tickets, memorabilia, and ballpark experiences to the various groups and fundraisers.

In addition to their responsibilities with the Angels and various committees within MLB, the Morenos were part of ownership of the former Single-A Salt Lake Trappers of the Pioneer League. Under their leadership, the Trappers won three championships. Arte and Carole were also original investors in the Arizona Diamondbacks (including their 2001 World Series championship) and in a partnered ownership of the NBA's Phoenix Suns.

The Moreno family is also active in their own philanthropic efforts. In 1997, they established the Moreno Family Foundation to support nonprofit organizations focusing on youth and education as well as investing in educational scholarships in K-8, high school, and college. Their favorite charities include St. Vincent de Paul, St. Mary's Food Bank, the Barrow Neurological Institute, Boys & Girls Clubs, UMOM Homeless Shelters, American Heart Association, and Fresh Start Women's Foundation. The Morenos were previously members of the Little League Foundation's Board of Trustees, which assists Little Leagues in every state and more than 70 other countries. For her continued philanthropic efforts, Carole Moreno was honored by the Girl Scouts of Orange County as their 2019 G.I.R.L. (Go-Getter, Innovator, Risk-Taker, Leader) honoree.

Carole was born in Reno, NV, and moved often as the daughter of a career Air Force man. She spent much of her youth in Fredonia, KS, and went on to earn a degree in journalism from the University of Kansas. Arte is a native of Tucson, AZ, and served his country in Vietnam as a member of the U.S. Army. After his tour of duty, he attended the University of Arizona, graduating with a degree in marketing. In 2005, Time Magazine selected Moreno as one of the '25 Most Influential Hispanics in America.' Arte and Carole are the parents of three children.

## FRONT OFFICE

#### **DENNIS KUHL**

#### CHAIRMAN



Dennis Kuhl begins his 17th season with the Angels after joining the Club on November 10, 2003. He was initially appointed as the Angels' seventh President before a promotion to Chairman on November 14, 2009. Kuhl's focus centers on renewed efforts in the area of civic affairs and

community outreach. Kuhl also oversees the Angels' flagship radio station KLAA AM830 and was recently named the President of the Angels Baseball Foundation.

Under his leadership, the Angels have shown tremendous growth and advancement in key business initiatives, including sponsorship and marketing revenues, as well as nationwide expansion and promotion of the Angels' brand. Kuhl also played a key role in working with Major League Baseball in hosting of the 2010 All-Star Game.

Kuhl is actively involved in several Southern California charities. He serves as president of the "Light the Night" event which supports the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society and is a founding board member of The Pacific Club IMPACT Foundation/Lott Trophy. Kuhl works with Susan G. Komen for the Cure serving as one of the "Pink Tie Guys," a select group of advocates speaking out to find a cure for breast cancer. Additionally, he serves on

the advisory boards for the South County Outreach, Anaheim YMCA, Rivals For The Cure, Irvine Public School Foundation and the Angels Baseball Foundation Board of Directors.

A champion of community involvement, Kuhl's efforts span across Orange County and beyond. He is a member of the Board of Governors at Chapman University and on the board of directors for several nonprofits: The Children's Education Foundation of Orange County, the Los Angeles Sports Council, Boys and Girls Club of Anaheim, The Tiger Woods Foundation, the Noble Vikings Charity of Orange County, the Literacy Project Foundation and the Alzheimer's Association of Orange County & Newport Beach.

In 2014, Kuhl served as a co-chairperson for the United Cerebral Palsy Golf Classic and a co-chairperson for the annual Red, White & Greens Golf Tournament to benefit the Susan G. Komen Foundation.

A Boonton, NJ native, Kuhl graduated from the University of Arizona in 1970 with a degree in business administration. In honor of his late father, he established the Bud Kuhl Wood Bat Invitational in 2007 with annual proceeds donated to local charities. Kuhl also initiated scholarships in his father's name to the Eller School of Management at the University of Arizona. In 2009, he was named the "Business Man of the Year" by the Anaheim Chamber of Commerce. Kuhl currently resides in Newport Beach.

#### **JOHN CARPINO**

#### **PRESIDENT**

John Carpino was named the eighth president in Angels' history November 14, 2009. He oversees all areas of business, sales, marketing, finance and communications. Carpino's top priority is fan value and experience in all areas of the game including concessions, merchandise, promotions and ticketing. As the principal executive in charge

of business operations, he has helped welcome over three million fans through Angel Stadium turnstiles for 17 straight seasons. He was also an integral part of Angel Stadium hosting the 2010 MLB All-Star Game, a key member in the Club's negotiations to keep the Angels in the City of Anaheim through 2050 and oversaw the negotiations for the extension of the Club's television agreement with FOX Sports West. ESPN The Magazine rated the Angels as the #1 MLB franchise in nine of Carpino's first 11 years with the organization.

The Chicago native continues to create value for fans, focusing not only on the game inside the lines, but on the entire ballpark experience. He has guided the Angel brand with a focus on affordable pricing while providing a quality family environment, including continual stadium improvements and enhancements. Under his leadership, Carpino's staff has established Angel Stadium as one of the premiere destinations in California for non-baseball events such as concerts, Supercross, Monster Jam and corporate events.

As one of the initial executives appointed by Owner Arte Moreno after purchasing the Club, the 2020 season marks Carpino's 17th with the team, having previously held the post of Senior Vice President. Carpino has led the Angels to unprecedented financial growth in sponsorship, marketing and ticketing. He oversaw the general manager selection processes in 2011 & 2015, assisted in the acquisition of high-profile players such as Albert

Pujols, Anthony Rendon, Andrelton Simmons and Shohei Ohtani as well as the historic 12-year contract extension for three-time MVP Mike Trout.

He has created a stronger, more viable partnership with Los Angeles-based radio and television partners, and oversees KLAA AM830, the radio flagship of the Angels. His vision and creativity have brought an emphasis on the Angels' heritage with a reintroduction of the Club's Hall of Fame with yearly inductees, hosting of fan events and celebration of team history. Popular giveaways have included several world record-breaking items and those showcasing the popularity of the Rally Monkey. His efforts continue to create a brand that connects socially and in sync with current cultural trends.

Carpino's promotion followed six seasons as the Angels Senior Vice President of Sales and Marketing during which he oversaw all aspects of marketing, promotions and ticket sales. He began his professional career in 1982 in the billboard industry, including stints in Tucson, Chicago, Phoenix and Los Angeles. In 1985, he joined Moreno at Outdoor Systems, a billboard company (which later became Viacom Outdoor in 2000 and CBS Outdoor in 2005) and spent 18 years in the Phoenix and Los Angeles markets. Carpino oversaw \$200 million in sales for the western region.

Carpino is a 1982 graduate of the University of Arizona with a degree in business administration. He has served on CHOC Children's Foundation Board of Directors as well as the Executive Board for the Orange County United Way. In 2017, he was inducted into the National Italian American Sports Hall of Fame.

He and wife Elizabeth are involved in numerous charitable efforts throughout Southern California and support the Angels Baseball Foundation. John and Elizabeth have three children and reside in Laguna Beach.

#### **BILLY EPPLER**

#### GENERAL MANAGER



Billy Eppler enters his fifth campaign in 2020 as the Angels General Manager. He was named the 12th GM in team history on October 4, 2015, agreeing to a four-year contract with an option for the 2020 campaign. Eppler oversees all aspects of the Club's baseball operations and reports to Owner Arte Moreno.

The 2019 season and winter was filled with activity for the Halos and Eppler. On March 20th, Eppler signed three-time MVP Mike Trout to a record-setting extension, keeping the superstar in an Angels uniform through 2030. Following the year, Eppler introduced Joe Maddon as the Club's 18th field manager, replacing Brad Ausmus. Nearly two months after hiring one of the games most decorated managers, Eppler would sign perennial MVP candidate and 2019 World Series hero Anthony Rendon to a seven-year contract. With a focus on depth and durability in the rotation for 2020, Eppler traded for veteran pitcher Dylan Bundy and signed two-time All-Star Julio Teheran to a one-year deal.

Under Eppler's guidance, the Club has reinvigorated the minor league system with a draft focus on athletes. The approach has resulted in strong prospects including OF Jo Adell, OF Brandon Marsh, RHP Griffin Canning, OF Jordyn Adams and RHP Chris Rodriguez. Eppler has also renewed the Angels focus in the international talent pool as well, with Baseball America placing three Halo farmhands (INF Arol Vera, INF Adrian Placencia and INF Jose Bonilla) in their

Top 35 International Prospect Class for 2020.

Eppler, 44, is a native of San Diego, CA. He graduated from the University of Connecticut with a finance degree in 1998 and began his sports career as an intern in the Washington Redskins Scouting Department. He started his baseball career with the Colorado Rockies organization, where he was hired in 2000 as an area scouting supervisor for Southern California. He would eventually join the front office in 2003 as the Assistant Director of Pro Scouting & Player Development (2003-2004).

From 2004 thru 2015, Eppler worked his way up the New York Yankees Baseball Operations Department. He was initially hired as the Assistant Director of Baseball Operations on November 1, 2004. Eppler would eventually be promoted to Director of Professional Scouting (2006-09) and again as the Senior Director of Professional Personnel (2010-11). He finished his fourth season as Yankees Assistant General Manager and first as Vice President in 2015. While assisting General Manager Brian Cashman, his responsibilities included player acquisitions, roster composition & management, staffing & personnel and player contract negotiations. 



BRIAN BUTTERFIELD Infield/Third Base Coach

Butterfield joined the Angels organization after spending the last two years as Third Base Coach for the Chicago Cubs, under Maddon. Prior to joining the Cubs, he was the Red Sox Third Base Coach from 2013-17 and spent 11 years on the Toronto Blue Jays staff as Third Base Coach (2002-07, '10-12) and Bench Coach (2008-09). The native of Bangor, ME, played five minor league seasons in the Yankees (1979-82) and Padres (1983) organizations and has worked as a coach, minor league manager or scout since 1984.

Pitching Coach

Callaway joined the Angels staff as Pitching Coach after spending the last two years as Manager of the New York Mets, where he compiled a 163-161 (.503) record. He has previously served as a Major League Pitching Coach from 2013 to 2017 with the Cleveland Indians. 










# ALUM SPEAK/ANTHONY RENDON



ROD CAREW on what makes Anthony Rendon a great hitter:

Well it is very impressive the way he generates power. He really allows the ball to get closer to him and he uses his hands well. Everyone tells a hitter to allow the ball to get deep. Well you have to judge what is deep. Ask yourself what is allowing the ball to get back on you. There is that point where you know it is deep enough that you can get the bat head on it and hit it out of the ballpark. That is what he does both very well and consistently.






**MIKE WITT**, a decade-long Angels mainstay and local product stands tall as one of the most dominant pitchers in club history. He is also a member of the Angels Hall of Fame.

A graduate of Servite High School, at time of his Angels Hall of Fame induction (2015), the two-time All-Star ranked fourth on the club's all-time list in wins (109), starts (272) & strikeouts (1,283) and third in complete games (70) & innings pitched (1,965.1).

During his Angels tenure, Witt was a member of two Western Division Champion teams (1982 and 1986). In 1986, he shouldered the Angels to the American League Championship Series with the best season of his career, posting a record of 18-10 with a 2.84 ERA.

Witt's most impressive individual accomplishment, however, came on the last game of the 1984 season at Texas when he became one of only 13 pitchers in history to throw a perfect game, striking out 10 en route to a memorable 1-0 victory.








"The reason I wrote the book was because people really love baseball stories and everybody knows I always have a story or two to tell. They would always ask for more, and I heard more than once that I should write a book because I had so many," said Wright.

"When my son, Jaret, was done playing we decided to get together and do it. It was fun listening to each other's stories. Comparing differences and similarities and stars of the different eras of baseball. It was interesting, though, that even though we played in different eras our thought processes while pitching was basically the same."

This month, Clyde and his wife Vicki share the Chapter entitled 'Joining the Famous Club.'


#### JOINING THE FAMOUS CLUB

Every pitcher dreams of throwing a no-hitter. On July 3, 1970, I joined that famous club in baseball, which I never thought would ever happen. An average of two no-hitters are thrown per season, and now I had one of them.

I came close on August 20, 1968, when I combined with Rickey Clark for a one-hitter against Baltimore. I relieved Clark in the third inning with the bases loaded, and to that point, the only hit he had allowed was a single to Mark Belanger. I pitched the final six and a third innings and did not allow a hit. We were behind 2-1 until the fourth, when we scored five to take the lead for good. I walked in the fourth and scored on Fregosi's bases-loaded double. I added an RBI single in the eighth to score Satriano and we won. 7-2.

The representatives from the NAIA came out to Anaheim Stadium for our game against the Oakland As on July 3, 1970, and they inducted me into the NAIA Hall of Fame before the game. At that time, the Angels had a pitching coach by the name of Norm Sherry. I went down and warmed up, and Sherry said, "Why don't you just throw a no-hitter, and you can go in both Halls of Fame the same night?" And it actually happened.

Joe Azcue was the catcher for my no-hitter, and it was the second one that he caught. He had been the catcher in Sonny Siebert's nohitter for Cleveland against the Washington Senators in '66. Joe was just outstanding. We were on the same page all night. I don't think I shook him off but maybe twice out of the 98 pitches. He'd put down the finger and say, "Come on, big guy! Throw it!" He always called everybody big guy.

I said, "I'm it. I'm the big guy!"

I pitched almost the entire game with the lead after my teammates got me a run early. The third batter of the game for us, Fregosi, scored Repoz with an RBI groundout to put us up 1–0 in the first inning. In the fourth, Kenny McMullen gave us some insurance with a three-run homer against Chuck Dobson.

I retired the first 12. As of the game before I walked Sal Bando to start the top of the fifth. He moved to second on a grounder, but he was stranded there.

In the third inning, Dick Green hit a line drive right back to me, and I caught it. If I don't catch it, it's probably a base hit up the middle. McMullen made two or three good plays for us at third base. Fregosi made an over-the-shoulder catch, running from shortstop out to shallow left field on a pop-up hit by Tony LaRussa in the sixth.

After the sixth inning, it was like I had bad breath. I was on one end of the dugout, and all my teammates were on the other end, and nobody was talking to me. When I got to the seventh inning, I looked up, and it was all zeroes. I went back out there for the eighth inning, and when I got through that, I still had zeroes. And I was going back for the ninth inning thinking, 'If somebody messes this up, I'm gonna drill 'em from now on every time I get a chance to face him!'

It happened so quickly in the ninth inning. I walked the first guy, Frank Fernandez, who was a pinch hitter. The next hitter was Bert Campaneris, and he hit a line drive to Fregosi on the first pitch. Then I threw one more pitch to Felipe Alou, and he hit into a 6-4-3 double play started by Fregosi, and it was all over. The whole game took just one hour and 51 minutes to play. I faced 27 batters, only two over the minimum.

My no-hitter was the second one for the Angels in their nine years of existence, but it was the first one ever thrown at Anaheim Stadium. Bo Belinsky had thrown one for the Angels back in '62, but that was at Dodger Stadium, which was the Angels' home field at the time. There were actually four no-hitters thrown in 1970—first there was Dock Ellis of the Pirates, then mine, then Bill Singer of the Dodgers, and Vida Blue of the As. Three years later, Singer was later my teammate with the Angels. The Angels in 1973 had three pitchers on the team who had thrown no-hitters—me, Nolan Ryan, and Singer.

Not too long after I threw the no-hitter, I talked to my father on the phone, which was something I didn't do very often. We had those old phones where you rotary-dialed the number, and I got him on the phone, and I said, "You'll never guess what happened. I threw a no-hitter against Oakland."

He didn't know very much about baseball. He said, "I thought you were a better hitter than that!" He didn't understand what a no-hitter was.

The funny thing was, I thought I pitched a lot better in other games than I pitched in the no-hitter. I had games where I'd give up a couple of runs, and I thought I threw the ball really well. But in the no-hitter, every time I would make a pitch, they would hit it right at somebody. Out of 27 outs, I only had one strikeout, and that was Reggie Jackson to end the top of the fourth. They put it in play twenty-six times out of those 27 outs, and we got in the way of it 26 times. That was pretty good odds. I got 15 outs on ground balls and 11 on fly balls, pop-ups, or line drives.

In the weeks following the no-hitter, when all the different clubs would come into Anaheim, the sportswriters would want to interview me. But the one thing that I distinctly remember about that was I

got a package through the mail from Charlie O. Finley, the owner of the Oakland Athletics. It was a brand-new Bulova watch. Charlie O. had sent me the watch and put it on it, "Nice job." I still have it.

A few days after I threw my no-hitter, Don Sutton sent me a telegram to congratulate me. It said, "Congratulations on a great job. You're one up on me, ex-roomie."

He never threw a no-hitter, but he did throw five one-hitters, and he won 324 games in the major leagues. He won his 300th game while playing for the Angels in 1986, and later he was voted into the Hall of Fame.

Jay Johnstone, our center fielder, said he went up over the wall to rob Reggie Jackson of a home run. He'd tell that story for 25 or 35s, and I finally got tired of him exaggerating. So, I put a stop to that. I got the tape from Channel 5, and I sent it to him. He was standing flat-footed on the warning track catching the fly ball. He didn't climb the wall.

It turned out that Johnstone wasn't the only one who had trouble remembering what happened in the no-hitter. When I had the pitching school in Anaheim at Home Run Park, one day the hitting instructor, Darrell Darrow, called me and said, "You have to come down here and listen to this dude."

So, I went up there and met the guy, and he said he was there the night I threw the no-hitter. Except he didn't know who I was.


He said, "Boy, they pulled off the neatest triple play that I've ever seen in baseball." And I knew right then he was lying.

I said, "They pulled off a triple play?"

He said. "Yeah!"

I said, "How did all those guys get on base if he threw a no-hitter?" He said, "I guess he walked 'em all."

I said, "I don't remember him walking all those guys, and I don't remember a triple play."

He said, "You must have had a bad seat. Were you there?"

I said, "Yeah, I was there. I had a pretty good seat."

He said, "Where were you?"

I said, "I was the guy standing on the mound!"

I stuck my hand out to shake hands with him. He never shook my hand. He went out in the parking lot, and I never saw that dude again.

Clyde won 100 games during his time in the Majors. He was an All-Star with the Halos in 1970 – a season that saw him win 22 games, a career-high, and toss a no-hitter versus Oakland. He first joined the Angels when the club selected him in the 1965 amateur draft.

Jaret pitched for five teams during his 11-year big league career from 1997-07. He pitched in the postseason six times including the 1997 World Series with the Indians as a rookie. He was born in Anaheim and went to Katella High School.



# Richard Nixon and the Angels





Richard Milhous Nixon, in addition to serving as the 37th President in U.S. history, was an avid baseball fanatic. And there is little doubt that when it came to baseball and politics, President Nixon held - and continues to hold - the title of number one fan-in-chief.

Born in Yorba Linda in 1913, Mr. Nixon attended his first big league game in 1936 (on July 4 no less) when as a Duke University law student he travelled to Washington D.C. to see the Senators play the Yankees, which featured Joe DiMaggio and Lou Gehrig no less.

He returned to practice law in California after graduating from Duke and was later elected to the House of Representatives and then Congress before serving as the nation's 36th Vice President from 1953-61.

It was also in 1961 that the Angels began play as the newest addition to the American League. Mr. Nixon enjoyed a tremendous friendship with Angels Founder and Original Owner Gene Autry. In 1966, the Angels began play at Anaheim Stadium, and that was just two years before Mr. Nixon ran for the presidency again and was elected, defeating Hubert Humphrey and George Wallace in a close election.

In later years Nixon was often a visitor to Anaheim Stadium where he attended the Angels 1979 division clinching


victory over the Royals and joined the Angels' clubhouse celebration. During the party, a photographer captured Bobby Grich drenching the former President with beer.

He passed away on April 22, 1994 in New York City and was buried on the grounds of the Nixon Library in Yorba Linda, at the side of his First Lady, on April 27, 1994. The eulogists at his State Funeral were President Bill Clinton, Senator Robert Dole, California Governor Pete Wilson, and his second Secretary of State, Henry Kissinger.
