In an effort to comply with statute changes enacted by the approval of Act 111 and refine the process for adhering to statutory requirements, the Commission proposed to amend and add regulations to Chapter 67. The proposal was published in the State Register on November 26, 2008 and is currently pending approval by the General Assembly.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

Fiscal Year 2008-2009 was another productive year for the Commission. As of July 1, 2007 the Commission was required to maintain all claim files for fifteen years. In an effort to comply in the most cost effective manner, the agency began electronic storage of closed cases. The process of scanning compliance investigations, self insurance files, and Claim Form 15, 15S, 17, 18, and 20 was created and implemented. On average, 18,000 documents are scanned per month.

Software development to provide web access to hearing and appeal schedules and other claims status information for registered users was completed. Registered users will be able to track changes in hearing schedules, add an attorney to a case and access claim numbers through the new application. This information is currently researched manually by commission employees, providing electronic access will minimize research time in several departments.

Electronic document management was introduced through scanning and imaging documents. Software development was completed allowing the Commission to receive First Report of Injury claim information through Electronic Data Interface Release 3. This is the first step in the Commission being able to receive claim payment reports and periodic status reports electronically. The development of departmental and individual electronic workflows has allowed the Commission to streamline business processes.

On June 1, 2009 the Commission relocated to 1333 Main Street. The new location has served as a valuable asset to the agency as it contains cost and provides centralized access to constituents. The fiscal impact of relocating is an estimated \$83,857 annually, resulting in a net savings of \$587,000 over a seven year lease.

The Commission has implemented an automated process to monitor outstanding fines, which prompts late notices to be created according to a batch program run bi-monthly. The result is a systematic follow up process driven by the age of an outstanding fine to replace a reliance upon the assessor to manually send late notices.

The Commission held one day training sessions for three insurance carriers and held a claims administrations seminar for fifty attendees. The purpose of providing training to agency constituents is to minimize the number of file deficiencies. Lowering file deficiencies results in minimizing the number of fine assessments and expedites hearings.
