His opening remarks state simply: "there are quite a number of conflicting accounts of this hoard in eighteenth century literature". However, as Purefoy adduced some four decades later from his sample size of 50 coins: "The recorded history of 40 of the coins [80%] starts in England and none of these has a pedigree that conflicts with the possibility that it came originally from the [Denge Marsh] hoard."As documented by the late Peter Purefoy, and corroborated by this cataloguer's separate enquiries: "In the first or Profile Left type only Canterbury, Dover and Romney are represented [for Kent]. The coins disclose that three moneyers were striking at the important mint at Canterbury at this time, and we have respectively eight, five and nine of their coins. One of the moneyers Wulfred, used at least two pairs of dies. Dover has one moneyer in evidence with four coins all from the same dies. Rochester, Sandwich and Hythe have no coins of Type I to show. But Romney is exceptional. In fact, the incentive to write this article came from the listing in the Numismatic Circular for June 1996 of a Type I Penny of Romney which is the fiftieth coin of its mint and type that I have found, all struck from the same pair of dies". It is now all but certain that the source of most, if not all known examples of the Profile Left type of William I Penny struck by Wulfmær at Romney must originate from the Denge Marsh trove, on account of tone, weight standard, striking quality, defects and production 'treatments' and of course, rather tellingly, the universal die matching of all known examples from a sole obverse and reverse die. Not even the recent and comprehensive Chew Valley Find (2019) presented a new example for this type, even though strikings by the moneyer Wulfmær at Romney are present for Harold II. Compellingly, a single further find has been recorded with the Fitzwilliam Museum (EMC 2019.0282) also reported as from "Denge Marsh" which may ultimately reveal the find location of this early trove. At all events, the design, though it had some grave faults, was a great step in advance of numismatic excellence, and is very beautiful when compared to the rude issue of 1709. The coins of 1723 appear to have been unknown to Train; and yet the penny and halfpenny are to be found, though rarely, in copper; as well as some double-struck (or rather, misstrikes) which are rarer still; all of which are to be found in the collection list in connection with this volume...I believe I can trace the workmanship on this coinage as being the design of Mr. Wood, who was the celebrated issuer of the Wood money of George II, intended for Irish circulation, but which was so ill received there, and ridiculed by Dean Swift in the "Drapier Letters." History, however, has proved that, as a coinage, it was far superior to any the Irish had previously had; besides possessing the merit of having upon it the best likeness of George II extant...I mention Wood's name...because I believe it is a settles question that Mr. Wood designed the subsequent coinage of the Isle of Man of 1733, which is acknowledged to be so very beautiful; proving this Mr. Wood to have been a man of good standing, and an excellent designer. Why the pattern pieces of 1723 were not accepted as Manx coinage, history is silent; and we can only guess, that the design being so slightly raised from the surface, might foster the idea of its soon wearing out. At all events, these coins are only known as pattern pieces, which are greatly to be prized when once in the collector's possession. The silver pieces, i.e. copies of the half-pence, are much thinner; and the date figures peculiar: the first figure is like the letter J; the tail of the 7 is turned backward and its extremity; and the last figure (3) is square-topped. A correspondent (E. S. Taylor) in Notes and Queries (vol. iii, p. 510, 1st series), in some observations respecting the currency of the Isle of Man, speaks of "the coinage of 1723", whilst, as I believe I have satisfactorily shown, all of that date known, are pattern pieces only, and were never legalised as coins; consequently never circulated as such. Records suggest the most likely candidate to be the daughter of Sir Edward Dymock, more commonly recorded as Dymoke, of Scrivelsby Court in the county of Lincolnshire. The manor of Scrivelsby has been the home of the Dymoke family since the latter fourteen century and through the female line connections date back to the Marmion family, who originally held the position of King's Champion as early as the reign of William the Conqueror. The honourable and hereditary position of King's Champion was a role enacted during the coronation of British monarchs to challenge anyone who contested the new monarch's entitlement to the throne. Although, last carried out during the coronation of George IV in 1821, the position remains within the Dymoke family. Edward Dymoke and his wife Elizabeth are recorded as having a daughter who was christened Elizabeth prior to October 1747, it is this child that records suggest is the Polly named on the token. Edward and Elizabeth are not recorded as having any other daughters and no children christened Polly are recorded throughout the many generations of the Dymoke family. We can therefore suppose that like many, Elizabeth came to be known by a middle name or a nick name. Little is known about Polly's life beyond her marriage to a William Harris of Holborn in 1761 and through pockets of information relating to her father and brothers. The death of her father Edward on the 9 July 1760 is recorded in parish records and a copy of his will and testament also survives. The will records a figure of £4,000 to be left to his son the Honourable John Dymoke esq. sole executor who may dispose of the said £4,000 as he wishes. John, Polly's brother, upon his father's death went on to inherit Scrivelsby and the position of King's Champion. It is perhaps also John to whom we can lay a claim to being the creator of the token. John was born in 1730 and therefore would have been around 15 years of age at the time of his sister's birth. The initials JM positioned to the bottom of the obverse, perhaps represent John signing himself as John Mamion in honour of his earliest ancestral roots and in the knowledge that he would go on to inherit the family seat. The reverse of the token, depicting a country scene populated by a manor house and lake, we can further suppose is a depiction of Scrivelsby Court. Unfortunately, due to a fire in 1761 which largely destroyed the building there remains limited evidence of what the original building would have looked like. The court was rebuilt, however, only to succumb to demolition in the 1950s during a period of rapid deterioration and destruction for country houses across the whole of the United Kingdom. All that remains today is the 16th century Lion Gateway. However, Historic England research records do provide some clues to what Scrivelsby once looked like.
