

Five Illinois Students Named 2022 U.S. Presidential Scholars

U.S. Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona recently announced the 58th class of U.S. Presidential Scholars, recognizing 161 high school seniors for their accomplishments in academics, the arts, and Career and Technical Education (CTE) fields.

"Our 2022 Presidential Scholars represent the best of America and remind us that when empowered by education, there are no limits to what our young people can achieve," said Secretary Cardona. "... I join President Biden to celebrate a class of scholars whose pursuit of knowledge, generosity of spirit, and exceptional talents bring our nation tremendous pride. Throughout one of the most trying periods in our nation's history and amid our recovery from the pandemic, our students have once again demonstrated their strength and that they have so much to contribute to our country. Thanks to them, I know America's future is bright."

The [White House Commission on Presidential Scholars](#) selects scholars annually based on their academic success, artistic and technical excellence, essays, school evaluations and transcripts, as well as a demonstrated commitment to community service and leadership.

There are 3.7 million students expected to graduate from high school this year. More than 5,000 of those students qualified for the 2022 awards determined by outstanding performance on the College Board SAT or ACT exams or through nominations made by chief state school officers, other partner recognition organizations, and [YoungArts](#).

As directed by Presidential Executive Order, the 2022 U.S. Presidential Scholars are composed of one young man and one young woman from each state, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, and U.S. families living abroad, as well as 15 chosen at-large, 20 scholars in the arts, and 20 scholars in CTE.

The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was created in 1964. More than 7,900 of the nation's top-performing students have been honored. The program was expanded in 1979 to recognize students who demonstrate exceptional talent in the visual, literary, and performing arts. In 2015, the program was again expanded to recognize students who demonstrate ability and accomplishment in CTE fields.

Members of the Presidential Scholars Class of 2022 will be recognized for their outstanding achievement this summer with an online recognition program.

Education Symposium

Regional Office of Education (ROE) 47, in partnership with Sauk Valley Community College (SVCC), held an education symposium on April 29. The event, the first of its kind for the area, allowed area high school students to explore the field of education.

ROE 47 serves Lee, Ogle, and Whiteside counties. Grade 9-12 students from area districts who are interested in pursuing a career in education attended the event on the SVCC campus in Dixon.

Students participated in mock interviews with school administrators, heard from State Superintendent of Education Dr. Carmen I. Ayala, talked to college representatives from across the state, investigated various roles in education, and collected wisdom from retired teachers.

A ceremony to honor area students who have earned education endorsements during high school capped off the day. School districts partnering in this work include Dixon PSD 170, Rock Falls THSD 301, Morrison CUSD 6, River Bend CUSD 2, Amboy CUSD 272, Sterling CUD 5, Ashton-Franklin Center CUSD 275, Prophetstown-Lyndon-Tampico CUSD 3, Forrestville Valley CUSD 221, and ROE 47

In a 2021 survey of superintendents in Lee, Ogle, and Whiteside counties, 87% of respondents stated that their districts were experiencing a teacher shortage and 18% of local positions went unfilled or were filled with less-than-qualified hires. ROE 47 and Sauk Valley Community College are partnering to build Education Pathways for students to fill those gaps.

High School Students with College Degrees?

The tradition of dual degrees in Vienna continues with the Class of 2022. For a decade, Vienna High School has had multiple students who have marched to pomp and circumstance in back-to-back ceremonies. Class of 2022 seniors Payton Catherine Bennett, Ava Marie Goines, Eliza Shane Goines, Caleb Dean Johnson, Lily Catherine Moore, Maron Lynn Penrod, Jessa Rayne Shoemaker, Riley Jayne Slife, Maelee Annalice Lou Sparks, and Madelyn Elizabeth Thornton have completed not only their requirements for high school graduation, but have also completed their associate degrees either at Shawnee Community College or Southeastern Illinois College. The Vienna High School Class of 2022 celebrated the scholarly achievements of its members, including valedictorians, salutatorians, four-year honors students, Illinois State Scholars, and numerous scholarship recipients.

These impressive achievements are only enhanced by the 10 students graduating who earned their college degrees.

"The career planning and early college initiatives that Vienna has worked in cooperation with its college partners over the last decade have been not only fruitful for those graduating from high school and college at the same time, but has also drastically increased the college readiness rate for all students, opened up better career exploration,

and has allowed many high school students to at a minimum get started on their college transcript," said Vienna Superintendent Joshua Stafford.

Shawnee Community College held graduation May 13, and Southeastern Illinois College held graduation May 14. Vienna High School held graduation May 20.

Further discussion with Stafford revealed that there is a great deal of research that demonstrates early college programs increase postsecondary enrollment, retention, and completion rates, along with improved long-term career placement.

Vienna is a career-connected early college high school offering over 125 dual credit college opportunities, 12 career pathways, four ISBE-approved college and career pathway endorsements, and a comprehensive career framework that provides a career road map for all students. Pulling all of the resources together has been key to opening opportunities for students in Vienna. Some of the components include dual credit, dual enrollment, articulation, remedial curriculum, credit recovery, extension center services, GED classes, and numerous other points of cooperation between institutions. Stafford shared that all parts of the cooperation are vitally important to student success but emphasized the importance of remedial course work.

"Students graduating with their associates is great; however, another win that is not as easy to bring attention to is the remedial course work that we have made accessible to students while they are in high school. Thirteen years ago we had only 40% of the graduates reading and writing ready at the college level. Due to the hard work of our instructors and those at the colleges, we have now brought that college readiness number to over 85%. This has major implications for students as they move into the future of college and careers," he said.

The Class of 2022 at Vienna has collectively completed over 2,000 credit hours toward their college degrees through the dual credit/enrollment partnerships. These hours have been earned not only through dual credit offerings at the high school, but also by students attending classes at the college, both online and at the colleges' campuses.

These students have varied plans and ambitions:

- **Payton Catherine Bennett** will attend West Kentucky Community and Technical College and start the nursing program this fall.
- **Ava Marie Goines** will be attending the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, where she will work toward her bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary health on the pre-med track and then go on to medical school to pursue a career as an anesthesiologist.
- **Eliza Shane Goines** will attend Loyola University New Orleans to major in marine biology.
- **Caleb Dean Johnson** plans on joining IBEW Local 702 and becoming an electrician.
- **Lily Catherine Moore** is attending the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign to study political science and/or business
- **Maron Lynn Penrod** will attend the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign to major in community health on a pre-med track.
- **Jessa Rayne Shoemaker** will attend the University of Southern Indiana to major in education.
- **Riley Jayne Slife** plans on attending Southeast Missouri State University to major in communication disorders.
- **Maelee Annalice Lou Sparks** will be attending the University of Tennessee at Martin, where she will work toward her bachelor's degree in elementary education

and be able to teach kindergarten through fifth grade. She then plans to teach at a school in Tennessee.

- **Madelyn Elizabeth Thornton** is attending Shawnee Community College on a full-tuition scholarship for softball to pursue her nursing degree. After earning her bachelor's degree, she plans to serve in the Navy as a nurse.

Partner Spotlight

Project Lead the Way (PLTW) has been a stable partner in high school engineering education throughout its nearly 25-year history. Project Lead the Way has local chapters throughout the state of Illinois. Recently, the director of CTE in Thornton Fractional High School District 215 independently submitted a grant application to secure funding to start a PLTW program at both Thornton Fractional North High School and Thornton Fractional South High. Within a few months, Project Lead the Way awarded each of the two high schools a \$50,000 grant, for a total of \$100,000, to be used to cover professional development for teachers to receive training on the PLTW curriculum and program activities, equipment, supplies, and materials. This generous grant will allow the district to start two PLTW sites in the fall. Currently, there are over 50 students at each school who are interested in enrolling in the first PLTW course – Introduction to Engineering Design.




