Resource Mobilization

Background

In 2016, the IPCC launched a resource mobilization campaign. Its main objective was to obtain sufficient funding from voluntary contributions to ensure the successful completion of the production of three special reports, a methodological report, the three Working Group contributions to the Sixth Assessment Report (AR6) and the AR6 Synthesis Report, as agreed in Decisions IPCC/XLIII-6 and IPCC/XLIII-7.

Over the past two years, the Member Governments of the IPCC have responded to the call for increased funding which has led to a marked growth in the balance of the IPCC Trust Fund.

Resource Mobilization

The IPCC is seeking to raise CHF 31.1 million to cover the estimated costs associated with the remainder of the AR6 cycle (2019-2022). For the period January to December 2018, the IPCC Trust Fund has received contributions from (a) first-time donors, (b) a private individual, (c) donors who made a contribution after having ceased contributing, (d) donors who maintained their increased contribution from 2017, (e) donors who increased their contributions/made additional contribution(s) and (f) donors who made multi-year pledges/contributions.

Income received in 2018, as at 31 December 2018, stands at CHF 8,123,056. A list of all the donors is attached as **Annex 1**. This increase in annual contributions over 2017 (CHF 5,129,443) reinforces the assurance that the level of annual contributions will continue to rise in the coming years based on the show of commitment received from Member Governments and organizations in recent years. It is further reassuring to note that not only has the level of contributions increased but also the number of Member Governments/organizations contributing has also risen from 23 (2013) to 39 (2018) as shown in **Annex 2**.

The Secretary of the IPCC recognizes with greatest appreciation all IPCC Member Governments and institutions that have contributed to the IPCC Trust Fund in 2018, with a special expression of gratitude to those that have increased their contributions and whose 2018 contributions to the IPCC Trust Fund are as follows; Australia CHF 84,329, Denmark CHF 308,412, European Union CHF 991,468, Finland CHF 110,348, France CHF 935,415, Japan CHF 243,000, Republic of Korea CHF 202,540, Netherlands CHF 113,311, Norway CHF 1,360,043 and Spain CHF 113,311. First-time donors, namely: Singapore, South Africa and Tanzania are very much welcomed.

As at 31 December 2018, outstanding pledges amount to CHF 6,731,425. Member Governments with outstanding 2018 pledges are urged to transfer their pledges as soon as possible. All Member Governments, who have not yet done so, are urged to make their 2019 contribution as soon as possible. In addition, Member Governments, who may be in a position to do so, may wish to consider making a multi-year pledge.

Financial Position and Financial Performance of the IPCC Trust Fund

Annex 3 shows the Interim Statement of Financial Position of the IPCC Trust Fund as at 31 December 2018. The Interim Statement of Financial Performance is contained in **Annex 4**.

Update on the Outcome of Fundraising Meetings

The Chair of the IPCC and the Secretary of the IPCC have met with representatives of governments as well as with regional and international organizations in bilateral as well as multilateral settings during the course of 2018, notably on the margins of COP-24 which was held in Katowice, Poland.


