

### **Teacher Talk:** Spotlight on California's educators

Her friends knew she would become a teacher before she did

Janet Sitts wore many hats before fulfilling her dream of becoming a teacher. Her eye for art started an early career path in print and design for University of California, Davis. Her path shifted when she went to the Bay Area as an interior designer. From there, it was motherhood and a desire to start teaching. "When my youngest daughter started school, I realized I wanted to do something more and became a teacher's aide to follow my kids' schedules."

Sitts spent four years as a teacher's aide for kindergarten through second grades at Valley Oak Elementary in Davis, and that was when the spark ignited to pursue her teaching credential. "My friends used to tell me that I would be teaching any day, and they were right. I like kids! I was spending a lot of time with them as an aide, and we bonded quickly. I wanted to be an important influence in their lives."

Before getting her credential, she introduced another skill to students at Valley Oak and spent time teaching computer classes before the technology became commonplace. "Back when a floppy disk was really a floppy disk." Teaching computer skills gave Sitts a chance to feel what designing a curriculum was like, giving her another reason to start teaching full time.

Sitts left Valley Oak when it turned into a high school and continued teaching third grade at Korematsu Elementary in Davis. In 2014, Sitts retired after 20 years of teaching.

#### What was your favorite subject to teach your students?

"I enjoyed reading, social science and math the most. PE was my least favorite, but I was lucky that other teachers would team up with me and swap their computer classes for my PE classes."

#### What if your payment hasn't arrived yet?

#### **Direct deposit**

If you have direct deposit, you can find your statements online at *my*CalSTRS. Your financial institution has until the close of the direct deposit date to place the funds in your account. Please contact your financial institution to find out what time it places your funds into your account.

#### **Paper checks**

If your benefit payment is mailed to you and you have not received it by the fifth business day of the month, contact us at 800-228-5453.

### One-time death benefit amounts increase

The Teachers' Retirement Board approved an increase to the one-time death benefit, effective July 1, 2024. The one-time death benefit is \$7,093 (up from \$6,903) if a member dies before retirement under Coverage A and \$28,372 (up from \$27,612) if under Coverage B. If a member dies after retirement, the one-time death benefit is \$7,093 under both Coverage A and Coverage B (up from \$6,903).

This is the third increase in the last five years and the first under a policy approved by the board in March 2024. The board considers a death benefit increase only if the CalSTRS Defined Benefit Program is on or ahead of schedule to reach full funding by 2046. Increases are tied to inflation in California from the previous calendar year and capped at the long-term assumed inflation rate of 2.75%. California inflation in 2023 was 3.48%. When inflation exceeds 2.75%, the excess inflation is made available for future increases.

You can name or update your one-time death benefit recipient at any time during retirement with no financial penalty. Just log in to your *my*CalSTRS account and select *Manage Your Beneficiary Selections*. You may name one or more recipients for the one-time death benefit—a person, trust, charity, estate, parochial institution, corporation or public entity.

If you reinstate from retirement and return to employment in a CalSTRS-covered position, you must earn at least one year of service credit before the one-time death benefit is available to you again. #### **Retirement Incentive Program**

## Safeguard your benefit increase

The CalSTRS Retirement Incentive Program is provided by employers and allows CalSTRS Defined Benefit Program members who are eligible to retire to receive two additional years of service credit. If you retired under the Retirement Incentive Program, it's important to know that there are restrictions, and you will lose the ongoing increase in your benefit if you:

- Become an active member again by returning to CalSTRS-covered employment (reinstatement).
- Receive unemployment benefits within one year of your effective retirement date.
- Return within five years to any job, including as
  a substitute teacher or instructional aide—as an
  employee, a volunteer, an independent contractor or
  an employee of a third party—with the employer
  that granted your incentive credit.

Are you newly retired? Did you have unused sick leave? Check your award letter to make sure your sick leave was added to your calculation. If not, contact your employer to confirm it was submitted to CalSTRS.

## What's one thing you're proud of during your teaching career?

"I am proud that I made a connection with all my students and gave them a positive feeling about themselves. A parent once said, 'You make every student feel like the most important person in the class.' Talking one-on-one with the kids was important, illuminating and fulfilling."

## How is retirement going? What is your favorite thing to do now that you have extra time?

#### What's your best piece of advice for new teachers?

"Call each parent within the first few weeks with a positive comment about their child. Maybe they did well on a spelling test or helped a friend at recess. Once you've established a positive rapport, all other communications will go smoother."

## What would you have done differently in your teaching career?

"I would have started as a teacher earlier for the enjoyment and the nice retirement. Being a teacher is very fulfilling, and I think that's why people do it."

## Postretirement earnings limit for fiscal year 2024-25

After you retire, you can work in any job outside the California public school system with no restrictions on your earnings. However, if you perform retired member activities in the California public school system, including substitute teaching—as an employee, an independent contractor or an employee of a third party—there's a limit to the amount of money you can earn in a year without affecting your retirement benefit.

Recently signed legislation changed how the annual limit is calculated from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2026,

increasing the amount you can earn from retired member activities. The 2024–25 limit is \$74,733.

In addition, your retirement benefit will be reduced dollar for dollar by the amount you earn in CalSTRS-covered employment during the first 180 calendar days following your most recent retirement effective date. There is a narrow exemption from this requirement. The new law adjusts the requirements when employers apply for this exemption from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2026.





She also served as a legislative assistant to several Assembly members in the California Legislature from 1978–1991.
